SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE

Dear friends,

A fellow minister was telling me recently that he had been leading a service at which a large proportion of the congregation was made up of people with no church background whatsoever. Trying to help them out, he had been offering plenty of instruction as to the different parts of the service. And so it was that he had said to them, 'Now we're going to put our hands together for the Lord's Prayer,' at which many of the visitors broke into a round of applause!!

It's a funny story but one which should make us sit up and take note. As a nation, we've come a long way from that time when almost everyone would have had some familiarity at least with the ins and outs of a church service. Never mind the children; we're seeing parents and grandparents who have hardly a notion of what goes on within a Church!

But this is not a time for bemoaning such a state of affairs or for harking back to the 'good old days' (whenever that was!) Things might not be what they used to be but they are what they are. Like it or not, there's no escaping the reality of where we're at.

What is required of us is that we accept that we are operating in a mission field. One hundred and fifty years ago, you had to go overseas to find a mission field - to find people who had no idea of the niceties of Christian worship or of the tenets of the faith. Now, you can find such a situation right outside your door!

In mid-June, I attended a four day summer school, entitled 'Going for Growth.' The conference speakers, gathered from across the UK, were the leading lights in 21st Century thinking on mission. George Lings, from Sheffield, for example, has done more than anyone else to document and analyse the changes in British society and, in particular, the changing role of the church. Phil Potter is a Church of England vicar from Liverpool who has spent the last ten years developing new patterns of church designed specifically to engage with that great majority of our fellow citizens who have no dealings with 'normal' church. And he's done so with considerable success. Indeed across the Church of England, there are now hundreds of so-called 'fresh expressions' of church - new models of church, entirely devoted to reaching people with the Good News. It is reckoned that five such 'fresh expressions' are being launched every week. And while many traditional churches are declining or being closed, many of these fresh expressions are seeing growth - among people who had stopped coming to church and among people who had never previously been to church.

The churches in Scotland are lagging behind but the good news is that the catch-up process is now well underway. For congregations like St. Andrew's, which are doing reasonably well, this is not going to mean the closing of our church or even the drastic re-inventing of our church. But it will mean that we'll need to think very seriously about the launching of new models of church to run parallel to our ongoing church. Try as hard as we might, the reality is that we're simply not going to engage with most of those who don't come near church by the means of our 11am Sunday service. Brand new kinds of churches are going to be called for - models of church that will leave many of us saying to ourselves, 'Well it wasn't like that in my day!'

It's time for mission. It's time that we got 'going for growth.' The alternative is nothing less than the slow and painful death of the church across the nation. None of us wants that. It's time for mission.

Ask Theophilus

Question :

There's a parable Jesus told that puzzles me. It's in Luke 16:1-8. There Jesus appears to be commending a manager who cheated his boss. What on earth does it mean?

Theophilus answers :

Good question! The point about the dishonest manager was that when he realized he was about to be made redundant, he feathered his nest by reducing the various amounts of money his boss's many creditors owed. His intention, clearly stated, was that when he lost his job he would have friends who might then help him out—they now 'owed him one', as the saying goes.

Jesus goes on to make the point that Christians (he calls them 'sons of light') should also make provision for the future. Just as in his story the manager had control over assets that he himself did not own, so during our brief life-time believers have control over assets we do not own either. All we possess is entrusted to us in God's providence,

and it should be stewarded carefully in such a way as to provide for our future when we pass from this fading world and enter eternity.

The first of two punch lines of the parable is in verse 9. There, Jesus calls worldly possessions 'unrighteous'. He does not mean they are in and of themselves evil; rather that when we form a relationship with them—and how some people passionately love their bank accounts, homes, cars and clothes, even giving their hearts to them!—they prove unfaithful. Yes, wealth can be unrighteous by deceiving us in promising us happiness and fulfillment. But it cannot ever deliver that.

All we 'own' is only on loan to us during our short lives to use for God's work and his kingdom. Says Jesus, 'So make friends by means of unrighteous wealth, so that when it fails (as it most certainly will) you may be welcomed into your heavenly home.' Not empty-handed, but like a harvest-reaper returning to his farm bringing his sheaves with him.

(There's a second 'punch line' that we'll look at next time.)

Popcorn 'n' Cake

Having done Easter Code for three years, it is now firmly established and the schools greatly look forward to it. Bubblegum 'n' Fluff is getting into the same place and so is Popcorn 'n' Cake! It's the third of our school programmes and it focuses on the celebration of Pentecost. We share with the children that something changed (the coming of the Holy Spirit) and that because of that the church has something to celebrate.

When you put all three together, you have a series of events that allows us to engage with children during their P5, 6 and 7 school years. And as the children attend these events, it's our opportunity to build relationships that can be furthered through our ongoing youth work. Often as not this kind of work is about sowing seeds. Rarely do we get to see how things will work out. Usually there's a long period between the planting and harvesting but this we know - if there's no planting there will never be a harvest!

Thanks to Stuart, our Associate Minister, and Jennie Marr who headlined 'Popcorn 'n' Cake' for us - great job done!

Plus One Mentor Scheme

On the first Sunday in June, we were joined by a guest - Kate Wood, from the mentoring service, PlusOne. Kate had contacted Martin in the hope that she might be able to find some volunteers for this particular scheme. Essentially, PlusOne is about providing adult mentors for vulnerable and 'at risk' children and young people (between the ages of 8 and 14.)

The good news is that quite a number of St. Andrew's members offered their services and, for that, Kate was hugely thankful. The number of young people being referred to her scheme is much larger than the number of adults who have, to date, offered to help. So it was a great encouragement to Kate.

And shouldn't it be that way? Shouldn't Christians be at the centre of the good things that happen in a community? Where there is need, shouldn't it be Christian people who are first in line to serve?

Well done Kate and 'thank you' to all those members who volunteered.

Clerk's Corner

DATA PROTECTION

In this digital age there is so much information about each one of us which is stored in various devices and we may be largely unaware of some of this. Our newspapers have frequent stories about the misuse of this information and of the importance for all of us in safeguarding our personal data.

The church nationally, and we St Andrew's Church locally are aware of our responsibilities in this.

Following an instruction from Presbytery- and such an instruction must be carried out - the Elders underwent a training session at their most recent meeting and they were joined by other members of the congregation for whom this training is relevant. The training was presented in the form of a webinar - i.e. a seminar on-line. The presenter was a lawyer from the Church of Scotland and, while the information given is essential for our personal safety and also to save us from having to pay massive fines for misuse of personal data, it would not be unfair to say that it was pretty heavy going. I would like to thank all those who attended for their patience, endurance and quiet stoicism!!

Now we have to respond to the requirements of the law. You will be pleased to learn that we are well ahead in all of this.

The St Andrew's Data Protection Policy and Policy Statement are in place, along with a short version of this for specific purposes. Our employees have signed a consent form for the additional personal information we require in relation to their salaries, reviews, employment records etc. You will have noticed that we do not include the names of any children in photos, in Quest or on the website.

In relation to you, the members, we hold your names, addresses, telephone numbers, and in some cases, email addresses, on the congregational roll and it would be very difficult for us to operate efficiently without this. Later in the year, we will be asking you to give us your permission to hold this information. You can rest assured that this information is never passed on and there are now additional security arrangements in the office to protect all such data.

When you send out email messages to groups of people, you should use Bcc ('Blind' Cc), otherwise you are giving out all the addresses to everyone on your list. If any recipients' email account is then hacked, it gives access to all those addresses (even if they are not in that hacked person's address book).

Here is how to do this:

1. In the 'To:' box enter your OWN email address.
2. In the 'Bcc:' box enter the emails of all those that you are sending the email to.
3. Make sure that you have left the 'Cc:' box EMPTY!
4. Then 'Send' - Simple!!!

Alongside all of that there will be the usual mix of small groups, workshops, worship, social stuff and a visit from the Moderator of the General Assembly - it's all very exciting. It is a great opportunity for young adults to let the Church of Scotland (on a national level) know what they think about the issues discussed so we hope as many as possible are able to join us.

Cost: £85 per person for food and accommodation, £50 if from a priority area church or an island requiring air travel, £65 if invited to be on our volunteer team. As I'm sure you are aware this can be a lot of money for many young people, so many churches offer to pay at least some of the cost to enable their young people to attend - maybe you could consider doing that too?

From the early 1990s through till about the year 2010, we enjoyed a run of beautiful days for our summer trips. How lucky we were! Since then we've had much more mixed weather with this year in particular being one of the wettest on record. A huge cloud system came and parked itself directly over the Wellbank Village Hall and the rain never stopped - not a 'spit spot' kind of rain but torrential rain!

So we spent the whole afternoon in the hall - apart, that is, from the BBQ team who stood outside getting thoroughly soaked so that the rest of us could enjoy our burgers! But the great thing is that the children had a blast anyway and when the children are happy, the rest of us can be happy too.

The day had begun with our annual prize giving. Some say that such occasions are a bit dated but we continue to enjoy encouraging our children and young people in this way; to recognise their faithfulness and to celebrate their moving on in their own faith journeys.

Much else, though, has changed through the years. Patterns of family life have changed as society has become increasingly secular. We have fewer children involved in our Sunday Club than once was the case and, of course, we'd love to see more children coming along. For that, we're largely dependent on parents; with odd exceptions, few children come to church on their own.

But all is not lost. We need to recognise that changes in society require of us that we be more flexible and that not all of our work with children will be centred on traditional Sunday morning patterns. Between Messy and Sweaty Church, for example, we welcome LOTS of families who aren't part of Sunday morning. As a rule, these are families with little or no church background and yet they're finding something in these new formats of Church that is bringing them back each month. And when you add our holiday clubs and our schools' programme (Easter Code etc.) you see that we are privileged to enjoy LOTS of opportunities to work with children.

If you can't get involved in any of that personally then your job is to pray for those who lead these ministries and to pray for the children and their families. May the day come to pass when LOTS of these children come to a living faith in Christ.

You will go away knowing something more about the work of our partners across the world as well as the World Mission Council and also have a clearer understanding of how you, your Guild and your Church might want to be involved.

Then on 17th October there is an ACTS Anti-Human Trafficking Conference (in partnership with World Mission, Church & Society and the Guild). This is being held at St George's Tron in Glasgow. If you would like more information please get in touch with us.

This will be an excellent opportunity to find out more about the reality of human trafficking and how you can make a difference from keynote speaker, Aidan McQuade,

Anti-Slavery International, as well as practitioners from our partner churches in Malawi, Nepal, Jamaica and the Czech Republic who are responding to the challenge.

As Christian Aid celebrates its 70th birthday this year, they are also planning a conference on 3rd October in Edinburgh, and you should hear about this through your Christian Aid rep or in our literature after the summer.

Here in the World Mission Council we also produce a number of resources to support congregations. Our weekly email update provides stories from our partner churches and information about up-coming events. WM, our bi monthly magazine is full of information that will help you find out more about the lives of our partner churches across the world.
