Contact the Elderly

Contact the Elderly is a registered charity with around 320 groups in Scotland. Next year it will celebrate its fortieth birthday. I am a volunteer with CtE and coordinate the only group in Angus. I would like to see several new groups started before our fortieth birthday and for that we need volunteers - we have no problem finding guests.

CtE consists of volunteer drivers, volunteer hosts, and elderly guests and the aim is to provide friendship and company for people over 75 who need a little help getting out of the house and who have limited contact with friends and family.

One Sunday a month, volunteer drivers each collect two or three elderly guests and take them to a volunteer host (a different one each month) for afternoon tea, arriving at 2pm and leaving at 4pm. This simple idea makes an unbelievable difference to our guests who feel they are part of society again, make friends and feel that someone cares. Our volunteers help through kindness, not obligation or because it is their job.

When people get older they often have social contact through an institution or something like a coffee morning. With CtE our guests are welcomed into people's homes which makes a real difference and makes them feel part of normal life.

To be a volunteer driver you need a driver's licence, a safe car and be able to stay and enjoy the party. CtE also requires drivers to go through the disclosure process which is paid for by CtE. To be a host you require a downstairs loo, not too many steps, a large teapot and a warm smile! It is not a huge commitment, but it is a commitment as we never let an old person down. We try to have spare drivers to cover for holidays, illness etc.

I have a wonderful group of volunteers who enjoy the outings just as much as our guests, become very fond of our elderly friends and this fondness is certainly reciprocated. Malawi Update

Hi Everyone,

I have to apologise for the delay in this update. I was hoping that I'd have everyone's email addresses by this time, but progress in this area has been slower than previously anticipated! If you do know of anyone who hasn't sent me their email address please encourage them to do so. We will of course print this update but emails save our carbon footprint as well as printing costs!

The Malawian exam results came out at the start of October. To set the scene, in Malawi there are 3 major exams. At the end of a pupil's 8 years of primary education, they will sit the 'Primary School Leaving Certificate' (PSLC). Then the first two years of Secondary school are spent preparing for the 'Junior Certificate of Education' (JCE) and in the final two years of secondary (3rd and 4th years) they work towards the 'Malawi School Certificate of Education' (MSCE). Since the daycare started recently and works primarily with primary children, it did not start with any secondary aged orphans. However the first daycare pupil to sit PSLC, did so this year. Jean Maluwa, a 13 year old girl sat her primary school leaving school exams this year and did exceptionally well. In Malawi there are 3 main levels of secondary school. There is 'national' level, 'district' and then there are the 'local' schools. Local schools are day secondary schools where pupils learn throughout the morning and then head back home at 1pm or 2pm. However, depending on the exam results at PSLC, pupils can be selected to district or national level secondary schools. These schools have qualified teachers and at national level may even have computers, Bunsen Burners etc. These schools also teach French and 'Physical Science' - a mix between Chemistry and Physics. These among other subjects improve pupil's employability profoundly and, since the schools are boarding schools with much higher quality teaching and full days, the pupils get much better chances of good results in their future exams. Jean did very well and managed to be selected to a district level school - Lochenza Secondary School. This is a great achievement as these schools are very difficult to get into. We are very proud of Jean, our first secondary pupil and are sure she will do very well in the future. Jean wants to be a lawyer. Hopefully she will work hard and achieve her dreams.

Each year at Primary and Secondary, pupils have to pass exams to move up a year. The daycare pupils performed well and most have moved up this year. We now have 4

Standard 8s who are preparing for their PSLC soon. There are two boys- Damiano Frank and Brian Phiri, and two girls - Ellen Nachuma and Yasinta Banda. They are at present working very hard and I believe will do well. There are also 9 in Standard 7, 9 in Standard 6, and 9 in Standard 5. We have 14 Standard 4 pupils, 12 Standard 3s, 15 Standard 2s, 13 in Standard 1 and 19 in the nursery.

The daycare centre has been going well. There has been a new trainee teacher who has been assisting in the classes. She is an orphan who was supported all the way through school by Aquaid at another daycare centre and now, having completed school, is hoping to do nursing. Her name is Triza Crighton and she is 18 years old. Christina the administrator at Thyolo has nothing but good to say about her. She has been teaching the children other methods for cultivating crops and has just planted the children's maize crop with them. She has also been teaching them lots of singing and dancing. It is great to see these young people whom Aquaid have supported, finishing their education and beginning their work. They are now able to support other members of their family.

Christina wants to let her brothers and sisters in Scotland know that she is preparing to sit some further education exams in December. She has been learning long distance at the College as she wants to "be able to do her job better." She has funded herself through these modules and is preparing to sit Accounting (2nd Dec) and Practical Maths (3rd Dec). She would be very grateful for your prayers. As always Christina is doing a great job and working exceptionally hard!

Please remember to pray for your child and for the daycare centre as a whole. Pray for Triza and her family and thank God for the daycare centre at Maliya which has supported her throughout her education.

ECO CONGREGATION

Now that we are registered as an ecocongregation - and aiming towards receiving an eco-award somewhere down the line! – it's important that lots of us start to get a little more deliberate in terms of reducing the impact we make on the planet. This isn't just about trendy political agendas; it's to do with our understanding of what it means to be God-appointed stewards of creation.

So, here are some tips for a strategy to reduce your household carbon footprint by 5% - a real move in the right direction. You can begin by measuring your carbon footprint using the tool that is provided on the eco-congregation website:

www.ecocongregation.org/scotland

Take action in your lives. As with church buildings, we suggest you set a target to aim at. When you know the carbon footprint of your homes and car travel, can you make a commitment to reduce this by 5% this year and go on to reduce you emissions by 5% each year thereafter? It might be easier than you think. Reducing unnecessary consumption is the key. By not travelling when you don't need to, or by cutting back a little on the things you buy or use, you can start making inroads to your carbon footprint. To achieve a 5% reduction, consider the following pointers from the UK Government's ActonCO2 website.

In the home

- If you have a loft, check the insulation is it 270mm thick? Fitting this amount of insulation could save up to £150 a year on heating bills.
- If you have a hot water tank fit an

insulating jacket at least 75mm thick and save up to £30 a year.

- If you have cavity walls save up to £120 a year by installing cavity wall insulation.

On the move

- If you drive a car, do you have the most fuel efficient car for your needs? It is estimated that buying the most fuel efficient car in its class could reduce emissions by 24% and save three month's worth of fuel a
- Can you find an alternative to using a car or share a journey for some of your trips? An average car commuter drives 12 miles a day and reducing this by half could save 400kg of CO2 a year or 170 litres of fuel.
- Smarter driving could reduce your fuel consumption by 8% a year – see website for more details:

Out shopping

- When purchasing white goods, look for the energy label or energy-saving recommended logo.
- Producing, processing and transporting food may be responsible for up to a third of your carbon footprint, yet the average UK house spends £420 a year on food that could be eaten but is thrown away. How do you manage your food shopping?
- UK consumers buy about 2 million tonnes of clothes a year with a carbon footprint of 3.1 million tons: how do you shop for clothes?

Nurture Core Group

As we now have such a large and diverse work this was no mean task. We also ran a conference for all those involved in children and youth work in St Andrew's, 'From Weans to Teens and In betweens'. Another venture was to have a training meeting for those involved in leading core group meetings or similar within the congregation, 'Meeting Makeover'. Leading seems an easy thing to do but not so easy to do so effectively and efficiently.

Recently we have been involved in vetting DVD material for Marriage Preparation and pastoral work. We will be visiting all youth organisations of the church to listen to any concerns. This used to be the elders' responsibility. We would like to have a series of meetings for young parents to enable them to share their experiences and problems in today's world. It will be our intention to support the Leadership Training taking place in the coming months.

The team who plan our work are Eleanor Mands the official Safeguarding Coordinator, Mairi Duncan, Gaynor Scott, Fiona Cargill, Sharon Hamilton (new member), David Searle, Pat Mill our link person from the Leadership Group and Lorna Searle. We are a varied group, all busy people with different gifts and

If One Suffers

The above is the title of a report from the World Mission Council's Report concerning Christians living in a minority situation. We are being encouraged to consider how to raise awareness, offer prayer support or take practical action on behalf of minority Christians. With our communion service on 31st October, we celebrated the first anniversary of the return to our church – how time flies! Perhaps some of us are, by now, thoroughly familiar with our new surroundings but, even though I am in them virtually every day in life, I still find myself thinking; Wow! Isn't this great!
