The Good News and The Bad News!

A congregation was committed to undertaking a large project. One Sunday, their Minister announced the following. "I have good news, and bad news. The good news is that we have enough money to pay for our new building programme. The bad news is that it's still out there in your pockets!"

Well, our version is somewhat different. The 'Very Good News' is that, thus far, we have gifts and pledges which, with the tax that can be reclaimed, amount to a total of $\pounds140,000$ most of which is in hand. We will therefore have a Building Project fund of $\pounds300,000$ and our grateful thanks go to all those who have sacrificially committed themselves to this effort thus far.

However, there is still a good part of our project out there 'in pockets' so to speak. For one thing, we have still to receive a response from 311 of our members. Now we are well aware that some folks will have been on holiday, and that many others will have intended to return their cards but, for whatever reason (card lost, fallen ill, etc), have not yet done so.

But time is now of the essence.

We still need to raise well over £100,00 and if we cannot be sure of our most up-to-date financial position then that slows our progress to the next stages. Therefore, we are now in the process of encouraging these members to complete and return their cards. In a massive and complex exercise like this, there may be an occasional error. Please therefore support your Lord's work with patience, understanding and real commitment.

The vision that we have is for modernised buildings where we can worship with great joy, nurture our children, and reach out with renewed vigour to serve our Lord here in Arbroath and in the wider world.

We thank you all in anticipation of your further response to this wonderful vision.

Progress To Date

2007

February/March - At Kirk Session, Martin floats the idea of upgrading our sanctuary (and perhaps later our halls). **May/June** - Kirk Session approves the carrying out of a feasibility study and we appoint Crawford Mackenzie, Architect from Dundee.

September - Kirk Session receives the report and <u>unani-</u> <u>mously</u> decides that we should upgrade <u>both</u> the sanctuary and the halls.

October - Overwhelming endorsement is made at the Congregational Open Meeting.

November/December - Approval to proceed is obtained from the General Trustees and Presbytery.

2008

February/March - We appoint our Structural Engineer, Ian Martin of Gemmell Hammond (Arbroath) and our Quantity Surveyor/CDM, Martin Reid of NWP (Forfar). April - Planning application is submitted to Angus Council. May - Congregational Gift/Pledge Days. May - Building Warrant is submitted to Angus Council.

Next Steps -

June - Continue to raise appeal money, seek grants, and thereafter seek a loan from the Church of Scotland. July - Obtain tenders from a number of companies, select one and, assuming finances are in place, sign a contract. Autumn - Move church office to, and store church property at, 27 Hamilton Green. Dear friends,

Last Friday (23rd May), I headed off with Callum for a night's camping and hill-walking. We arrived at the north end of Glenshee at about 6pm, had a BBQ dinner, then made our way south-west into that great tract of wild country that lies behind the popular skiing areas. We hiked for about two hours, climbing as we went, until about 9pm, when at a height of about 2,500 feet, we made our camp. Camping high in the hills is a quite different thing from camping on an official site or by the roadside. For a start, you have to carry much more gear with you! But apart from that, the sense of isolation is of a totally different order – unbeatable!

After preparing some hot food and drinks, we settled into our tent, though it was still very light. For long enough, we lay there listening...to nothing. It was totally silent! Even the wind had died down meaning that there was no flapping canvas to break the silence.

The great benefit of such a trip – apart from it being great father / son time – is in the regaining of perspective. It's too easy, when you're working away day after day, to lose sight of what matters and what's not so important. Everything can pile up causing you to lose sight of where you are and where you should be going. Or, to use a different image, it's like being too close to a big masterpiece. To see it properly, you need to step back to the other side of the room and take the whole thing in.

Well, up there in the mountains, in the elements, away from everything, you can't help but get a better fix on things. You're reminded of scale, that you're just one small element in a great big world. And you're reminded that there's a great, big God in charge of it all! At the end of it all, you come back down feeling better – enlivened, refreshed, invigorated.

It's not possible for all of us to make for the hills. But even in our own locale, it's important that we make time for stepping out of our daily routine, allowing ourselves room to breathe. Hey – if it was good enough for Jesus...!!!

- The Pastor Family Retreat weekend in June, when all of the pastors and their families will take some time-out to refresh themselves spiritually
- All of the work being done to transform the communities in terms of health, education general development

On the other front, the exciting news is that Mary Scott is going out to Malawi at the beginning of July!! We look forward to hearing from Mary when she returns, about how things are getting on with the work that we are supporting there.

Malawi Update

From Angus who heads up the work of Aquaid Lifeline -

"The work at Thyolo and Kambilonjo is going on slowly. I wish I could say that all was up and running, but not yet. At Kambilonjo the residence structure is not yet complete, I havn't seen this with my own eyes but that is the report I've received. The roof is on but plastering and painting are still yet to be completed. The daycare centre is going on well as usual.

At Thyolo, the residence is at a more advanced stage municiple water has been connected and we are waiting for electricity to be connected - Aquaid's first centre with mains power! On the whole, structurely it is almost done. What is left to complete is an outside kitchen, toilets and septic tank. The daycare side has just started this month with approx 70 children. After this month we should have an exact figure of the regular attending children.

Both centres are still waiting for official registration from the Social Welfare Department. This does need prayer. The applications have been with the relevant authorities for months and the response time is terribly slow however this is normal.'

Our St Andrew's young people are continuing their fundraising towards the 2009 trip. We are holding a Beetle Drive on Friday 6th June at 7.30pm. Why not get together a team? Teams of 4 are welcome and the cost will be £5 per team. There will also be a Cake and Candy Stall available at this event.

There will be a Coffee Morning held on Saturday 28th June 10am - 12noon. Cost of tickets will be £1. There will be various stalls at this too.

Speech/Voice Recognition

Searle

My father had good health until quite unexpectedly a major change took place in his physical condition when he was 75 years old. It came to light through two identical minor motoring accidents: twice he struck the gatepost with the car's wing mirror. After the second incident, he was advised to have his eyes tested and it was then that macular degeneration in his eyes was diagnosed. So rapid was the decline in his sight that within a few months he was registered as blind.

For eighteen years, the reading glasses I had been given when I was 49 years old were fine so I never visited an optician in all that time. However, when I reached the age of 67, I was having difficulty looking up numbers in the telephone directory, so I went for an eye test here in Arbroath. The young optician informed me - I thought with some relish - that I had macular degeneration and there was absolutely nothing that could be done about it, except to visit him annually for a check-up.

Naturally, I was a little alarmed. The prospect of being registered as blind within a few years was very disconcerting. Was there no treatment that could help? I contacted a good friend, a consultant optometrist, who arranged to examine my eyes. When he pronounced my sight exceptionally good, and without any evident degeneration, we both suspected the optician had deliberately tried to ensure I made annual visits to his practice, and so to win for himself a regular customer.

However, the consultant did inform me I had the potential for the dreaded macular degeneration which had so dominated my father's life for his final 24 years (he lived to 99), and advised certain medication which could help maintain my sight and keep blindness at bay for a few years longer.

I wonder if you have ever faced the prospect of losing your sight? For me, it was quite scary! There's so much I still hope to do, particularly in terms of writing and research. So I have obtained Speech/Voice Recognition software for my computer and have begun the fairly lengthy process of teaching it to recognize my voice and transfer my speech to text. I am spending about ten minutes each day reading to the computer exercises which the software presents on the screen. When the machine can't recognize a word I have read, a red arrow points to the word and I have to repeat it until the machine has learned it and tells me to proceed.

The theory is that after about six months, all I will have to do is talk to my computer and it will type up for me exactly what I say. That's why the software package is called 'Speech/ Voice Recognition'. It's just another of these mind-blowing advances which those of us who are now 'oldies' find hard to believe, far less understand.

If I was to put into Bible language this process of teaching my computer 'voice recognition', I would say I am, to the machine, a kind of 'god', and it must learn to hear and obey what I say.

Thereby hangs a parable. Without daring to suggest you and I are machines - we most certainly are not! - it is true that God has to teach us to recognize his voice, to hear his words, and to act on them. Do you remember how Samuel learned that at an early age? Some of us who are getting on in years may never have really learned to hear God speaking, even though for decades he has been offering us simple lessons in 'voice recognition'. We drink in what the media throws at us. We hear the empty waffling of so-called celebrities. We absorb complete rubbish from soaps, films and inane TV shows. But the voice of our Creator, who loves us and longs to be our Lord and King, we have never heard. No one needs software to learn divine 'voice recognition'. But essential for us to hear the Lord speaking is the willingness first to admit our opinions may be wrong, then to approach him in humility and finally to listen for his voice speaking through his word. Once we have tuned in to that 'silent whisper', there then stretches before us the long process of learning what he has to say on the most mundane of topics as well as the most important of issues, and transferring his speech to 'text' - I mean into solid, hands-on obedience.

I'm talking about a revolution in living, praying, giving, serving; about an adventure-filled life with the truest, kindest, most loving Companion anyone could ever know. (By the way, I know a man who couldn't type and refused to learn. He was given a computer with the speech software, but never ever bothered to use it. Is someone reading this like that with God?)

Speech/Voice Recognition! I started learning at 70 years of age. You can begin the heavenly software program right up and into your nineties. But don't wait that long - otherwise you'll miss so much. 'Seek the Lord and his face; seek him now and always!'
