Dear friends,

Well, this weekend (at the time of writing) is that point in the year at which we literally do turn back time, with the changing of the clock! I wonder how many of us will forget this year and turn up for Sunday morning worship at the wrong time!!

But of course, there's a deeper meaning behind the idea of *turning back time*. It's about much more than changing the clocks.

I'm not really a fan of *Strictly* but such is the level of coverage it receives, it's almost impossible to avoid it! I was doing something else last week while the results show was on but was drawn to it when I heard one of my favourite songs being sung as the accompaniment to the dance that was taking place – *Turn Back Time* by the pop diva, Cher. And, perhaps, he regretted that he had been so intransigent in relation to John Mark and that he had fallen out with Barnabas as a result (Acts 15:36-41). But still he was able to say, "*I keep my eyes on what lies ahead; I press on towards the goal.*"

Glancing back? We'll all do that from time to time. But let's not get stuck in our pasts so that we miss the blessings of today. Let's not try to turn our clocks back. Instead, let's try and keep our clocks synchronised with God's timing, which is always perfect in every way.

Malawi 11 Report

So here is my Second Report and I have just had my Second Wedding so perfect timing! I would like to say I got there on time, but that would be wishful thinking in Malawi. Got to love them! We were a lot more on time than last time though, so that's always good. Anyway it was really good. It was Kiri's wedding who is one of the Aquaid staff – she is Administrator at Thyolo. She is sooo nice and she looked stunning.

Anyway since I last wrote I have started teaching. I am teaching Standard 6 Mathematics and Standard 7 Science. In Malawi they have 8 standards in Primary and 4 forms in Secondary. Anyway, its good and I think they understand. It's quite hard sometimes as all lessons from Standard 5 up are in English which is good for me but not really for them as they don't have great English at that age - but they are doing surprisingly well. They come out with some hilarious answers which I really shouldn't laugh at, but sometimes you can't help yourself! I like teaching both, but standard 6 are probably harder partly because they are younger but also because there are 67 in the class! - pretty hard work !

At the moment, other than teaching, I spend my time playing football with the girls who are coming on really well and are pretty fit since they spend their time running after the boys who have stolen their footballs! Seriously, boys are right annoying sometimes! When I'm not playing football I am leading devotions at the kids' houses which is actually hilarious sometimes – great fun! When I have nothing else to do I am most likely eating. Seriously, the Malawians only have one aim for my year here and that's to get me fat! I managed to have Malawian porridge one day which is the most filling breakfast ever. I then went to church and when I came home was cooked a huge lunch after which I visited a friend who stuffed me full of biscuits and then produced a huge plate of Nsima. By time I was finished there it was too late to tell the house I was supposed to be eating with that I wasn't eating. Unfortunately they had made too much and so gave me the biggest helping ever. Thankfully they hadn't eaten as much as me previously, so I didn't have to eat it all. I seriously thought I was going to explode! Anyway, when I last spoke, the Standard 8s, Form 2s, Form 4s, and the trainee teachers

were all waiting for exam results. The Standard 8s and Form 2s received theirs about three weeks ago so are now back at school. They did really well and some of the standard 8s were selected to some of the top schools in the country which is really good - the Standard 8s at the Government School nearby all failed so Aquaid did amazing. The teachers and Form 4s are still waiting so Modesta, my sister's friend, and a few of the others are helping out at Aquaid primary which is good as Malawians are often ill and, since they are waiting for ten students to come, they are sometimes a little short - so much so that I ended up teaching two classes one day, which is hard enough at the best of time but I happened to have a random cold and had pretty much no voice. It worked well enough – well they did their work! The whole day everyone kept asking why I had changed my voice! I had to explain that I hadn't quite chosen for my voice to go!

Anyway I am pretty shattered right now since I have to get up at 5 or earlier to clean the house before school - seriously it is so annoying I literally finish and turn round and it's all dusty again. Right now we have huge ant issues so much so that I think we have a nest somewhere in one of our settees but I just can't find it and so can't completely kill them. Whenever we have visitors they start wriggling around after about ten minutes - slightly embarrassing!

Had the first rains last week and although it's supposed to get super hot, it's actually gone quite cold- not too sure what's going on just now. It's also gone pretty windy. There have even been a couple of mini twisters going round - this really wouldn't be a problem in Scotland but, when you have to wear skirts here, there can be some pretty embarrassing moments especially when our porch is like a wind tunnel!

Anyway right now my Chichewa is improving but it seems to be so slow. I think it's because I so want it to come and, as they say, a watched pot never boils. I'm at the super annoying stage where I understand a bit but not enough to get what they actually want! Anyways, that's my second update over. Speak soon.

The book review for this month is : "Too Busy Not to Pray" by Bill Hybels

There were good-going discussions on the disruption of the seasons with most produce available all year round now, concern that it was difficult to always be aware of what has been added to food stuffs and as we looked at the two different farms it was interesting to see how the larger of the farms with all the use of modern technology employed fewer folk compared

to the small organic farm, and how the supermarkets seem to dictate what we eat. A few funny points arose as we all thought back to our tattie and berry picking days – the funny shapes and sizes of the produce, not the perfect shaped store bought ones we are used to now, and how one member knew of someone throwing out vegetables that had come straight out the garden as they were all earth and dirty!

We had our Project night on 31st - a Place for Hope - which was an open evening so I do hope you managed to come along.

November is an extremely busy month with Guild Week running from 20th – 27th. This is a time when Guilds try to bring awareness to the work of the Guild and encourage people to come along and see if it is something they would enjoy. There are always many different events and ours consists of a Soup and Pudding lunch on 26th, 12-2pm, tickets £4, a visit to our Guildlink partners in Glenrothes and hopefully partaking in a church service. Other meetings in November are the 14th - Simply Food with Brian Anderson and Best Foot Forward with Leonie and Alex on the 28th. Mum and Me

Our Thursday-morning *Parent & Toddler Group* has always been very popular, since its beginning in the early 1990s. The group will be hosted by some of our own experienced, caring and understanding mums and our Guild, who are committed to find ways to encourage this work, will be important background supporters.

Though the emphasis described above is on *mums* that doesn't mean that the children will be an after-thought. On the contrary, the crèche will be well-staffed and a creative, engaging programme will be provided so that the children are both happy and suitably engaged throughout.

With one or two details still being worked out, the exact starting date for this new group, *Mum and Me*, is not yet known but will certainly be as early as possible in the new year. Appropriate advertising will take place in due course.

The Jean Glen Legacy

As was published earlier this year, the congregation received a significant sum of money following the death of one of our much-loved members, Jean Glen. More or less right away, it was decided that this money should be spent! Though some might have thought about putting it away for a rainy day, the realization among most was that Jean wouldn't have wanted the money stuck in a vault and that, in terms of the position of the Church in Scotland today, NOW is the rainy day!!

So, charged by the Kirk Session, the Leadership Group went away and devoted much prayerful consideration as to how this money should be used – and about how that could be done to best reflect our priorities and purposes as a congregation. Suggestions were asked for and many were received and following that consultation, recommendations were made to the Kirk Session who, of course, hold ultimate authority within the congregation. These recommendations included much of what was suggested though, of course, not all. Much of the spending will take place over the coming months; you'll see evidence of it along the way. For instance, we are going to spend a significant sum of money on double glazing windows, this reflecting our eco-congregation agenda and the requirement that we don't waste any more energy

than is necessary. We're also looking at ways to develop the manse, ensuring that it is maintained and developed to a high standard for this manse family and for those who may in years to come move into it.

But beyond those pieces of essential and desirable fabric expenditure, the bulk of the money is being allocated to further the mission of the congregation. So, for example, a very significant sum has been set aside to underpin our *Havilah* project and, in particular, towards the securing of suitable stand-alone premises which will both allow the project to grow to the next level and free up some hall space for other ventures. And, in terms of our worldwide mission, we are going to put a significant sum of money towards the ongoing running costs of the centres that previously we've developed in Malawi.

While other projects under the headings of worship, service, nurture and outreach will also receive allocations, the other main thing decided was that we would pay off the remainder of the loan that we had secured from The Church of Scotland to do our refurbishment programme. Almost £40,000 had still to be paid but in September, we went ahead and cleared that sum meaning that we are in the clear – the project fully paid for several years ahead of schedule! Isn't that great? It really does mean that we can focus on the future and that's exactly what we intend to do.

Focus on Fairtrade

St Andrew's is working towards becoming a recognised Fairtrade Church, and Arbroath is working towards becoming a recognised Fairtrade Town. To be a Fairtrade Church, we need to:

- ◊ Use Fairtrade tea and coffee after services and in all meetings for which we have responsibility – we're doing this already
- ◊ Move forward on using other Fairtrade products such as sugar, biscuits and fruit
- ◊ Promote Fairtrade during Fairtrade Fortnight and during the year through events, worship and other activities whenever possible

As part of fulfilling the second and third requirements, you will see regular items about our Fairtrade commitment appearing in Quest. Green Winter tips

The weather experts may be predicting another white Christmas, but we can still be green over the colder months. You can lose up to a quarter of your home heating through your roof, so with the fuel price hikes it makes financial as well as eco-sense to check that you have enough loft insulation, and top it up if you don't. Wrap up your boiler and pipes in snug jackets too, because a well-insulated house has a colder loft.

Don't "set and forget" your heating controls – check them each day and change the on-off times according to when you'll be in the house, because most of us vary our routine over the week. Think about the temperatures, too, room by room; use your individual radiator controls to fine-tune your heating. Remember that "a sweater looks sweeter and costs less than a heater!", and what could be nicer than snuggling up with someone you love under a cosy rug when you're watching TV?

Finally, if you're thinking of buying an appliance as a Christmas present, remember to look at its energy rating, and keep an eye out for Energy Savings Trust recommended products.
