As part of her closing remarks, Sheila Dunphy informed the gathering that, in the six years since we started supporting Aquaid in Malawi, our congregation has gifted over £205,000. Please keep up the good work. The issues being faced in Malawi will be with us for some considerable time.

The Early Service

Given that WORSHIP is the most important thing that the Church does, it's right that our calendar contains lots of opportunities for us to gather for worship AND that within that, there are different kinds of worship.

The Sunday 11am service remains our central service and is built around the preaching of God's Word and a blend of music, traditional and contemporary. But over and above that, there is our weekly 6.30pm evening service, which is wholly contemporary in style, and our weekly 10.30am Wednesday service; a forty minute service of praise, prayer and reflection. Oh yes, and on the last Sunday of every month, there's Messy Church for younger families!

Following Easter, we're going to launch a brand new service - which will take place on the first Sunday of every month. Wow! Another service? Yes.

The new service will be different again from what we already offer. With a start time of 9.30am, it will run for some thirty-five minutes and will be wholly traditional in

style. The mood, overall, will be quieter and more reflective than what we are used to. While older children (who are able to sit throughout) will be welcome, there will be no provision for children within the service, and no crèche. The praise will be led exclusively from the organ with the emphasis being on well-loved hymns and traditional prayers. The sermon will be a shortened version of the one that will be preached later at the 11am service. And finally? The minister will be robed!

We hope that this new service will be a welcome addition for those who are more comfortable with the traditional approach. It may also suit those who have a commitment later in the day. Either way, it is our intention to trial this service throughout 2013 and thereafter to assess whether or not it has worked as intended.

We are grateful to the Worship Core Group who have worked on this idea and pray that - ultimately - God will be honoured through the worship offered at St. Andrew's Church, whatever the service and regardless of the style.

Community Spirit

It was in June of last year that we officially opened our new *Community Spirit* building, at 7a Fisheracre. Our intention is that *Community Spirit* will be the centre from which we operate a number of our outreach ministries.

To date, the building has been used primarily to house our *Havilah* project. This has meant that *Havilah* has been able to go to five days a week and to increase its range of activities. And the message is, *so far, so good!* On Monday (21st January) we had over thirty visits to the project – and each one was offered warmth of welcome, a listening ear, non-judgemental compassion... and lunch.

The Gospel makes it clear to us that Jesus spent much of his time among the excluded – the *sinners*. It is good that our congregation takes this commission seriously.

But *Community Spirit* is about much more than *Havilah*. The building belongs to the congregation as a whole. It is no more than an annexe of our main buildings. And so as we go on over the next weeks, months and years, we will be looking for ways to fully utilise the building – so that it really does become a centre of community spirit.

Watch and pray - as Jesus invites his followers to do - that we might see this unfolding according to God's will and timing.

Ask Theophilus

Question:

What does Paul mean by 'coals of fire' in Romans 12:20: If your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him something to drink; for by so doing you will heap burning coals on his head?

Theophilus answers:

This is an excellent question and many answers have been given to it over the past 1600 years!

Going back as far as Augustine (born AD 354), we find him saying: 'Coals of fire, that is, good deeds, should bring those who have hurt us to repentance by grieving them.'

Martin Luther (born 1483) wrote: 'When anyone is converted by love, that person becomes very angry with him-

self for what he has been doing wrong and detests his sin with great vehemence. Therefore, good deeds shown to an enemy are "coals of fire".'

John Calvin (born 1509) agreed with Luther when he wrote: 'The believer's enemy will be stung and tormented by the testimony of his conscience, and so will feel overwhelmed by our kindness.'

Finally, John Stott (born 1921) quotes an ancient Egyptian ritual in which 'a penitent would carry hot coals on his head as evidence of the reality of his repentance'; he suggests that Paul's phrase 'burning coals on his head' was alluding to that custom and therefore meant 'a dynamic symbol of change of mind which takes place as a result of a deed of love'.

Christina (Kiri) and all her team, wanted to wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year and thank-you for all your kind Christmas gifts as well as all your support throughout 2012.

Thanks to your support, the children at Thyolo certainly did have a lovely Christmas! The children loved their sweets and letters, so thanks to everyone for all the effort that was made to make their holidays extra special.

On Christmas day, as per Thyolo tradition, the children all went to church in the morning and then had a Christmas party in the afternoon. The children were treated to rice and chicken with vegetables- a real treat in Malawi! After the meal they were all given a bottle of fizzy juice (coke or fanta) and had some music and dancing. The daycare choir performed and many of the children did some individual songs and dances (Thyolo's got talent style!). They were giving their Christmas presents and they all received clothes. Kiri had also employed a tailor to make all of the children some clothes, like a uniform. The girls all received dresses or skirts and the boys shorts - Malawians love uniforms as it shows that they belong to something! The children all had a lovely time and went home very excited!!

Further news from the centre is that an early Christmas present came in the form of rain! The crops have now had a steady supply of rain, and though these rains are late, they appear to be good so far and the crops are growing well. Please pray that the rains slowly and steadily continue! Also our new teacher, Modesta has announced her engagement to McDonald, an electrician- they are to be married in May/June and we wish them all the best.

Christmas Prayer Chain

A big thank you to all who contributed to making life easier for families in Nigeria, Sri Lanka, Eritrea and Vietnam. Also to those of our young people who shared true stories of persecuted children with the congregation. £95.00 has been sent to Release International who will divide the money between the following causes:

* Medical care and trauma counselling for Nigerian Christians suffering violent physical attacks.

The new classroom building has also got underway - the foundations have already been laid and we are now beginning on the walls, as money allows. This is a very exciting development and much needed to provide for our ever expanding bunch of orphans. It also means that the older children can learn in peace away from the noise of the younger ones which will hopefully allow them to learn better and perform better in their exams, providing them with the best possible chance to work their way out of their poverty.

The children are all back at school now, and working hard again as the countdown begins to the end of year exams. The standard 8s especially have been putting in a lot of studying so please continue to pray for them, that they can do well in their primary school leaving exams.

The lack of maize is really causing hunger in Malawi now but Angus, who is in charge of Aquaid Malawi, sent an email to thank us for all the maize that we sent as a church. It has meant that they have not only been able to ensure that the orphans under their care and their extended families have had food, they have been able to feed the many extra people who have been coming looking for help. I realise that it may seem a long time since you gave to our Maize for Malawi appeal but just to encourage you that it has all made a huge difference and is saving lives!

Ready, Steady, Cook!



Mobile phones, batteries, chargers and accesso-

Over 90% of the materials in mobiles are recyclable and are reused to make new products such as stainless steel, plastic fence posts and even jewellery. One tone of circuit boards can yield about the same amount of precious metals as 110 tonnes of gold ore, 123 tonnes of silver bearing ore and 11 tonnes of copper sulphide ore. Cadmium and nickel can also be recovered from the batteries.

- * avoiding future greenhouse gas emissions
- * saving energy
- * protecting the environment

It unites all Fairtrade supporters, bringing together retailers, manufacturers, producers and consumers.

Farmers in developing countries face a difficult and uncertain future, and they need our support. Smallholders are increasingly hit by fluctuating commodity prices affecting their income and the prices they pay for the food they buy themselves, rising global food prices, rising production costs, and climate change.

As members of a Fairtrade Church, we need to make a stand to ensure small farmers can achieve sustainable livelihoods and play their full role in building fairer, better food Choosing Fairtrade is one way to help secure a better deal for millions of people in developing countries, so make it a priority this month

to take a step further for Fairtrade. Here are three ways you can do this:

- 1. Take a look at the food items you buy on a regular basis and swap to the Fairtrade brand of at least one more of these. Already drink Fairtrade coffee or tea? Add Fairtrade sugar as well. Already buy Fairtrade bananas? Get hold of Fairtrade oranges too.
- 2. Come along to the Fairtrade coffee morning at our church on 2nd March, enjoy a natter and pick up some Fairtrade home baking or a craft item from the Fairtrade

Minute of ASM 2012

(Main text given here to allow approval at 2013 ASM)

Finance Report: The Financial Report was presented by Scott Anderson, leader of the Finance and Administration Core Group. He began by thanking the treasurer, Susan Godsall, for the considerable amount of work required in both transferring the accounts to the electronic format, and in her efficient work involved in her first year in the post. He indicated that the accounts had been scrutinised by the Finance and Administration Core Group, inspected by the professional accountant and then approved by the Kirk Session at its meeting on 1st March 2012.

The accounts are presented in the format required by OSCR and the full version of these was available at the meeting. Because of the complexity of the format required for accounting, a commentary document was issued which, by focusing on the main areas, enabled the lay person to see the salient features of the accounts. (This document is lodged in the Session minute book.)

The opening Statement of Financial Activities provides the overview of all funds and the second section showed the monies within the individual funds. From these, the surplus for 2011 was £13,000 with that of 2010 being £17,500. Key differences in income between 2010 and 2011 showed that the WFO showed an increase, but the income from Gift Aid offerings had decreased as had ordinary and open plate

offerings. Expenditure in 2011 was £10,672 up on that of 2010, although the heating bills were considerably reduced and there was a reduced cost in the payment for an Assistant Minister. The use of the surplus has yet to be decided but may be used to support future staffing requirements.

Scott indicated that further encouragement needs to be given to more people joining the Gift Aid Scheme. He also stressed that although we received a huge legacy -a very large proportion of which has already been spent - it does not absolve us from our commitments to the continued giving of appropriate offerings.

Thanks for a very clear presentation were expressed to Scott.

Moderator's Comments: The Rev Martin Fair spoke of the personal value of his period of sabbatical leave, where he particularly appreciated having his evenings free. He thanked those who had contributed to maintaining the work of the congregation. Looking forward, rather than standing still enables the congregation to continue its mission. He indicated that evidence for this can be seen in that we have given over £100,000 to date for the work in Malawi, the Fisheracre building for Havilah and other outreach work is nearing readiness for use, a Mum and Me Group was successfully launched and there was further development of the Alpha courses. The importance of our three aims of Welcome, Worship and Witness should remain at the forefront of our commitment to St Andrew's Church.

Our Community Services -A Decade On

Ten years ago, St Andrew's and Old & Abbey churches both asked the Church of Scotland for money to help pay for 2 Community Outreach Workers. Work began, and as a result we have a Food Parcel Service based at Old & Abbey and Starter Packs Angus based in the old Ladyloan School, both of which have been running for eight years.

We also have two other organisations that were started as a result of our churches working together with other community organisations: the Furniture Recycling Project Angus (FRPA), founded in 2004 and Angus Credit Union (ACU), which began in 2007. Both are still run largely by people from our two churches.

FRPA collects good quality, unwanted furniture free. If you have something you don't want, call them on 437438, and they will take it away for free! Some of this goes to homeless people who are offered flats by Angus Council and local Housing Associations, but have no furnishings. Without furniture, they cannot take up these offers. Each year, through FRPA we help about 150 households in this way. FRPA is also a great source of affordable furniture for those on low incomes, and by collecting and redistributing unwanted goods it diverts many tonnes each year from Angus landfill. FRPA also offers a carpet cleaning service to Angus households at very reasonable rates.

FRPA provides another community benefit in addition to recycled furniture. It operates with a mix of five employees and fifteen volunteers. Some FRPA volunteers are unemployed and need work experience to get into paid jobs, and some have mental health problems which would make it difficult for them to find paid employment.

ACU provides savings accounts to people who have small and erratic incomes, and who cannot get a normal bank account. It also offers its savers small loans, to tide them over domestic crises (e.g.) the breakdown of a washing machine, or extra Christmas expenses) at 1% per month – a much better rate than they get from doorstep and pay-day lenders! ACU also provides Funny Money workshops in Angus primary schools, teaching children about the wise use of money and the value of saving. ACU has grown to 800 members and is a valued service across Angus.

But both ACU and FRPA could do more. Their services are not as well known as they could be, so they have opened a joint shop in the High Street, where they take bookings and membership applications, answer questions and promote their services. They need volunteers to help staff the shop for one or two hours each week, or to do some leaflet drops in various areas of the town. Please will you help? Both organisations also need to strengthen their Boards of Directors. If you would like to help run either ACU or FRPA, please speak to Andrew. Directors are volunteers, and meet once each month to make strategic decisions about each organisation. There are people in both the Old & Abbey and St Andrew's who have the necessary skills and experience.

Our churches were instrumental in creating these successful community services. Please give some prayerful consideration to how you can help them survive and thrive; by using their services, telling others about them, and perhaps offering some volunteer time.
