



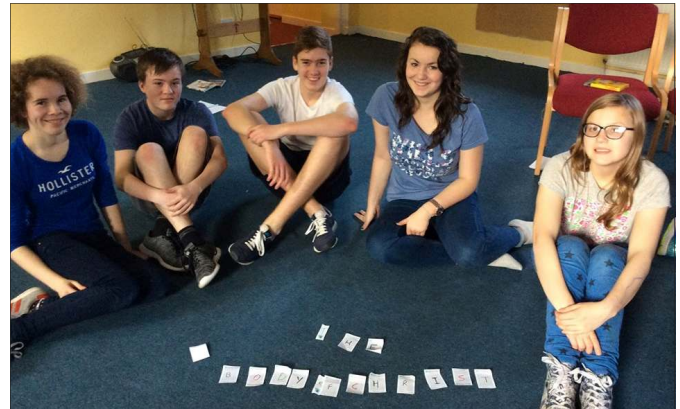
## Youth Work Making Good Progress

## Logan's Baptism

There's nothing much to match a baptism by immersion to vividly and dramatically represent initiation in faith. And so, what a delight it was for us to celebrate Logan Lorimer's baptism in that way.

Of course, the water is only symbolic and so it really doesn't matter how much water is used. A person is just as baptised whether immersed in gallons of water or sprinkled by a few drops! The Church of Scotland uses both methods and so it comes down to individual choice and a decision made in consultation with the minister.

We asked Logan to write a summary

of what has led him to the point of wanting to be baptised. Here's his story so far:

I have been going to Church ever since I was little. My family started coming along to St Andrew's about 9 years ago. In Primary School I enjoyed the Sunday Club and although I knew all the Bible stories I wasn't quite sure what being a Christian was all about. I loved going along to the Bible Class once I got to secondary school, but when I stopped attending that in 3rd year I wasn't sure about what I believed and didn't come along to Church as much.

Dear Friends,

It's become commonplace for Christians to spend most of December complaining! We complain about the rampant commercialism and we complain that people 'out there' neglect Jesus who is, as we say, the 'reason for the season.'

Let's see if we can manage to do less complaining this year. We live in a secular society and the vast majority of people aren't particularly bothered about Jesus – that's the way it is. As for the commercialism? Sorry but, again, that's part of what it is to live in a twenty-first century post-industrial country. Society survives by selling and buying stuff, most of which we don't need. None of that's going to change anytime soon and having Christians moaning about it won't make any difference.

So, what to do? There's a simple answer. We can opt out of the rampant commercialism and we can put Jesus at the centre of our season – and we can do all of that without haranguing others for doing differently! You see the problem is, if we spend all of our time complaining we give other people the idea that Christians do nothing but complain AND we rob ourselves of the joy that should be ours at Christmas!

But the message of the story is the same as it's always been – God loves us so much. Let me make it even more personal and say: God loves YOU so much that Jesus came into the world – to live and to die that YOU might have life in all its fullness, life eternal.

And there is the source of what should be our joy! We are loved! Why not let THAT define your month? Why not make God's love be what you focus on this year? Maybe, just maybe, we might make more of an impression if we did more JOY and less complaining!!

Let's let people see that we really have been transformed and that 'Joy to the world, the Lord is come' makes all the difference in the world.

## Ask Theophilus

### Question :

In Genesis 9:4, God said to Noah--you must not eat meat that has its lifeblood still in it. Does this mean it is wrong to eat roast beef or steak that is under-cooked? Some people like it that way, with blood oozing from it. Personally I prefer it well done.

### Theophilus answers :

This is an important question because it's the beginning of a trajectory that progresses right through the whole Bible, until it finds its ultimate 'target' in verses such as, John 19:24: One of the soldiers pierced his side with a spear, and at once there came out blood and water. Or, Romans 5:9: We have now been justified by his blood... . Or again, 1 John 1:7: The blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin. These are only a few of the scores of NT references to the blood of Jesus.

Literally, the verse you quoted in your question reads, You shall not eat flesh with its life, that is, its blood. Our forefathers didn't understand this verse, because when someone was sick, right up to Victorian times, the doctor

would 'bleed' the patient, sometimes bleeding them to death, because 'their life in their blood' was being drained away. The emphasis on Christ's blood in the New Testament simply means that when he died and shed his blood, he sacrificed his life for those he loved.

After Christ's death, resurrection and ascension, Christians realized that the Old Testament rituals of sacrifice and ceremonial cleansing had been prophetic, pointing forward to Jesus; he had now fulfilled them, so they were no longer necessary. But at the Council of Jerusalem when the apostles and elders discussed all these OT laws, they agreed they were no longer needed; however, for the sake of Jewish scruples, they asked the new non-Jewish believers 'to abstain from blood' (Acts 15:29). The Church has accepted since the days of the apostles that where Christians are living amongst Jews, they should still abstain from eating blood to avoid giving unnecessary offence. Nevertheless, the Mosaic food-laws no longer apply today.

One last point: Jehovah's Witnesses refuse blood transfusions because of this Mosaic Law. They are mistaken. The blood used in transfusions is not from a life that has sacrificed; rather someone is sharing with the sick person the life in the blood given.

## Havilah Gold

St Andrew's Church has a reputation for generous giving. You only have to think of Malawi, Caring for Life etc. I love and support these wonderful projects, but we have in our church a project much closer to home. I mean Havilah at Community Spirit at Fisheracre.

Havilah opens five days a week, Monday to Friday from 12 till 2pm. It offers a warm welcome, tea, toast, coffee,

soup and most of all a listening ear to anyone in need.

Tracey, Jim and Karen form the admin team helped by a goodly number of volunteers, who provide the soup, make the tea and coffee, wash the dishes and just talk to everyone who comes. (Speaking of soup, more people are needed to provide soup on a monthly basis. Can you help in this way?)

Who are these volunteers? What else do they do? Why do they do it? Next month I hope to find out more.

## Prayer for Peace

Can there be anyone who isn't deeply troubled by the state of our world at this time? Of course there have always been wars and atrocities but with the wall-to-wall media coverage and the global reach of terrorist organisations, none of us remains unaffected. Mindless slaughter is as horrific in Beirut or Baghdad as it is in Paris but because few of us have been to the Middle East and, in contrast, many of us have walked Paris's tree-lined boulevards, the feeling of insecurity rises considerably.

It's with this in mind that we are going to open our Church for a full twenty-four hours of reflection and prayer in the week leading up to Christmas. Beginning at 8pm on Sunday 20th December and until 8pm on the Monday evening, church members and members of the public will be able to come into the sanctuary, whether for ten minutes or for an hour or two, to sit quietly or to pray. The space will be sensitively lit and appropriate background music will make for a welcoming, reflective atmosphere. A rota of stewards is being established to ensure that all who come will be made to feel welcome.

It's important that in the midst of our Christmas celebrations we don't allow ourselves to be blinded to what is going on all around us. Certainly there are practical steps that we can take to stand with victims – such as supporting the refugees fleeing from war-torn Syria and from IS-inspired madness across the region. But so too we can pray. More than that, we are called to pray – to cry out on behalf of those whose suffering is beyond our imagination. And perhaps with the Church being open in this kind of way, we'll find people coming in to seek stillness who would never ordinarily come?

If you'd like to volunteer to steward – whether in the morning or afternoon or middle of the night! – please call the Church Office to offer your help. But just as important, please come to reflect and pray.

Both the Contact Team and the Pastoral Care Team are organised from the office and any relevant matters should be referred to our Administrator, Linda.

In the middle of 4th year I felt that I wanted to start coming back to Church. I couldn't say why, but I just felt that I needed to go back as I had so many questions and doubts and didn't know what to believe.

I didn't really attend the Youth Group as I just didn't feel very confident and was very shy.

I was angry with God lots of times especially when things weren't right between my Mum and Dad – I prayed and prayed for them to stay together but unfortunately they split up in 2014. I was in 5th year during this year and I found everything so hard – trying to study, wanting to be there for my Mum and leaving school, not really knowing who I was or what I was supposed to be doing. I was going to go to University, and I had a plan, but God had another plan and I left school at the end of 5th year. Still I prayed, but still the wrong answers kept coming - or so I thought!

Looking back at these last few years when things weren't right I realise that God's answer was for my Mum and

Dad to part and having left school I realise that that was right for me. I see that He is in control and all things do work out for the better - but it doesn't always seem that way. I hope to join the Police in the future.

As for Youth Group, I am now a volunteer there and really enjoy encouraging other teenagers in their faith journeys as I know how hard it is to be a teenager and have a faith.

Over the last year or so, I have been supported by all my St Andrew's family especially Tim, Jim and Stuart who have listened to me and prayed with me and for me. My Home Group really has been instrumental in encouraging me to grow in my faith and ask questions. I am not afraid to ask when I'm not sure and when I am struggling I know that they will support me. All these different people and situations God has given me have been part, I feel, of how I have come to the decision to be baptised. I know that God is committed to me and being baptised into His family I want to show my commitment to Him.

Even when things are tough I know that God is always with me.
