# Malawi Update

Hi everyone,

We have several pieces of good news.

Modesta Matthews one of our recently qualified teachers has just received a government commission in a nearby neighbourhood, so will sadly be leaving us. She will return to help out when possible. This suits her as she got engaged last year and is preparing for her wedding in June.

Lilian Lapozo, one of our young high school graduates, who has been helping out with teaching and tutoring, has just recently been selected to teacher training college and so we will also lose her in March, however hopefully she will come back after her 2 year training course.

Christina Kunsauka our administrator who got married in 2011 has just had her first child- a baby girl, called Mirriam weighing 5.5lbs. Mirriam, Kiri and her husband Millward are all well, though Kiri says that she is crying a lot! Kiri was straight back into work after about 2 days! No maternity leave in Malawi! We are very lucky to have such a talented and dedicated administrator.

Our extension project is also taking shape with the new classroom nearly completed. With the loss of one teacher and the imminent loss of another, Kiri has been incredibly proactive and has already organised for two local government teachers to come and help teach in the afternoons to fill that gap. The extension should be finished in mid March this year, once the inside is completed. From Kiri's account 'the window frames are very beautiful, very, very beautiful.' Hopefully the rest is also just as beautiful!

The standard 8 children have been working very hard

and are expected to do well this year. Kiri and her staff are hopeful that many of them can be selected for national secondary schools and do very well. Additionally, the rest of the school have also been working hard both in the garden and at their vocational crafts of sewing, tailoring and knitting. Lilian,has been very good with the children, encouraging them to act out Bible stories and draw, skills that are often neglected in Malawi.

The harvest has been very poor this year with the centre only harvesting 63 bags of poor quality maize compared to the 75 bags last year and the 88 bags the year before. This year much of the harvest has been ruined by too much rain which is still falling even in late February which is very unusual in Malawi. This has caused the price of the maize to increase rapidly and will be very expensive this year. This means that in all probability the hunger season later this year will be even worse than last year, which was considered the worst for several years.

We have two new children added to our centre. A boy-14 years old - Lymon Khembo (Std 8) and a 3 year old girl in the nursery called -Blessings Danken. Please pray that they will settle in well and that the care given to them will help them lots.

Kiri has also asked for prayer for the standard 7s who will next year be sitting their end of primary school exams. She feels that the Standard 7 s are 'a little bit lazy' and may not do well in their exams, pray that they will learn well and work hard. Pray too for the local villagers throughout Malawi who have had their crops decimated by the rains and will struggle to feed their families.

# Waste not, Want not...

What can be done about the evergrowing quantity of rubbish we produce? Rising landfill charges and steeper commodity and energy prices are forcing us to revisit what we've thrown away. The Scottish government has recently commissioned a feasibility study of landfill mining – the first in Britain. Extractive mining is becoming more expensive and less productive - in contrast, landfill is easier to mine, more local to production facilities, and contains a cocktail of useful materials including metals, plastics, and materials that could be burned for energy production. It would also provide a revenue stream for councils and reduce the amount that has to be disposed of - forecasts are that Britain will have used up all its landfill capacity by 2018.

A project in Belgium starts this year which will see a partnership of various businesses process a 16 million tonne land-

fill site over the next 20 years. An estimated 45% of the volume can be recovered for recycling, while rubbish with a calorific value will be burned for power.

This processing of waste already happens in developing countries, in a different form. Many people make a living as pickers on urban dumps, removing every last scrap of usable plastic, metal or fabric. It's a miserable way of life and there's very little to celebrate about it, but what it demonstrates is that our landfill problem is a problem of affluence. Only the affluent can be routinely wasteful - may we not be among them! Let's make every effort to minimize our waste and recycle as much as we can, before our rubbish reaches a landfill. Let's also support by prayer and giving the work of Christian organizations in developing countries who work amongst the poorest of the poor, like the rubbish pickers.

# **Fairtrade Easter Egg Success**

Thank you to everyone who decided to choose an egg with a difference this Easter – altogether St Andrew's folk purchased 60 eggs. They were a delicious chocolate treat, but these eggs have done more than tickle tastebuds:

- 1. They helped to spread the Easter message through the Bible verse on the pack and through the Easter story, activity poster and sticker set inside each pack
- 2. They helped cocoa and sugar farmers in developing countries to earn a fair price for their produce and to get access to international markets
- 3. They helped to provide the Fairtrade premium for these farmers' communities, which they can spend on necessities that we take for granted like access to clean

- water and medical care, schooling for their children, roads and other means of getting their goods to market
- 4. 15p from every egg supported the work of Traidcraft, a Fair Trade company dedicated to helping farmers and craft workers in developing countries to work their way out of poverty. If you don't think that sounds like much, the company that makes these eggs is expecting to donate £20,000 to Traidcraft!
- 5. 12 of the eggs were used as part of St Andrew's Easter outreach to Monarch's Rise, the new housing estate in our parish

It might seem like a simple thing, buying a Fairtrade egg instead of one of the others, but each small action by each one of us builds up into a great force for good. So keep thinking Fairtrade whenever you shop!

We had a most informative evening, learning about Rwanda, which is a very beautiful and luscious country growing pineapples, bananas, tea and coffee. "Comfort Rwanda", one of the Guild Projects this year, is helping to support and build housing. The cost to build a house is £1000.

On Monday 1<sup>st</sup> April we have Look, See and Do - a light hearted night and a bit of fun including a bunny drive.

Our last meeting of the session is on Monday 15<sup>th</sup> April when we have our AGM.

The Guild boxes have been counted for the year and a staggering £950 was raised. We would like to thank everyone who had a box and have given so generously. We would also like to thank Susan Godsall and Bill Marshall who helped with the counting of the money. Anyone who would like a Guild box can collect one in the hall after the Sunday service during the month of April.

# John Wilson - My Story

Some time in April 2008 I came into St Andrews Church, a very broken man addicted to heroin and with my life in one big mess. I was looking for someone to sell drugs to but that day God was looking for me and put two people in my path. These people where filled with compassion and instead of banning me from the drop-in and phoning the police, they offered me help.

That day started a long road of preparation and nudging along with God orchestrating the transformation that my life was going to take. I went to Teen Challenge in November 2008 and began a long road to recovery and working things out in my life. It was there I met with the Lord Jesus in a big way! I had many stumbles and falls along the way and many attempts at trying to complete the programme. I finally graduated in 2010 and felt a strong calling upon my life. I knew with all my heart that I was to tell people about Jesus and it was the people-group that society often forgets about - my kind of people! addicts, prisoners, homeless people, broken people - that I was to work alongside.

I went to Teen Challenge School of Ministry in Wales for six months and in that time I was trained in evangelism and learned how to communicate the gospel in a simple but effective way. God blessed me with some great opportunities of preaching the gospel, doing outreach, doing rehab training, speaking in young offenders prisons, mission trips both in this country and overseas. Whilst there I said that I would aim to do one overseas mission a year and in 2012 I went over to Montenegro with a team from the church in Aberdeen.

In the period that followed, I tried several things - including starting my own business - but my sense was that these ventures were not really what God had in mind for me

By this time, I had met my girlfriend, a great women of God and she was running a women's project in Rotherham. I would visit and she would take me to the sister project called Lighthouse Homes, a 16-bed homelessness project, a kind of half-way house between rehab and a hostel; a place of change. After a long time of prayer and fasting, I decided to apply for a post as senior support worker and prison liaison worker at Lighthouse. I must say I felt well out of my depth as I read the job description, but God doesn't call the qualified, *he qualifies the called!* 

I started in Rotherham in August 2012. I work with homeless people on a daily basis and go into prison every week to meet with prisoners and take the message of hope to them. I also offer pastoral care to around twenty guys and oversee the home moves that we have in and around Rotherham. Psalm 37 v 4 says, 'Delight in the lord and he will give you your hearts desires.' This scripture has come to pass so many times in my life but recently God reminded me of this as he once again gave me my hearts desires.

Since I was a wee boy, I have always wanted to go out to Africa but without ever knowing why. A few weeks ago, my pastor announced that our church was going to start supporting a church-planting ministry in Freetown, Sierra Leon. My pastor asked me if I wanted to go out there in May with him and his wife to meet the pastors and teachers and to see what work we are going to do when we send a team out later in the year and to help with some preaching at crusades. I said I would love to go but I was speaking out in faith as I couldn't afford the thousand pounds at that short of notice! I started to pray: 'God, if you want me out there then you need to make a way for me!'

I mentioned to one of our volunteers about the conversation I had with my pastor and asked her to pray about it. I couldn't believe her response! It turned out that she had been left a bit of money and had been asking God what to do with it. She felt strongly that it was to be used for mission but wasn't able to undertake such a mission herself. She had been praying for conformation and a sign that the money was to be used in mission and here I was sharing my heart about this work in Africa!

Needless to say she felt that she was to pay for my flights and I have been commissioned to go on this ten day trip. We fly out May 18<sup>th</sup>.

Day by day, I sense that God has been good to me. You see five years ago I was begging on the streets of Edinburgh; robbing and stealing with no hope or future. Today I am doing a job I love, living a life free from any kind of addiction and walking in freedom. People ask me if I would change my past I somehow I could turn back time? My answer is to say, 'No!' I have learnt some real-life lessons and God uses it today for his glory and to give other people from the same type of background hope for their lives. And it all started the day I walked in to *Havilah* at St. Andrew's Church, Arbroath.

## **Book Review**


# Cross Roads by Wm Paul Young




These corporate events provide very useful income but, best of all, and just as with other events like the Hayshead service, more and more folks are crossing the threshold of our church and appreciating its value in the community.
