We have already begun a job club for folks who now need to search online for employment and plan to offer various learning opportunities, from helping those who are completely computer illiterate through to helping folks develop the IT skills they already have.

This is a fantastic facility and a great opportunity for St Andrew's Church to further develop its work in the local community, taking Jesus' love out on our own doorstep.

Dear friends,

Most ministers will tell you that celebrating a service of communion is among their highest privileges, and I am no different.

But every so often there's a communion that takes on real – or added - significance. Such was the evening communion that we shared on 19th October. It wasn't that the church was packed to capacity; the attendance was only moderate. But that God was fully present to us was not in doubt. Of course he always is!! But there are times when we are more open to his presence.

But beyond any of that, what made it extra special to me was the way in which people approached the communion table. There seemed to me to be a heightened sense of humility. None of us is worthy and it was apparent that the worshippers were feeling that. And yet they came – because being worthy is never what it's about. It's always about the loving invitation of a loving God. Jesus clears the way for us; he opens the door.

There was one person in particular – his coming to the table was very moving to me. In a way that I've never quite known before, his taking of communion reminded me of the parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector that Jesus tells in Luke c18. His eyes were lowered but, when raised to meet mine, I saw only shame and a sense of 'I don't deserve to be here'. That would have been enough. But he spoke to me about how wretched he felt. He described himself as the lowest of the low. And these were no idle words; he meant them, intensely so.

And then he took bread and wine and asked to be prayed for. If there was anyone who went home justified that evening, it was this man. Read Luke c18:9-14 to see what this is all about.

Here's someone who came to us through the outreach that is our Havilah ministry. Let's pray that in the fullness of time we'll see a life transformed. Just like that of John Wilson, whose story was in QUEST last month and who, by the time you're reading this, will be a married man – his life right on track!

Yes, there are times when I wouldn't swap being a minister for anything else in the world!

Use your phone to help you pray!

If you're someone who keeps lists of people and issues to remember in prayer, and you use a smartphone, you may find PrayerMate a useful app to download and use. It's free and is available for both iPhones and Android phones.

It has a great set of features that are easy to learn how to use:

You can set up your own personal categories and subjects, and you can add details of what you want to pray for. Each time you use PrayerMate, it will present you with a set of index cards drawn from your categories and subjects, and you swipe between them to choose which to pray for. You can schedule prayer requests for a particular day/time or for a set period, e.g. leading up to an event you want to

pray for.

You can enter subjects manually or import them from your address book, and you can link PrayerMate to your address book so that you can send people a quick text or email when you pray for them – perhaps a word of encouragement, or to ask for an update on their situation. As well as storing prayer lists, you can also use it to build a personal library of prayers you find inspirational.

As extra help to pray regularly, you can optionally set PrayerMate with an alarm to remind you to pray once a day. You can export and import data between PrayerMate and Dropbox, so that everything you put into PrayerMate is backed up if anything happens to your phone.

Using PrayerMate is a great way of making prayerful use of waiting times, as well as being a helpful aid during your regular prayer times. I highly recommend it!

Ask Theophilus

Question :

Your last sentence in your last article seemed to me rather strange: 'As Paul boldly declares—this is the scandal of the gospel—through Christ's sacrifice God 'justifies the ungodly' (Rom.4:5). Can you explain this 'scandal of the gospel', please.

Theophilus answers :

Okay, some more from this huge subject of 'justification' and 'righteousness' (both words are from the same root in the OT Hebrew and the NT Greek). The scholars speak about God's righteousness under three headings. I'll give you the Latin phrases of each.

The first is *Justitia Activa* which means 'God's active righteousness'. The Bible clearly teaches that all God's judgments are right, and therefore that all he does is right. Whole books have been written on this. Lots of questions arise, but in a short article like this, I have to ask you to

accept that is what our Bibles teach.

The second heading is *Justitia Passiva* which means 'God, in and of himself, is always, unfailingly, right and just and true'. Righteousness, justice and truth are part of his very Being. In himself he embodies and defines righteousness, justice and truth. Indeed, none of these could exist without him. What each of us knows and feels about them we only know and feel because we are created in his image.

The third heading is *Justitia Donata* which means 'God imparts the status of righteousness to those who genuinely have faith in him'. He does this through his Son, Jesus, because, in some mysterious way through his sacrificial death, God 'justifies the ungodly'. It was this doctrine that caused the reformers in the 16th century to break away from the Roman Catholic Church. The tragedy is that if that same divisive controversy had taken place today, there would have been no massive division into 'Protestant' and 'Catholic' because after nearly 500 years the disagreement has been sorted out!

Clerk's Corner

Health and Safety Policy

Every church is required to have a Health and Safety Policy, and while many of the aspects of this refer to the safety of employees, there is a duty of care expected to be extended to members of the congregation and all who use the building. This policy statement is currently displayed in the office.

Many of the sections of the overall recommendations issued recently by the central church come under the remit of the Fabric Core Group who will be studying this in more detail at their next meeting.

A major part of the documentation is the Fire Safety Guide and it is good to know

that we are really up-to-date with this in terms of ensuring that welcome groups stewards etc. know what to do in an emergency and all electrical equipment is tested regularly. In addition, the alarms are checked on a regular basis and risk assessments are carried out. It is important that organisations which let our building are aware of all the procedures and they receive documentation regarding this when a booking is made.

Other areas being assessed are Food Hygiene, the safety of those who carry out maintenance work within the building and the reporting of accidents. In relation to the last-mentioned, there is now an Accident Book for reporting accidents located in the servery area.

More detail on this subject will appear in a later edition of Quest.

Malawi Update

After three years I finally made it back to Malawi this July, albeit for a short two and a half weeks. With Naomi, I filled every day with visits to old friends, time in Namisu and three days at each of St Andrew's two centres.

At Namisu village I was welcomed by children I had watched growing up since 2007. Seeing them move up primary school or moving on to secondary school, I could see the positive work Namisu is doing in the lives of these young people. Many of the teenagers I met on my first trip are now into vocational training or making important decisions about the chosen career routes. It is exciting seeing them move on to this stage of their lives.

A highlight since their openings is always the visits to Thyolo and Kambilonjo. At both I was greeted with the usual lively singing and dancing. No matter how many times you visit Africa you never get bored of listening to the songs the children present. I quickly got my 'African rhythm' back and was joining in with a rather more untuneful version! At each centre, we had a little party with the resident children which involved colouring in and bingo.

Thyolo continues to thrive. I was shown round the new building work including the new classroom and everyone talked excitedly about the future plans for the centre. It was great to see Christina (Kiri) again and

see that her enthusiasm for the centre is still there in abundance. I got to play with the kids, the highlight being a big game of football. It really is a happy place, the result of which Naomi had to drag me away, kicking and screaming, at the end of our time there.

At Kambilonjo, a couple of days later, I was able to see a lot of the positive changes the Dunphys have reported on since the new house parents had arrived. The centre is in good condition and the residence is working like clockwork. The kids were as excited as ever to have visitors and we delivered new toys and blew giant bubbles for them to chase. Again I was given an insight into the plans for the centre, a highlight being the planned medical centre which will be a huge addition to the care of the children in this area. The relationship with the village has massively improved with a committee now available for the centre to call upon if help is needed in the gardens etc. Seeing the wider community taking pride in what the centre is doing is an exciting change.

From what I saw during my visit, Aquaid, and more specifically St. Andrew's Church money continues to get to the places of most need. The centres we are funding are taking massive steps forward, creating projects specific to the centre and developing opportunities for the children to get the best chance in life. Although it had been three years since my last visit, it was like I had never been away, with Malawi a second home. Let's hope it is not three years till my next visit.
