It was a delight for us to welcome the Moderator to Angus, and, in particular, to Arbroath during the last week of April. As mentioned elsewhere, he preached at a service held in the Abbey on the Sunday afternoon and, through his sermon, brought much encouragement to us.

On the Tuesday afternoon, he visited three projects which we run or with which we are associated. The tour started at StarterPacks Angus, an organisation that was started through the endeavours of our congregation and our colleagues at Old & Abbey Church. It's a project that has gone from strength to strength and which, through it's nine years, has helped hundreds of people move out of homelessness. The passion of staff and volunteers is obvious as soon as you walk in to their premises.

The next stop was at our new premises at 7a Fisheracre, and to meet with Havilah staff and volunteers. The Moderator spent about half an hour hearing about the beginnings of the project and about how things have developed since. He heard, too, from Jacqui Reid about how her life has been transformed and about how the start of her journey to recovery was the day she walked in to Havilah.

Speaking afterwards, both the Moderator and his wife, Rosemary, couldn't speak highly enough about the project. He talked about his sense of pride that this kind of work is taking place in the name of The Church of Scotland. The last stop on the tour was the Emergency Food Parcel Project which, again, we run jointly with Old & Abbey Church. And, again, Mr. Arnott was highly impressed by the project and by the scale of what is being done.

As he left, he said, 'All of this is music to my ears! This is exactly what it means to be the Church.' Let's continue to ensure that St. Andrew's Church is in the business of making a difference in the community in which we are set. Let's make sure that our following of Jesus is as much about what we do during the week as it is about our worship on Sunday morning.

Some painted a giant David and Goliath on material, while others decorated pebbles or made sheep sock puppets. The children were all so well-behaved and enjoying their tasks. A time of worship enabled the children to use their crafts to act out the story, sing a song and pray together. The final section involved a beautiful meal where I was told that I could not be at the 'cool table'! To enable all this to happen, a dedicated group of people give up their time in the preparation and carrying out of all these activities. As there are children there who do not come to church, the outreach potential is very important.

Holiday Club

The opening day of this year's Holiday Club saw the hall full of excited children all eager to begin. Again there were many children present who have no regular church experience. The sport-related theme of On Your Marks enabled competitions to take place with the awarding of medals at the end of the day along with the ever-popular gunge time! The noise level was high, but so was the enthusiasm! The Christian message was presented in a sensitive and appropriate way. In the evening of the final day, parents had the opportunity to sample a flavour of what took place. This was an important opportunity to show them what goes on in a forward-thinking church and we hope that the invitation extended about all the opportunities for children might be taken up by many of them.

Those in charge gave up several hours each day for a week – we should all be so grateful for their commitment to our young people and, for them, this is a big THANK YOU.

Malawi Update

The last three weeks have been Easter holidays so it been a pretty relaxing time although I ain't exactly very stressed - so yeah probably more just being lazy! The clinic was still open so I was there for my usual 3 mornings. It was actually pretty quiet as most people going there are the hypochondriac children and they were on holiday. The boarders didn't seem to notice their sore heads and stomach pains quite as much when they were playing as when they are sitting in class! On my other mornings I either played with the kids or visited people.

Every afternoon there have been 2 football games so for the last 3 weeks I have been at the football pitch from 2 till 6. This is actually really good because everyone goes to the football and Aquaid boarders have their own designated spot so it's really good for socialising. I think that is actually why most people are there as when I turn up late it takes me about 5 minutes, and after asking 10 people, before I can find out the score! I have also received several proposals of marriage due to these long hours of watching football. It's amazing how many people can't live the rest of their life without you, even though they only just met you 2 minutes before! If I was in Scotland or wasn't white I would honestly be the vainest person in all the world

Another positive of the football is that because of all these hours in the sun my hair is getting super, super blond and well streaked. It was also helped because I had my hair braided for two weeks. I must inform you that people have always said to me that white people don't suit braids and I never listened to them but, yeah, I was totally wrong and they were totally right! It makes you look bald! Not sure if it's the colour, texture or the fact that they use extensions but they pull it off so much better! Also for someone like me who washes their hair every day then not washing it for two weeks was disgusting, although when I took them out it was actually pretty clean. It seemed as though all my hair was falling out when I brushed it although what was left was a massive frizz that stuck way out and actually made me look like a lion which the kids thought was funny! Thankfully as soon as I washed it, it lost all its bushiness and is now back to its soft straight clean self.

We had two football games for the girl boarders last month which we won so we had a party with rice and cake -

Appropriately his talk was on his 'Journey to Arbroath' and he was quick to point out, though many of the flags were of countries he had visited, we did not have the Romanian flag! He gave us a bit of his background and family life in Romania and how his spiritual journey had led him here to Arbroath. He was very enthusiastic about what lay ahead for Knox's/St. Vigean's and hoped to start a Youth Group after the summer.

Our final evening on the 16th was our AGM. Rev. Martin Fair joined us and officiated as accounts, reports and nominations for committee took place for the session 2012/2013. It was a little alarming as Martin was sure he had stepped back in time as some members were dressed in the girls are now very set on winning their next games as it turns out that girls are just as easily persuaded with food as boys! Thought it was just me and always put that down to the fact that I'm sure there was a mistake and I was actually supposed be born a boy.

This month I went to Thyolo to visit and stayed over for 3 days. It was really good to get to know all the boarders there as I don't actually know them that well and also Kiri who is in charge there is a super good cook! I was sharing a room with the boarders but as they go to sleep at about 8 and don't get up till 7 I really had nothing to complain about. I also went to visit Angus - who is in charge of Aquaid in Malawi - and his wife Lisa's church on Easter Sunday which was really kind of them as they have two young kids so enough stress without having to pick me up. The service was pretty much the same as home but it made me realise how little we actually worship when we are singing - Malawians dance and clap and sing out so much you can hardly hear yourself sing but we are so static and hardly even mumble the words out. Although I must say the 20 minute preach was much easier to concentrate on than the usual hour to an hour and a half! After the service we went to the pastor's house for lunch which was nice because I was able to chat away and know they were totally understanding and also not feel guilty that I was talking too much - I always feel bad that I'm speaking to Malawians in English as they are then having to work hard as I can't speak to them very much in Chichewa. It was so weird as everything was so like home in Scotland but I was in Malawi and the two seem weird together. It made me feel super selfish and greedy which I guess was good for me to realise but not the most enjoyable thing to discover.

I have had some trouble with the older boys regarding prayers. I think they actually really enjoy it as pretty much all of them eventually turn up - I think they just don't think it's cool to look like you want to go pray with the crazy white girl! Once you get a few, there is not a problem – it's just hard to convince some to be the first. Basically, I need a bit of prayer that I can find a way to inspire these boys, and in fact all the kids, because a bit of inspiration never hurt anyone!

Well that is all from me again so have another good month and I will sadly be seeing you all too soon! Naomi. x

The Persecuted Church

I am sure that many of you have downed your coffee cup in the hall after church to sign a petition of some sort or other. You may then wonder whether your signature will make any difference to the people or situations targeted on the piece of paper presented to you.

Although we do not know the ultimate outcome, I can answer for the importance of one particular case. Last year some 52,000 people (including yourselves) signed a petition calling for more religious freedom in North Korea. In January, 2012, after an all night prayer vigil, a procession organised by members of Release Int. marched to the North KoHaving just returned from an official visit to China, Mr. Arnott was able to encourage us with news of the phenomenal spread of the Christian Church in that vast nation. Though still a tiny minority, there are now reckoned to be 78 million Christians in China, with thousands more being added weekly - all this in a country which has systematically oppressed faith groups!

All in all, it was a very special occasion and, thankfully, the sun shone for the duration meaning that the stock of umbrellas which had been assembled were left unused!

Ask Theophilus

Question : Jehovah Witnesses at my door have quoted Revelation 7:4 to prove that we can't be going to heaven when we die because there are only 144,000 redeemed souls there: And I heard the number of the sealed, 144,000, sealed from every tribe of the sons of Israel. Are they right?

Theophilus answers : Of course they're not right. You only have to read two verses on in the same chapter: After this I looked, and behold a great number, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb... (verse 9). A simple principle of understanding any difficult passage in the Bible is to look at the context—the verses before and after it.

The book of Revelation is full of highly pictorial language and lurid images. The reason is that it was written during fierce persecution of the Christians by the Roman Emperor, Domitian, who demanded to be worshipped as a god. Therefore Revelation contains messages to believers facing death if they refused to confess that the emperor was divine; these messages are deliberately written in a kind of code with symbolic numbers and metaphorical scary beasts, so that unbelievers could not use them as evidence in court against those who followed Jesus.

So the number 144,000 is obviously a symbolic number, 12 x 12 x 1000. It stands for the full number of the redeemed, right through from Old Testament days (twelve patriarchs and twelve tribes) to the New Testament church founded by twelve apostles, and that number multiplied by the symbolic number 1000.

It means therefore that heaven will be complete, not one of God's children will be missing.

Stop The Drop

Unnecessary mail that comes through our doors each day is not only a nuisance in terms of its disposal, it's environmentally unfriendly in a number of ways. It costs resources and generates pollution to create the paper and print on it, to transport it to your door, then for you to get rid of it. Recycling is useful, but it's not as good as reducing the production of these unwanted piles of paper in the first place.

A website called Stop the Drop (www.stop-thedrop.org.uk) gives you all the information you need to play your part in eliminating unwanted mail from your life. In summary, they describe 5 easy steps you can take:

Write to the sender - an organisation that receives written indication that you wish to be removed from their mailing list is legally obliged to stop sending you marketing materials, which you may consider to be junk mail, within a reasonable time.

Register with the Mail Preference Service (MPS) – this is a free service and you can register by phone, post or email.

Register with the Your Choice preference service and opt out of the Royal Mail's Door to Door service – again, both are free services and should stop the bulk of unaddressed mail.

Opt out of the edited version of the electoral register – this is the version that companies can buy to send market-ing material.

Use online services rather than the post - as well as being more convenient, some companies also offer financial incentives to swap to receiving bills, notices etc via email.
