Home and Away Outreach

As most of you know our **Havilah** ministry has been running for just over eight years now and although we now employ two staff members, we operate mainly with a dedicated team of volunteers, twenty-two in total and a faithful group of volunteer soup makers beyond that.

At the beginning of September we found out that we had been nominated for The Queens Award for Voluntary Service (the nomination coming from Mr Andrew Welsh, retired MSP, and the lady Lord Lieutenant of Angus) for our service to our community. As you can imagine we are all delighted by this but also very humbled at the same time to be thought worthy of such an award. One of the items that was needed for the nomination was a letter from someone that had benefitted from Havilah. We asked John Wilson. This is what he had to say:

Dear friends, October 2014

What's the point in Christian faith that doesn't connect with real life? What's the point in Christian faith that doesn't address the real issues that people face? The answer is that there's no point. Jesus was never 'other wordly;' his feet were very much on the ground and he met people where they were, regardless of where that was. And he met people at their point of greatest need. The woman caught in adultery, about to be stoned? Jesus met her in that moment. The leper, the blind man, the official whose daughter was dying, the tax collector, the prostitute AND EVERYONE ELSE - he met them where they were! That's why St. Andrew's Church involves itself in real life and seeks to connect with people in all walks of life, in every situation.

There's an area, however, that has been much neglected - by almost all churches - and it's the area of mental illness. We've been embarrassed, perhaps, to talk about it. There is still a considerable amount of stigma attached to those who suffer from poor me to health - and at times, precious little understanding or empathy. We know how to respond when someone is suffering from a physical illness. We're not nearly so sure what to do when the condition is mental.

I'm pleased to say that we're beginning to see some signs that things are changing. Recently, all secondary school chaplains were invited to a conference on health and well-being, the point of which was to further inform and prepare us for working in school and further education settings where mental health problems are in play. And they are - all too frequently. Suicides in Scotland, which mostly occur among young males, run way above the UK average and the suicide rate among people with a DD11 postcode continues to make clear that this - always tragic - problem is very prevalent on our doorstep.

With that in mind, our Nurture Core Group, which our Associate Minister, Stuart, leads, is putting on a conference which is being designed to raise awareness about the difficult subject of self harm - an issue which mostly affects younger people. The evening is open to teachers and professionals but, most especially, it is for parents, grandparents and carers. Quite simply, none of us knows when we might find ourselves having to face this issue with someone we love. The evening is being run in conjunction with NHS Tayside, Angus Mental Health and the Scottish Association for Mental Health (SAMH.) All of these key agencies were delighted that the Church was getting involved and taking this initiative.

These things might be considered as 'first steps.' We can't say for sure where we'll end up but there's no denying that the problems caused by mental illness are real and that, at one time or another, almost every family will be affected in one way or another.

Please take some time after you've finished reading this article to pray for some people who suffer from mental illness and for our Church as we edge forward in developing a Christ-like, compassionate response to the issue here in Arbroath.

A neighbour, a family member, a colleague; there are lots of people who, I am sure, would be keen to better understand how this can affect young people and how they can respond appropriately.

And so I make not only an invitation, but also encouragement, to think about who you might invite.

Ask Theophilus

Question:

When I asked the question about the word 'justification', I didn't realize that in the Bible this word was the same as 'righteous/righteousness'. You finished last time on an unhappy note: 'There are various points at which we all fail in one or another of our relationships. So not one of us is always, without fail, righteous!' Please, something now about 'justification' (my original question).

Theophilus answers:

Here is an illustration about justification. It's not a very good one and raises some questions, but it serves a purpose. Because in the Bible both 'righteousness' and 'justification' are very often used in a legal sense, my story is about a law court.

A judge has before him a convicted criminal. The young man of no fixed address, but self-evidently from a good home, has been in court several times. First for theft, then for drug-dealing, then for heavy debts. But now he has been found guilty of attempted bank robbery, using a replica weapon. A most serious crime!

A custodial sentence of up to twelve years is possible. But the judge does have powers to impose a fine with retribution payments to the traumatized bank staff whose branch the foolish youth tried to rob. The court gasps as the judge imposes the heaviest fine and/or prison sentence, allowed by the law: £20,000 or twelve years in prison. Clearly, the bankrupt young man will be a long time behind bars!

But, having pronounced sentence, the judge removed his gown and wig, descended from his throne, approached the court clerk and handed over a cheque for £20,000. He then turned to the youth in the dock, stretched out his arms, and said, 'My son, your debt is paid, come home. Mother and I long to have you back with us again.'

The judge has righteously justified his errant son. That is, faithful to the law, he has paid the debt, and he has opened the way for the son to be restored to his family relationships. As Paul boldly declares —this is the scandal of the gospel—through Christ's sacrifice God 'justifies the ungodly' (Rom.4:5)

I would like to share my experience of the support I received at the Havilah Project in Arbroath in 2008 and continue to receive now some six years on.

For many years my life was in a mess due to drug addiction and I had given up hope. Not only that, my family, friends and society had given up on me. I found myself in a very dark, lonely place trying to work out what life was all about and where I had gone wrong to end up in the place I was in. Due to my drug addiction I ended up in prison several times, sleeping on streets and at one point eating out of bins. I had reached the lowest point a man possibly could get to. I was left feeling suicidal. One day in 2008 after being released from prison I was told about the Havilah Project. I heard that it was a place you could go to for some food and support and that it was run by Christians. I remember the day as if it was yesterday, when I took the first step into that Project. I was met by a man who showed me nothing but love and care. He never judged me for looking like death warmed up or smelling a bit and didn't look at me like I was an outcast due to my life problems.

That day was the start of something special. The volunteers started speaking to me, loving me and offering help and a solution to my situation. To be honest I was overwhelmed at the support they gave me. The staff started walking step by step with me on a journey that was going to be difficult for us all as I wasn't the easiest guy to work with, but the one thing that stuck out to me was that no matter how hard I tried to run or give up, the volunteers at Havilah never gave up on me. They were always there supporting me, phoning me to encourage me, helping make sure I made it to appointments. They became like a family to me. The team at Havilah got me away to residential rehab at Christmas 2008 and although I was out of sight I was never out of the minds of the volunteers. They would come and visit me, they would make sure I had everything I needed and give me phone calls to continue encouraging me. I remember a time I decided to leave rehab and I ended up living back on the streets of Edinburgh, begging and living in horrendous conditions, I was tracked down by Jim and Tracey, the leaders of the Project. They had travelled

all the way down to find me just to say they had not given up hope in me and were going to help me get my life sorted out no matter how long it took. That act of commitment will always stick with me for the rest of my life.

The Havilah volunteers not only helped and supported me in my recovery but they then started engaging with my family to help restore the broken relationships with them and myself and offering them help and support in their time of difficulty as they watched their son basically kill himself on drugs.

After the visit of Jim and Tracey I did go back to rehab and I finally completed that programme in 2010. Since then I have remained drug free and have done some amazing things in my life. I have travelled to the Czech Republic, Montenegro and Sierra Leone on mission trips working with drug addicts, the homeless and refugees. I am currently working as the Assistant Manager for a homeless organisation, working with ex offenders, people stuck in addiction and the homeless. I head up a prison ministry going into prisons offering people the same help and support I received from the Havilah staff and I also head up a homeless feeding programme in my local church similar to what Havilah does.

I am looking forward to getting married at the start of November 2014 to an amazing woman and Jim, the guy who met me at the front door of Havilah in 2008 is my best man

To this day the Havilah staff continue to help and support me, they have become the best friends I could ever ask for. Without the help and support I received from the Havilah Project I have no doubt in my mind I would have ended up dead living the way I was, but that one act of kindness, love and acceptance for who I was made me realise what life was all about and gave me the hope I had been looking for. They helped me become the man I am today and for that I will be forever grateful.

In my eyes the work that the Havilah Project does in the small town of Arbroath is life saving, not only to the individuals they come into contact with but the service user's families too.

We also played games with the children, taking them out a parachute and teaching them all sorts of games to play with it. A specific inter-Aquaid sports tournament was held but unfortunately the older Aquaid boarders at the main centre beat our young Thyolo boarders. The Thyolo crew really enjoyed themselves though and they were especially excited to try ice cream for the first time on their way home.

A meeting was held with all the staff, where all the happenings at the centre were discussed. These highlighted some issues and many great ideas were brought forward to the table. We are so lucky with the team of dedicated staff we have both at Thyolo and Kambilonjo - people who really care for our children and love them as their own children. We realised that we also need to support the staff as, although they are making a good living by Malawian standards, they are still very poor and a long way from the standard of living that we ourselves enjoy. We were able to chat to them and show our appreciation of their hard work.

Going forward at Thyolo we plan to build some staff accommodation so that our staff can be properly housed in decent housing. This will take time so we are looking at other short-term ways of giving them decent housing in the meantime. We are also looking to further the work of our extra classroom, which is currently being used for tutoring in the mornings and extra lessons in the afternoons. We have also arranged for vocational training in carpentry, tinsmith, sewing and knitting to be undertaken.

Kambilonjo:

At Kambilonjo we have seen major improvements in the last year since the introduction of our new house parents Charles and Memory Lundu. This couple have been incredible. They are very loving with the children, yet bring them good discipline and the house functions like clockwork with all the children being very happy. The children are given the best medical care, especially as some of the boarders have extra medical needs. Furthermore, they have managed to get the whole community on board and now the guardians and families from around are helping in the gardens which has allowed us to plant and harvest a bumper crop, far more than the requirements of the centre. This will allow us to give much of this maize back as relief to the surrounding villagers, many of whom are very poor themselves.

Here we also met individually with the children and took them on a safari trip (involving a raging elephant which scared the life out of the children and monkeys who were stealing the picnic!) Many of these children had never been out of their village before so to travel to see elephants, hippos, crocodiles, monkeys and many many antelopes was very exciting for them - they didn't sleep the whole night before!

At Kambilonjo we were more involved in the letter writing to all the sponsors (most of these children's English is much poorer as the standard of education here is low- so the

letters were written and then translated for your benefit!). I was involved in the translating of one letter which described the young girl's joy at her parcel. She thanked her sponsor for making her feel important and for bringing her up in the world. She noted that she couldn't believe how lucky she had been-she had received a hat, Frisbee, pens, stickers AND sweets! Her sponsor must really love her! This girl is new to the centre and the sponsorship programme is also in its infancy at Kamibilonjo. This just shows the incredible gratitude of the children for everything that you are doing for them! It was a privilege to witness it! Thank-you!

Again we met with the staff and identified many difficulties that our staff face daily and have addressed these. We also noted that there was an extreme lack of healthcare in the area with the nearest clinic a full 2 hour walk away, and this clinic is private and very expensive (one villager had to sell all his pigs to get his wife out of the hospital after a difficult birth). We therefore met with local chiefs to discuss plans for a healthcare clinic, with the thought that we would fund the building and running of this, with children not paying for the service and adults paying a minor charge (to cover the cost of any medication they use) in order to make it as sustainable as possible. This is a major undertaking as clinics and medicine are so expensive and difficult to run in Malawi, but one that is badly needed in the area. The local chiefs have agreed to supply half of the bricks needed for this endeavour, free of charge and will supply the workers required to construct the clinic. We have also arranged a land swap and bought the land next to the centre where we will be able to build this clinic.

Going forward at Kambilonjo, we will be constructing and beginning a clinic next to our centre with hopefully a progression involving an ambulance service to the nearest hospital which is just over an hour's drive away on a very bumpy road. We have also planned the building of a second classroom, much like at Thyolo where the older students can go for peaceful studying and further lessons. This will also include a library and a teacher's office. We are also planning on building a workshop for vocational training with teachers coming in to teach skills both to our students and the surrounding villagers as the drop-out rate from school is very high and the education level is extremely low

At both centres we also have tutors who are previous students who have finished their secondary school education and are awaiting their results and the chance to go onto further study. We have sent a young person each year for the last 2 years to each centre to help with one to one tuition and also give them some useful employment while they await their results.

This year we have sent a further 2 to each centre. One of those posted to Kambilonjo is my sponsor child Jean Maluwa who I have supported since she was at Primary School. I am so proud of her to have achieved so much and worked so hard and hopefully she will have done well enough in her exams to pursue her career in Accountancy! There's a testament to the work of the St Andrew's Church sponsorship scheme!
