

Prayers For Peace

For the first time ever, we opened our sanctuary for a continuous 24 hours of prayer, the focus of the prayers being for peace in Syria and across the Middle East. The prayer time commenced at 8pm on Sunday 20th December and ran through till 8pm on the Monday night. The amazing thing was that there was hardly a time when there weren't at least some people in the sanctuary engaged in prayer and reflection. Everyone who commented spoke of how much they appreciated the stillness and appropriate music and lighting.



The 18-year old who saw the church opening advertised on our social media sites and chose to come down and sit for half an hour. As she was making her way out, she spoke of the important life decisions that she is having to make and of how coming into the church had helped her greatly to feel at peace.

The 25-year old man who was walking past at 2.30am in the middle of the night and who asked if he could come in to pray. Again, he

spent a short time in the sanctuary and as he was leaving told us that he had lost his sister seven years ago that very night and of how it had helped him to be able to come into the church.

And what about the 40-something year old who contacted us at 4am in the night via Facebook, to tell us that she'd love to come to pray but couldn't. Here's what she shared with us:

Dear Friends,

Those in trouble will always find comfort in Christian faith. But the opposite is also true – those who are overly comfortable will find that Christian faith troubles them!

And so it was that on Sunday 24th January we were joined by Gordon Cruden from Teen Challenge (NE Scotland) who spoke to us about his experiences of sleeping rough for a whole month on the streets of Britain's biggest cities – and most certainly we were challenged by what he shared. That's how it should be; when the Gospel is preached and when its application is spelt out, we should feel it deep within ourselves, in a thoroughly uncomfortable kind of way!

Perhaps the most uncomfortable moment of all was when Gordon told us where his help came from and where it didn't come from during his time in London. He told us that he was made welcome at the Sikh temple, where they spoke of their 'culture of love.' But he told us, too, that on the Sunday morning he sat outside one of the UK's biggest churches – 5,000 strong – with a 'hungry and homeless' sign displayed but that not one of those gathering for worship bothered to stop and speak to him, let alone offer to help. That left Gordon feeling thoroughly disappointed and disillusioned.

For my own part, I knew I was going to have to take Gordon's challenge seriously. Through my work for the national church, there's rarely a week when I'm not down in Edinburgh or in one of our other major cities. And when there, it's impossible to walk the main streets without seeing homeless people crouching in doorways or sat in front of shops.

That's what happened two days after Gordon's visit. I arrived in Edinburgh at 9.30am and began to make my way from Waverley Station to the church offices at 121 George Street. And sure enough, outside the Starbucks coffee shop on George Street, there was a young man sitting on the pavement, wrapped up in a coat and blanket and with a paper cup in front of him. This was the day when 'Storm Jonas' was blowing through Britain and the wind was howling down George Street and the rain was lashing down. He looked utterly miserable – as we all would have. I couldn't walk by. Neither, though, did I opt to give him some money. Instead I asked him if he wanted coffee and he responded enthusiastically. I went in to Starbucks and bought a latte and a blueberry muffin and these I gave to the man. I spoke with him for a while asking him where he slept at night and so on. And then I was on my way – into the comfort of the church offices.

I don't expect a badge for helping that particular man. Really, I felt that I had no choice. It's impossible to stand in church and talk about caring if, when opportunity arises, we don't put that caring into action. That's how we worship – how we show that we love our Lord – by caring for the 'least of these' (Matthew 25:31-46.)

I'm not saying that everyone should do the same; we all need to work out our own response. But ignoring the challenge of the Gospel is the one response that's not available to us. What will you do?

Wishing you all a blessed and 'challenging' 2016!!

Christmas Offering

Ask Theophilus

Question :

When Jesus was baptised and a voice from heaven spoke to him and the dove alighted on him, was he the only person who heard this and saw the dove? (Matthew 3:16-17.)

Theophilus answers :

It is easiest to begin with Matthew's words, 'he [John] saw the Spirit of God descending on him [Jesus] like a dove and coming to rest on him'. It would appear that this was an actual event, because not only does Matthew tell us that John the Baptist saw the dove, but elsewhere John is quoted as saying that he witnessed this happening: he says, 'He who sent me to baptise with water said to me, "He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain, this is he who baptises with the Spirit"' (John 1:32-33). So as well as being a sign to Jesus of his anointing by the Spirit, the dove was also a sign to John of Christ's true identity. The Greek

word 'Christ' (its equivalent in Hebrew is 'Messiah') means 'the Anointed One'. John knew therefore that he was being given this clear message that his cousin, Jesus of Nazareth, was indeed the Messiah, that is, the Christ.

But the question was about the voice. Matthew tells us that 'the heavens were opened to him [Jesus]'. It is uncertain whether that means the heavens were also opened to the bystanders. The 'heavens opening' is a kind of code meaning a vision was being given. (See Ezekiel 1:1; Acts 7:56; Revelation 4:1; 11:19; 19:11, etc.) While I suspect the voice Jesus heard was for him alone, on two other occasions when a voice from heaven spoke, it appears that those present also heard it. Indeed, we read in John 12:29, 'the crowd that stood there and heard it said that it had thundered'. (See also Mark 9:7.)

While my view is that at his baptism, it was probably only Jesus who heard the voice, on the two other occasions in Gospels, we are to understand that others quite clearly heard something. I hope that helps. Sorry I can't be more definite!

Youth Work Update

Our Youth Group enjoyed a great trip to the Edinburgh Christmas Market at the end of December, with the highlight of ice skating at St. Andrew's Square. As in previous years, it was a great success that we hope to continue in the future.

Looking towards the next few months, we are starting a new series for Sunday evenings entitled 'World Issues' by Urban Saints. With so many conflicting influences in young

people's lives, our aim is to present them with the Christian perspective on topics such as, war, prejudice and the environment. In addition, we are preparing for a weekend at Teen Ranch in March where we will be doing activities such as horse riding and archery. This was always a fun-filled weekend for the youth group in years gone by and so I hope our current young people will have the same experience.

But your 'thing' came up on Facebook about 24 hour peace pray or whatever it was (sorry it got lost in the tears) not sure why it affected me but I so wanted to come and just sit and reflect, but I lost my hubby to ptsd (he also served) and I have to be strong for my girls and not show weakness.

So tonight I sit in a new town (Arbroath) after 2 weeks being and knowing a few people from 20 years ago when I

left on a journey. But yet I know nobody that I can truly talk too. I would at this minute jump in a taxi and come over but as a single former service mum - I cant! But I wanted you to know that through the power of social media your call out - whether attended or not - helped one person (although I do have to admit I would have liked to have had some me time for a good cry - then given my head a wobble. X'

We may never meet the woman in question but it was heartening to know that we had connected with her somehow even though she couldn't physically come to the church.

Perhaps as we get used to opening our church more frequently – at times other than traditional service times – we can expect more and more contact with those who come from well beyond our present reach. And, if we can help such people towards a sense of God, we'll have something to be thankful for.

Thank you for collecting so many stamps. The people of Arbroath St Andrew's Church are supporting people like Dilip - let me tell you his story.

Because of leprosy, Dilip was expelled from school and denied the basic right to education. Dilip's future looked bleak until he heard about the Bankura Vocational Training Centre. Thanks to individuals, groups, schools, and churches like you who

collect stamps, Dilip was given a scholarship to attend Bankura. He was overjoyed at being allowed to learn where leprosy is not an issue and does not deny him an education. He is training to become a welder to support himself and his mother. He wants a better future for his family and a society where his mother who had leprosy "is not treated like an outcast, but is accepted."

Thank you for stamping out leprosy!

Annual Stated Meeting

Printed below is the minute of last year's Annual Stated Meeting. We do this so that everyone can have the opportunity to read it before the meeting on March 13th 2016

The Annual Stated meeting was held after Morning Worship in St Andrew's Church on Sunday 15th March 2015 and was constituted with prayer.

Moderator: Rev Dr W Martin Fair BA BD

Sederunt: 69 members of the congregation were in attendance.

The minute of the Annual Stated Meeting held in St Andrew's Church on 17th March 2014 was approved on the motion of W Ewart and N Beattie.

Moderator's comments: These were focussed on our three WWWs – Welcome, Worship, and Witness.

Welcome: A recent visitor had commented that he had never ever found himself as welcome as he had on attending St Andrew's. It was noted that we strive to ensure that a warm welcome is extended to all and it is good to have feedback on the success of this.

Worship: The statistics in relation to the streaming of our services show that currently around 300 people each month are worshipping with us from their homes. Some of these are our own members who are unable to attend and others are from much further afield. There is a tremendous opportunity for mission in this and also in reaching those who would not normally cross the threshold of a church.

Witness: The response to the appeal following the floods in Malawi resulted in the staggering sum of over £10,000 being raised. This shows a real commitment to witness.

Finance Report: the presentation of the Accounts for 2014: The accounts for 2014 were scrutinised by the Finance and Administration Core Group, approved by the Kirk Session and finally examined and approved by the independent examiner.

Scott Anderson, leader of the Finance and Administration Core Group presented the detail of the figures for 2014 using both an extract and the relevant sections from the main accounts as they are prepared for OSCAR. The full version was made available for those who wished to have a copy.

Beginning with the figures for the Big Picture, the Statement of Financial Activities for 2014 showed all incoming and expended resources. Explanation was given about the Jean Glen Fund where all the income did not come in in one year, nor was it spent in one year. The effect of this is to complicate the figures, whereby in 2014 there was more expenditure than income. In addition, the increase in offer-

ings as a result of the Stewardship Project was less than originally projected. As a result, the overall shortfall has been covered by the use of the General Reserve Fund and the Jean Glen Legacy.

Detail was provided of the substantive funds comprising the General Reserve Fund, the Ministry Team Fund, the Fabric Fund and the Havilah and Malawi Project funds. It was noted that there has been an increase in the income from lets. The contribution to the Mission and Ministry Fund is currently £93,000 – a sum very significantly higher than any other church in the Presbytery. It is hoped that some adjustment to this figure may be possible later in the year.

It was initially hoped that the cost of the post of Associate Minister could be substantially met from the General Funds. However, it was evident that this expenditure could not be sustained by this fund and any reserves, including designated funds to support this post, will be depleted at its conclusion in early 2016.

Scott indicated that there are priorities, particularly with regard to staffing, to be studied by both the Leadership Group and Kirk Session. Our exceptional available monies are now close to being used up and, where we previously had reserves, we now have to look to ensuring that we live within our means. He was very positive about how much we have achieved in all aspects of the vision for St Andrew's Church.

Questions were asked about the statement of any shortfall and that the details of the General Account should be made available to the congregation separately. However, it was felt that the publishing of one single account does not present the true picture.

The Treasurer, Susan Godsall, was warmly thanked for her considerable commitment to the complexities of her ever-increasing role and Heather Black was thanked for her valuable role as deputy.

Thanks: The Deputy Session Clerk, Joan Hainsworth conveyed the deepest thanks of the Kirk Session and congregation to Martin for his inspired teaching throughout the year and in particular the effectiveness of the themes for study chosen. Throughout these, we have been challenged, inspired and encouraged. Our appreciation of all the work which our Associate minister, Stuart Irvin has undertaken was recorded and mention made that around 280 children would be attending the Easter Code. She wished every blessing on Martin and his family and on that of our Associate Minister, Stuart Irvin and his family. Joan's final prayer concluded the meeting.
