There's nothing more rewarding than seeing our young people moving on in their faith and showing such desire to make a difference in their world. Rachel Stewart got herself involved in 'Angus Solidarity for Refugees' and spearheaded local efforts to support those tens of thousands of desperate people who have been arriving in Europe. Together with our three Vocations Volunteers, Rachel decided that something had to be done – beyond the talking of the politicians – and went ahead and did it. No one asked her to do it; it was her own initiative.

Dear friends,

In last month's QUEST, we shared with you for the first time our plans to hold a St. Andrew's Church Gift Weekend, to take place over the weekend 28-29th November, the weekend closest to St. Andrew's Day. As your minister, I am hugely excited by this initiative and want to encourage you to embrace it, as the Leadership Group of the congregation has so readily done.

The idea is not a new one. In fact, lots of congregations do something similar. Essentially we want to ensure that we are as well-resourced as possible for the conducting of the ministry and mission that we feel God has called us to. I'm sure many of you feel, as I do, a restlessness that won't allow me to be satisfied with what we've got. Sure, we're doing okay but is 'okay' enough?

A properly resourced congregation is one that senses God's leading and, having done so, decides to 'go for it.' On the other hand, under-resourced congregations are those which find themselves concluding, 'We'd love to be able to do that but we don't have the money or the people to make it happen.'

Of course we are just one congregation in one small town on the East Coast of Scotland. Our dreams and visions need to be appropriate to our size and setting. God is at work through hundreds of other congregations across the land and through hundreds of thousands of congregations across the world!

Even so, our desire is to be all that we can be. Our vision is much larger than simply 'making ends meet,' important and vital as that is. We want to be in the position of advancing some of our ministries, expanding some of those things that are already up and running and doing well. And, how we need to find some new and creative ways to reach the 95% of people in Arbroath who never come within the reach of the Church and who know little or nothing of what we mean when we speak of God's love in Jesus.

It seems somehow 'right' that we choose to do this over the weekend closest to St. Andrew's Day. In practical terms we're asking that each member of the congregation give a financial gift to lend further support to our work. This is something that we're hoping will become an annual Gift Day – a way of making a special offering to our congregation over and above our weekly or monthly giving. Our hope is that all of our members and associates will respond as they are able and that such a response will benefit us immensely in our moving forward.

Next month's QUEST will include materials specific to the upcoming Gift Day. In advance, I commend these to you and look forward to sharing this special weekend with you.

The assurance in all of these things, whether we are looking ahead, or in the midst of it, is that God is leading, guiding and sustaining in these chapters where we prepare to part.

## HomeCARE

Many of you will know that important changes are taking place right now with regard to how social services are being delivered across the nation. No longer are services such as the 'Home Help' service being delivered exclusively by local councils. Indeed, Angus Council is ceasing its Home Help service at the end of October.

Clearly the need for such services has not gone away and so new means of delivering them are being developed right now. Under the direction of Voluntary Action Angus, for example, a new home help-style service is being developed, to be known as 'Care About Angus.'

It's against that backdrop that we have been considering a service of our own – a Church-run social care enterprise. Indeed we're getting closer to the point at which this proposal might become a reality – not there yet but getting close.

In short, St. Andrew's Church is investigating the viability of running our own care service. The service would be similar to what home helps have traditionally offered but

with additional, unique adds-on. Under this proposal, Church members and others would have the option of choosing to have the Church deliver their at-home care – yes, home help services but also pastoral and prayer support, runs for coffee, accompaniment to social gatherings and much more.

It is our belief that we should, and will be able to, offer a service that is the match of anything else that will be available. Compassion is at the heart of all good caring and though Christians don't have a monopoly on compassion or good-heartedness, we certainly aim to exemplify it in all we do.

This is a subject that you'll be hearing much more about in the coming weeks and months. For some of you, it won't seem particularly relevant to your life circumstances – though you might find a volunteering role within the service! For others of you – whether for yourself or an ageing relative – this may have immediately caught your attention.

## Ask Theophilus

### Question :

The last question was about the 'Shrewd Manager', a parable recorded in Luke 16:1-9. We saw the meaning was (a) that material possessions don't belong to us, they are only on loan during this life and (b) that we should use them to prepare for eternity by using them to bring others to Christ.

This month's question is: 'Whatever does Luke 16:11-12 mean?' If you have been not been faithful with unrighteous wealth, who will entrust you with the true riches? And if you have not been faithful with that which is another's, who will give you that which is your own?

### Theophilus answers :

Verses 10 to 13 form a statement about the relationship between material possessions and spiritual growth. In verse 10 'very little' refers to material things—our bank accounts, cars, houses, clothes and so on. Being 'faithful' in our stew-

ardship of these things means using our material possessions for the Lord. Generosity for Christ's work, not self-indulgence for 'me'! By contrast, 'much' means our love for, and walk with, God.

That brings us to verse 11. The 'true riches' are spiritual understanding and depth: progressing to ever greater maturity in Christ. Obviously, 'that which is another's' means material wealth which is only on loan to us during this life, while 'that which is your own' refers to what we will take with us when we die and leave all our earthly possessions behind for ever.

The final paragraph of Luke 16, the parable of the rich man and the beggar, illustrates Jesus' point exactly. Though he lived with great wealth, after death the rich man was now a miserable tormented pauper - whereas Lazarus who in this life had been a suffering pauper, in heaven was lavished with comfort and blessing. In other words, 'We cannot serve God and money' (v. 13). And remember, many who have very little money are still deeply in love with it. How else would the lottery raise billions?

The Friends Club opened the first meeting of the new session with a visit from the choir "In Harmony". A lovely afternoon was had by all 50 club members who enjoyed the

singing which was followed by tea and biscuits. Our October meeting is a talk by our own Sheila Stewart. We meet on the first Thursday of each month and new members are made very welcome.

Two weeks later we were helping collect packs of blankets and clothing in order for these to be taken to the refugees.

Although most of my work is now in routine with just the odd change, the variety of work ensures that no two days are ever the same. I look forward to many more surprises in my next ten months.

Greetings, friends! If you've been wondering who the new guy is who speaks with an American accent, then wonder no more. My name is **Chris Palmer**, and I'm one of the new Vocations Volunteers. Although this is my third year living in Scotland, I'm originally from a town right outside of Philadelphia in the USA.

Between going around town to visit members of the congregation, to helping gather over one hundred donation packs for the refugee crisis and participating in various youth events, Martin sure does keep us busy.

## NOOR MINISTRIES PAKISTAN

### Sajida's Visit 2015

This year, because of circumstances beyond her control, Sajida's planned visit to the UK had to be put forward to August. Also, as a result this, her third visit to Arbroath was briefer than originally envisaged.

At the mid-week service on 26 August and later on that same afternoon over a convivial afternoon tea, Sajida was able to expand upon the current work of Noor Ministries in bringing the Good News of the Gospel message and education to the most persecuted, vulnerable, and marginalised peoples of Pakistan. In the eight short but action-packed and often grueling years since the charity was established, the school rolls have expanded from a modest 14 to well over 200.

Every penny to fund and build and run the schools has to

be raised - there is no government funding in Pakistan for Christian minorities. The bulk of that funding is given by Christians in the UK.

In 2014, members of Arbroath St Andrew's Church raised money to buy a photocopier for the Life Transforming School in Akhtarabad - thus saving a 24km round trip to Renala Khurd, usually - and frustratingly - to find a power cut in that town.

Now the 2015 donations (£255) will be used to equip a classroom for the Grade 9 students so there are increasing physical links as a reminder between our church and LTC.

How good it was to see images of these young people, now on the verge of adulthood, bright, confident, articulate, well fed - and armed with a first class education - to take them on to the next stages their lives. Life transforming indeed!

## Out of Africa

For three years, Guilds across Scotland – our own included – adopted 'Out of Africa' as one of their projects. This is a project located on the island of Malta. It was established by the Scots Kirk, St. Andrew's, under the leadership of Rev Doug McRoberts, who was at that time minister of the congregation. Doug is now retired and living in Inverness but we're delighted that he has willingly agreed to come to 'our' St. Andrew's Church to be our guest preacher in November.

During his morning with us, Doug is going to focus on the work of 'Out of Africa' – a work that has never been more relevant than it is now. Essentially, it is a project designed to offer hospitality to those refugees fleeing Libya and other such troubled lands, seeking to make their way to Europe. As we have seen on our TV screens, for many this proves to be a hazardous journey and Malta has served as a staging post or as temporary destination for many.

Of course, there are huge geo-political problems to sort out. What's to be done about the ongoing wars in Syria and Iraq? What can be done about the lawlessness and anarchy that has taken a grip of Libya and other countries like it following the so-called Arab Spring?

And what's to be done about the persecution of minority groups and the poverty facing whole populations across large parts of Africa? No one, it would seem, has easy answers to these problems.

But as Christians, we are mandated to welcome the stranger in need. Others will make the far-reaching decisions that will affect our world in the long term but in the hear-and-now, our role is to meet with open arms those whose desperation has forced them to seek refuge.

That's exactly what the Scots Kirk in Malta did. Make sure you're present on Sunday 1st November to hear Doug McRoberts tell the story of 'Out of Africa' – Christian faith in action.

## Thank You

In June, an appeal was made for sanitary products for the girls in Malawi. Many packages have been left in the cupboard in the small hall and, without a doubt, these will be greatly appreciated by the girls.

Another year has passed and, yet again, it has not been

necessary to make a special appeal for toiletries for the Women's Refuge. Toiletries are left throughout the year in "the cupboard" and once again we have 60 bags to deliver to the Refuge.

A very big thank you to everyone who has so kindly donated either toiletries or sanitary products throughout the years. We shall continue to collect both.

For those of my older generation who do not really comprehend why Facebook exists - it's a way of sharing your life with thousands of others, and making new friends and followers.

Presently, I am trying to make friends outside of Facebook while applying the SAME PRINCIPLES. Therefore,

every day I go down the street for several hours and tell the passers-by what I have eaten, when and what I am going to eat next, how well or unwell I feel, what I have done the night before that was silly, and what I will do tomorrow night that will be even more silly. Then I give them pictures of my family, my dog and cat and gerbil, and my garden. I also listen carefully to their conversations with me and with other people, and I tell them that I love them.

AND IT WORKS! I already have four persons following me: two police officers, a social worker and a psychiatrist!
