Maize for Malawi

As last year, our Harvest Thanksgiving gift-offering this year took the form of monetary gifts for maize to be bought for the centres we support in Malawi. Your support for this project was, as always, more than generous. We have learned as a congregation that the giving required of us as Christians is of a sacrificial nature – not just the scraps and left-overs. The total raised for this particular cause was £3,259 (inc. gift aid.)

Again, we need to remind ourselves that this is not 'extra' or in some sense a 'luxury' item. On the contrary, for most rural Malawians, maize is all that they have to eat. For many of them, harvesting enough maize to feed their families for the whole year is not possible. Therefore, our Harvest giving really will make the difference again this year – ensuring that families can survive.

Christians believe in life after death. But so too we believe in LIFE BEFORE DEATH and that all of the people of the world should have that opportunity!

Ask Theophilus

Ouestion:

The dictionary says 'atonement' means 'to make amends'. Is that what it means in the Bible?

Theophilus answers:

The original meaning of 'to atone' was 'to cover'. In the Old Testament, 'the atonement' was the name of the lid on top of the ark of the covenant, the sacred casket which contained the stone tablets on which were chiselled the Ten Commandments. It was kept in the Holy of Holies in the Tent of Meeting, and then later in the Temple. Those commandments reminded worshippers of the sins they had committed, but 'the atonement' (the 'cover') covered their sins. On 'Yom Kippur', the annual Jewish 'Day of Atonement', the High Priest sprinkled blood from the Passover Lamb on the 'cover' to symbolize that through the Lamb's sacrifice, sins had been 'covered' or atoned for.

Some of you knew a minister of the old Original Session

Church in Arbroath, the Revd Donald Cox. When his son was only 3 years old, one morning he climbed on to the bonnet of his father's car parked on the gravel outside the manse front door, and there he made a race-track for his dinky cars with chuckies from the gravel and had a great time playing. But the bonnet of the (almost new) car was very scratched.

When Donald arrived home he was—to put it mildly—extremely annoyed. Very few people had cars in those days and his modest little vehicle was a prized possession. His son was 'in the dog house', as we say. But Mrs Cox took the car to a body spray shop down the road, and two days later the job was done: the bonnet was re-sprayed and as good as new. The damage had been 'covered'! In other words, 'atonement' had been made. Donald's anger with his three-year-old toddler was gone. All was forgiven.

The good news of the gospel is that through the sacrifice of our Passover Lamb Jesus, atonement is made for all our shortcomings and foolish sins. As God sees us, we are spotless—even more so than the re-sprayed bonnet of Donald's

An 'every day of the week' Church

For those of you who are not used to being around our church buildings, or who are usually only there on Sundays, you'd probably be surprised by the level of activity that takes place. Indeed, more often than not, our church buildings are in use — whether by our own groups and organisations or by outside agencies.

In all of this, we see St. Andrew's Church giving expression to the first part of our three-fold purpose statement: Welcome – Worship – Witness. First and foremost, we have a lovely suite of buildings but they are not 'ours' in a possessive sense. Rather, we hold them in trust that through them we might serve the wider community. Hospitality is required of us in the living out of our faith and so at all times we try to ensure that our buildings are clean and neat and tidy and, even more importantly, that those who are

coming in from outside our church family experience a warmth of welcome that will be truly noteworthy.

To this end, our Fellowship Core Group – and its catering team headed up by Doris – and our Events Team are the ones charged with making sure that the **welcome** works well. And the great news is that it works! Time and again, we receive positive feedback from people who find themselves in our buildings – comments not just about the facilities but about the wonderful hospitality of our teams.

No one gets paid to do this. As with most of what happens around the church, we rely on willing and able volunteers. But this for sure: we hugely appreciate their efforts and don't in any way take their service for granted.

When you add to this the fact that some £10,000 comes in annually from outside agencies using our buildings you begin to see how important a form of ministry it is. We do it in loving service, not as a means of generating income. But in the current climate, we all need to be realistic and to appreciate that every penny counts.

Praying Together

In his teaching, Jesus makes it clear that there are times when praying should be done privately. But this is not to say that prayer should only take place in private! Elsewhere in the New Testament, it becomes obvious to us that the early Christians met to pray together on a very regular basis

There are various opportunities for people to pray together at St. Andrew's but the principal one is on Thursday evenings from 7 till 8pm. Those who gather for this prayer time have come to value it enormously. Apart from anything else, it is a huge privilege to be able to pray with others! Usually, we pray in the following ways:

- We pray for members of the church and others known to us who are ill or who have been bereaved
- We pray for the life of our congregation; for our many ministries and activities, for our staff members and for our mission to the wider world
- We pray for the world-wide Church, focussing especially on those parts of the church which suffer persecution
- We pray for our town, for the practical issues facing it on a week-to-week basis

- We pray for our nation; Scotland and the whole of the UK. Under this heading, we've been praying, for example, for economic upturn and for politicians and local councillors.
- We pray for the world at large, according to what needs arise in any given week.

Of course, no one NEEDS to come to such a meeting. You can pray on your own, covering the same topics as listed above. Indeed the prayer topics are posted on our website (most) Thursday evenings making it possible for any of us to pray at home if we can't come to the group. But coming to such a group time instils a certain discipline meaning that our prayer life isn't subject to trying by ourselves to remember!

Sometimes people worry about praying in a group, fearing that their prayers wouldn't be as eloquent as those of other people or that they'd become tongue-tied. The good news is that no-one has to pray out loud but most find that after a little while they find themselves wanting to pray audibly and becoming more confident in doing so.

There really is nothing more important than that a church is alive in prayer.

With all of this in mind, our evening worship times throughout the remainder of this session will focus on PRAYER. Is it time for you to come alive in prayer?

Clerk's Corner

'To see ourselves as others see us'

Sometimes this can be an uncomfortable experience, but there have been several occasions in the last weeks when we could be forgiven for feeling very proud of some of the things that we do at St Andrew's. While boasting is not an attractive trait, it is very important for human beings to know that they are appreciated and that they are contributing successfully. What follows shows some of the areas where we can be justifiably proud of the impressions we give to others who visit us or read about us.

We have had visits from two churches, who on seeing the photos on the walls of the Leadership Group, Ministry Team, Home Group leaders and others, have been very keen to find out how we set about forming all our current structures. Some of the paper work that was involved in this has been sent to them and it is good to see the replies received which indicate their admiration for the amount of work that has gone into the setting up of all the groups. They are particularly impressed by the fact that such a major part of this is undertaken by volunteers and want to know how you have been persuaded to undertake so much work!

A meeting of the Session Clerks in the Presbytery was a lively one and very useful in enabling information on different practices to be shared. As we are one of the few congregations who do not have elders' districts as such, much interest was shown in how we manage to communicate with and pastorally care for our members. Details were provided of how our Contact Team visits each household every month and how information gathered then gets acted upon by the Pastoral Care Team. Again, it was clear that a large number of volunteers is required for this.

Volunteers are a major part of the outreach work which has recently been reported very well in the press and also in Life and Work and initiatives in work with children have also received publicity.

This past month has been busy with our premises being used by outside agencies and it will be good to report to you after the end of the year the financial success of this. Four years after the refurbishment there is still a very strong feel-good factor when visitors admire the beauty if the sanctuary and comment on what a wonderful venue our premises make for a wide range of events. We are already seeing many repeat visits from groups who continue to be impressed by the care and attention to detail we offer. The catering comes in for very high praise and the volunteers who do this work are frequently on duty for many hours at a time.

You will see that the common factor in the above is the marvellous work carried out by volunteers – the work is so enriched by the hours you give unconditionally to further the work and witness of St Andrew's Church both locally and globally. May you be blessed in the work you do.

It will be carrying about 387 boxes containing things from clothes, shoes, toys, books, bedding, blankets, wool, material, tools, knitting and sewing machines, guitars, bikes, blackboards, tables, chairs, football kits and boots, wheelchairs and body boards to a table tennis table and some solar panels.

Thanks to all who have donated goods and to those who sponsored the transport -2 of the Managers from Ocean Rig, Soutar Foundation and Gannochy. Thanks to the squad of marines who are coming along to help us load the

container on the 30th and to all who have helped pack boxes - especially the squad who came along after the container leaked. Our thanks also goes to Ally Leuchars and Forfar Removals for all the packing boxes that they have donated and for their help in moving so many boxes out to the Skeas earlier this year

Our final thanks goes to Angus Council for allowing us space to store boxes for so long and especially to the Skea family who stepped in at such short notice to allow us to move all those boxes out to them and virtually take over their premises!

Lets all pray now that everything gets there safely and that there is not too much red tape for us to cut through when the container gets to Malawi!
