



Community Spirit

Now that most of the building work is done in the Community Spirit building we need to thank so many people for putting in so many hours of hard work to get us to this point..... but what now?

As you may already know for some time now the demand upon our Havilah Project has made it impossible for us to continue opening for only three days a week. This has now been rectified through the availability of Community Spirit and the recruitment of new volunteers, allowing the Project to open each day for two and a half hours from Monday to Friday. We continue to offer the same service that we always

have but with our custom-built facility we now provide a room for the Tayside Substance Misuse Nurse and the Living Well Nurse both of whom work from Community Spirit one day a week. We also have an Adult Support Worker from the Drug and Alcohol Team who also works out of the Community Spirit building during the hours Havilah is in operation. All of these workers recognise the benefits of working in partnership with a successful project to help develop their own services.

All of this is, of course, a great work in our community, but Community Spirit was never solely about the development of the Havilah Project - it is about reaching further into our community and providing services where they are needed. This is a really exciting time and it would be easy to get caught up in this excitement, opening up a huge variety of services that are needed and not actually doing any of these particularly well. Therefore, through prayer and consultation, we have decided on three projects to focus on.

Firstly we are taking the next logical step from Havilah

and are to run a group for those who are in recovery from addiction. This is to be a peer led group and we have been working closely with the Drug and Alcohol Team to make this group as successful as possible. This work has resulted in the Drug and Alcohol Team developing a custom-made training programme for the peer mentors which will run until the beginning of next year when we will then be able to start a recovery group from Community Spirit.

We have also been working in partnership with Angus Council's Community Learning and Development Team who are training a number of our volunteers to have them

SQA accredited as ITAL literacy support workers. This is an 80 hour training programme made up of 40 hours theory work and 40 hours practical. Once trained these support workers will then work with those from our community who experience difficulty with their literacy including computer literacy. The literacy work will take place in Community Spirit's IT room which will soon be fully kitted out with the appropriate IT equipment.

The third development is really in response to the fact that younger people have been gathering outside the building in the evening. Therefore, the building will be opened on a Tuesday evening, on a drop-in basis, to see what might come from that.

This is just the beginning of St Andrew's community Spirit developing and growing in new ways and reaching out to those in need in our local community, so please hold these projects in your prayers.

Dear friends,

Following our Communion Service on Sunday 21st October, it was my privilege to visit some of our more senior and much-loved members to share communion with them, in the comfort of their homes. Let's never take that for granted but instead treasure each and every opportunity that comes our way to partake of the bread and wine.

Commitment to the Wider Church

Sometimes, church members make the mistake of thinking that their minister is, literally, 'theirs!' In fact, when a minister is inducted to a congregation, the following is made clear:

- 1) That he or she is being inducted to be minister to the parish, and
- 2) That he or she is required to play a part in the work of the church regionally and nationally.

The reality is that, as the years go by, and as experience is gained, more and more is expected of ministers. Given that some don't pull their weight, those who are willing and ready to take their responsibilities seriously are leaned on fairly heavily.

For our own minister, these responsibilities presently include:

National Church

- ◇ Membership of the Mission & Discipleship Council of the Church of Scotland and, as part of that -
- ◇ Membership of the Faith Expressions sub-group
- ◇ Membership of one other sub-group yet to be agreed
- ◇ Membership of the Heart & Soul Planning Team
- ◇ Work for Ministries Council including: speaking annually at the conference for probationer ministers and

at the conference for students for the ministry

- ◇ Supervising training of student ministers as required
- ◇ Annually, leading review teams for newly-planted churches around the country.

Regional Church

- ◇ Membership of Angus Presbytery involving monthly meetings and, as part of that
- ◇ Convenership of The Mission and Development Committee
- ◇ Membership of the Events Team with lead responsibility for the 'Big Day Out' event
- ◇ Trusteeship of The Duncan Trust with two meetings annually and visits to universities to visit students for the ministry

Parish

- ◇ Chaplaincy to Warddykes PS, Arbroath Academy and occasional involvement, by invitation, at Hayshead PS
- ◇ Membership of the Alcohol & Drug Partnership (ADP) of Angus Council and, as part of that
- ◇ Convenership of the Recovery Sub-group

And that list is just what came quickly to mind - there will be other things over and above! The point is that it's worth bearing in mind that being a minister involved much more than 'serving' a local congregation!

That said, from Martin's point of view, though he is happy to play his part regionally and nationally as he promised to do on the night of his ordination and induction, his first love remains being minister of OUR congregation!

Ask Theophilus

Question :

Last year when we were reading through the Bible, I reached Revelation 13:18 where it says, 'The number of the beast is the number of a man, and his number is 666.' What does this mean? (1 Sam. 11:6; 16:14)?

Theophilus answers :

Over the centuries many answers have been given to this question, but I prefer to ask another question: 'What did this mean to John's readers in the 1st century?'

The numbers 1, 2, 3 etc. had not started to be used. Instead, letters of the alphabet were used: e.g. in Hebrew, aleph = 1, beth = 2, gimel = 3 etc. In Revelation 13:12, the 'beast' probably refers to Caesar Nero who cruelly persecuted the Christians. In 13:11, the second beast probably refers to Domitian who restarted the persecution some years later when John was an old man.

The Greek word for 'beast' is 'therion' and when added up according to the numerical value of the letters in their names both 'therion' and 'Caesar Nero' total 666!

However, there's more to it than that. The number 666 is a trinity of 6 that falls short of the holy Trinity of 777, for in the Bible the number 7 stands for perfection. So by the number 666 John wants us to understand an unholy, unsuccessful trinity of evil, that always violates God's demands and falls far short of his divine character of grace.

By contrast, the Greek name for Jesus—'Iesous'—adds up to 888, a trinity of numbers in which each digit is one more than perfection! The contrast between Nero and Domitian on the one hand and Christ on the other hand, could not be more stark—888 compared to 666! Jesus (888) is beyond reproach, more than meeting the holy demands of the Father; Nero and the beast (both 666) persecuting the church are unholy, evil and without a shred of grace, love or truthfulness.

That's my understanding of the meaning of the number 666!

(1 Sam. 10:6, 10; 11:6; 16:13, 14-16; 18:10; 19:23.)

MALAWI UPDATE

In Thyolo, school has just re-opened after a short break. The kids are all playing football constantly and classes are resuming as usual. The children's vegetable garden has been harvested and the staffs are going to let it have a break for a little while, since there is a water shortage in Thyolo at the moment. The weather is currently very hot and it's tough for anything to grow without lots of watering. So for the next little while, the vegetables will just have to be bought at the local market instead.

The Secondary School pupils are now back to school too and the new form ones are enjoying their new schools. Brian Phiri was especially excited to have started at one of the top schools in the area where we now have 5 pupils. This is very good for the centre as the more we are recognised by the schools, the better it is for pupils from the day-care centre who are selected for the school. Often orphans or pupils from less well off backgrounds are picked on by pupils and teachers at these school and there is a lot of discrimination against them. However as the day-care centre gains more recognition within the schools, Kiri our administrator gains more leverage within the school system and is able to stand up for our pupils.

All the new Secondary school pupils have been kitted out with their new uniforms and shoes and are looking very smart! We have just started a new system where the Secondary school pupils who are boarding at secondary schools in other parts of the district, are given some pocket money- (about £4 per month) This helps them to buy some vegetables from the school cafe (meals are provided but if you want vegetables you have to pay extra) and also to buy soap and toothpaste and any other essentials they need.

Modesta and Lilian our new members of the teaching staff, have been working very hard, teaching from 7am till 5pm with the children, working especially with the standard 8s. Modesta saved some extra money from the teaching budget and bought some exercise books, pens and chalk for the children to use - the chalk for the nursery kids! Lilian has also been helping the children to draw and encouraging them to use their imagination through their art and acting out bible stories with the children. The kids are loving this, especially the boarders, and are really engaging with the bible stories.

Everything is going well at the centre, although the staff are complaining that it's 'too hot'! I tried to explain to Kiri that it's better than the Scottish cold weather, but she was unconvinced! I guess the grass really is always greener on the other side!

Nefarious: Merchant of Souls

On the evening of Friday 19th October, we hosted a screening of the documentary, Nefarious, to which around 65 people came, from our congregation and beyond. This film is concerned with the issue of modern-day slavery, or human trafficking as it now called. As was made abundantly clear, most of this trafficking is related to the sex industry with girls being taken from Eastern European countries like Moldova and then sold into prostitution in western countries, including our own.

The one country which was highlighted as having successfully tackled the problems associated with human trafficking was Sweden. They have changed their laws con-

cerning the 'buying' and 'selling' of sex in such a way as to drastically reduce the demand for prostitution.

The good news is that, Rhoda Grant, MSP, is currently trying to do the same thing in Scotland, through a private member's bill. A consultation is currently under way and if enough support can be gathered, it's possible that the proposed bill will have a chance to become law.

This is the kind of political activity that Christians should be involved in! Buying and selling people, as if they were commodities, cannot EVER be right!

The Great Christmas Tree Debate Real vs Fake – which is the greener?

More than 8 million Christmas trees will be purchased in the UK this Christmas, so choosing the environmentally friendly option on this scale could make a real difference. Real trees are the more eco friendly choice. Although artificial trees may last for many years and save real trees from being cut down in their prime, this is outweighed by the fact that most artificial trees are made from metal and derivatives of PVC. Producing Polyvinyl Chloride (PVC) requires large amounts of energy and also creates by-products (e.g. lead - used to 'stabilise' the PVC) which can be harmful to both the environment and human health. They are not naturally bio-degradable, so they will potentially pollute from landfill sites when discarded. Most artificial trees sold in the U.K. are made in Taiwan and China and so have additional energy costs associated with transport.

Real trees are carbon-neutral - they absorb as much carbon dioxide during growth as they emit when burnt or left to decompose. They are also a wildlife habitat and a naturally renewable resource. But not all real Christmas trees are whiter than white when it comes to the environment. Some are taken from unmanaged woodland and are often cut down in early stages of their growth to meet our demands for a range of home friendly sizes. This can severely disrupt dependent wildlife and many of those that are grown on a commercial scale will have been sprayed

with potentially harmful pesticides and herbicides.

If you want to be really green, you could dispense with the indoor tree altogether and decorate an outside tree or a large houseplant, or even make a DIY structure from branches and twigs. A few fortunate communities in the UK even have access to a live Christmas tree rental service! However, for most of us a traditional Christmas tree is an essential part of the festivities, so here are a few guidelines to help if you want to make this a more eco-friendly choice:

- * If you have the garden space, consider a living tree with roots so you can plant it out in the New Year.
- * When choosing your tree supplier, look for an organic or sustainably-managed producer, and buy a tree that has been grown locally – many trees sold in the UK are from Ireland, Denmark or Norway.
- * Don't use preservative sprays to stop needle fall. Buy one of the varieties that holds its needles for longer, and keep it as cool as possible over the holiday. Trees that have been recently cut down in the UK will hold their needles better than imported varieties cut down weeks before so they can be shipped here in time.
- * Take the tree to the recycling centre in the New Year, or chop it up yourself and put it in your green bin.
- * Consider planting a replacement tree or bush, or make a donation to a reforestation scheme – even better if it's in a developing country, where the schemes supply trees for firewood and also provide local employment.

Heart and Soul 2013

Many of you thoroughly enjoyed the trip to Edinburgh for Heart & Soul 2012, which took place in Princes Street Gardens, Edinburgh, in May earlier this year. The good news is that The Church of Scotland has decided to stage the event again next year, on May 19th 2013. Doubtless, you'll want to get the date in your diary now!

As last year, our own minister has been asked to coordinate

the closing worship and already he is at work to put that together in such a way as to provide a great finale for the days celebration.

2013 marks the 1450th anniversary of Columba coming to Scotland with the Gospel and so the event will have a Celtic theme running through it. While plans are progressing well at this stage, the main hope is that we'll be blessed with another day filled with warmth, sunshine and wonderful Christian spirit!
