Dear Friends,

As most of you know, at St. Andrew's we share in communion on a regular basis, much more frequently than the twice-a-year basis still practised in many places. Our monthly short communions have allowed us to develop different practices and to become a little more relaxed about it. Of course, communion – The Lord's Supper – remains special, rightly so; but more regular participation allows us to be less uptight, rightly so.

In recent months, we have added a layer to our communion practice which has involved offering worshippers the opportunity to be prayed for, with the laying on of hands. Encouragingly, quite a few people have availed themselves of this possibility.

For some of us, who have never been used to such practices, it can seem a little strange and can leave us somewhat uncomfortable. For others, there's nothing more natural than that Christians pray for one another!

Specifically, in the context of Communion, we've been praying for healing – in its widest, holistic sense. Interestingly, David Lunan, Moderator of the Genral Assembly of The Church of Scotland, chose to write about this subject in his most recent *Life & Work* article. Here's what he said:

I first encountered a service of healing where people were prayed for at Iona Abbey. People were also prayed 'with,' at the close of the service, sometimes with the laying on of hands, as in a blessing. I remember being slightly uncomfortable with the service, probably because it was new to me

It no longer seems strange to me. In fact it seems odd that we do not pray for one another more often, and even more openly. Our prayers are not always answered in the way we might have been hoping, but I believe there is always a blessing from God, always his peace, always his grace. Sometimes it is the only thing we can offer...and the best thing we can offer.

At the same time, the most recent edition of *Time* magazine leads with a special section entitled: *How faith* can heal. It makes the point that believers have always operated on this basis but adds: a growing body of scientific evidence suggests that faith may indeed bring us health.

None of us knows *how* prayer works. It will remain one of those great mysteries that when believers pray, somehow there is a coming together of earth and heaven. And it's to more deeply enter into that mystery that we're praying in this way – as part of the Communion service.

I look to the day when all of us will be entirely at home with healing prayer as part of our worship. Don't worry – there's not going to be someone dressed in a flashy white suit, speaking in a flashy American accent. In fact, there will be nothing flashy about it at all. Jesus was never into publicity stunts or showmanship; neither will we be. But as he did, we will pray to the Father and in so doing, will look for his Kingdom among us. I hope that more and more of you will feel okay about coming to be prayed for and that, as time goes by, we'll have even more to say *thank you* to God for!

We spoke to a few people who said that we had made their day, and others who were very thankful to have someone to talk to, and pray with them.

God really cares for the people of Arbroath. He loves them! He wants to be in relationship with each and every person. Praying on the streets is one way of introducing Him to people who may not think about God very often. It is exciting, challenging and fun! Putting aside our own concerns about what people will think of us and getting out there and showing the people of Arbroath that there is a God who cares for their needs, cares for their families, and that Christians care too.

Nou Vanna's Story

Members of Pastor Vanna's church are active members of the Wattanak Group [in Kampong Tralach]. Together the members have learned to raise fish, raise cows and pigs and they support each other. Though he is not a participant in the Wattanak Group, Pastor Vanna has seen the economic transformation of his church members. He has actively participated in World Vision's activities such as digging ponds to raise fish. "Since we've partnered with World Vision, our church has received a lot of respect from the community. Before, no one paid any attention to us," said Pastor Vanna.

The church has about 100 members who regularly come to worship. Pastor Vanna travels around the commune looking for those who need Christ and shares the Good News with them. When asked what he sees as the transformation in his life he answered, "Before I was a Christian, I was mostly thinking about myself and my needs. I never thought about others. Being a Christian makes me think about what I can do for others."

Church Development Highlights in Kampong Tralach

- ♦ The local church leaders in Kampong Tralach now make plans together and commit to being involved regularly with project activities such as prayer, pastor fellowship and training workshops. They have also been visiting their church members from home to home, including the poorest families, in order to get to know each person and to learn about their living conditions. This is a seemingly simple action, but one that has great value in a fragmented and distrusting community.
- ♦ The attendance of children in home churches has increased with between 10 to 15 children in each home church. Children have become very interested in the new Sunday school classes created this year.
- ♦ Church buildings and worship places have also improved after Churches in Partnership provided the community with the necessary materials. This has encouraged the members to come to church regularly in order to facilitate church ministries. Amazingly, the number of church events increased this past year from barely anything to 252!
- ♦ Even though there has been progress amongst local church leaders and their members, poverty is still the main barrier to their full participation. For example, they rely on aid for transportation to come and attend meetings, training sessions and other activities. Without this support, local participation would be lower.

Trust does not come easily in a country ravaged by war for the last 30 years. Building up the community and encouraging them to mobilise themselves takes time to establish. However, it is clear that the work of World Vision in Cambodia, and Kampong Tralach in particular, continues to bear fruit.

Thank you for your support, which has been help-

ing to bring financial support, faith and prayer to the Kampong Tralach community in their journey out of poverty.

Our Easter Holiday Club


