Annual Stated Meeting

The Annual meeting of the congregation is to take place immediately after worship on Sunday 13th March and as many members and friends of the congregation as possible are asked to attend.

With the change in constitution adopted several years ago and with OSCAR regulations in force, these meetings

have changed somewhat over the years. They do not now involve the election of office bearers and neither does the congregation have to approve the accounts – that is done by the Kirk Session, the member of which are the trustees.

Even so, it's a meeting at which members of the congregation can hear for themselves how we've done financially in the previous year and of our plans for the future. With that in mind, your attendance is greatly appreciated.

Ask Theophilus

Question:

The story of the tower of Babel in Genesis 6:1-9: Come let us build a city with its top in the heavens... Is this fact or fiction, myth or metaphor?

Theophilus answers:

Over the past 150 years, much research has been done by archaeologists in ancient 'ziggurats', towers in eight sections, each section being slightly smaller in diameter than the one on which it stood. At the very top was always a temple.

Nebuchadnezzar's father, Nabopolassar, founded a vast empire and was determined to build a great tower in the centre of his capital city, Babylon. He was following the example of a much earlier dictator, Gilgamesh, whose story is told in possibly the world's oldest piece of literature, The Epic of Gilgamesh, written on clay tablets about 4,500BC. This king of a city called Uruk had travelled the known world searching for the secret of immortality, so that he might himself become a god. But having failed in his quest, he resolved to build a tower so high that it would be seen for scores of miles around; it was a circular step-pyramid, reaching possibly a height of five to six hundred feet, with a

network of external stairways. His intention was that his mighty tower would make him immortal. Tens of thousands of workers from all over the entire middle-east were forced into the building work (see Genesis 11:6).

Nabopolassar had the same plan, but he only managed the foundations of his ziggurat intended to win him immortality. His son Nebuchadnezzar completed the structure many years later. A full account of its building is preserved in ancient clay tablets. The outside bricks were glazed blue, and formed images of the tyrant. Saddam Hussein restored the first tier of the tower Nebuchadnezzar built, but not with beautiful glazed bricks, only with rough cast cement! Today it is called the Ziggurat of Ur, and can be seen about 10 miles south of Baghdad.

However, the foundations of the tower which is referred to in Genesis 11 have possibly been located about twenty miles south of Baghdad. They are reckoned to be some 5000 years old, and speculation is that they may be remains of the ziggurat of Gilgamesh. My guess is that this could be the tower to which the Bible passage is referring. (For further reading - https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Ziggurat_of_Ur Also, look at the website for Bruegel the Elder/Tower, the 16th century Dutch painter; people in the 16th century were fascinated by the story in Genesis 11.)

Malawi - Onwards and Upwards

As we waved goodbye to the first group of our teenagers as they set off for Malawi back in 2007, who among us could have known how things would grow and flourish in the years that followed? But that's exactly what has happened. Two orphan centres have been built, hundreds of Malawian children are being cared for on a daily basis, with the provision of education, food and water and medical care at a level that otherwise would be beyond all of them. In short, we have – and are – making a significant difference in the lives of some of the world's poorest and most fragile communities. None of us is in any doubt that this success is in large part due to the drive and commitment of both the Dunphy and Bowie families. With your wonderful giving, they have done everything to ensure that the work has thrived.

In many ways, that work in Malawi has now outgrown what ordinarily a single congregation might expect to do in terms of international mission. The work involved and the sums of money involved have grown to a level which could never have been envisaged in earlier years. It has increasingly become an issue for us as to just how to handle the project in relation to the rest of the congregation's work.

With all of that in mind, and following much discussion and careful, prayerful deliberation, the Kirk Session – in agreement with those who have been running the Malawi Group until now – has resolved to create a separate and independent trust to run the work from now on. Sheila and Fraser, Doris and Sandy, are even now working out the best way to bring such a trust into being. And, in the meantime, a small team of the congregation's office bearers has assumed responsibility for administering the project until such times as the new trust is founded.

7th Arbroath B.B.

Our weekly meetings on a Thursday night have been most encouraging. We have 3 new boys in the Anchor section and at present we cannot take any more. The Anchor and Junior section met with the people who had an event in the church about the redevelopment of Arbroath and the boys had a great time finding places in the town on the large floor map. We took a mid -term break along with school break and we now have 6 weeks until the Easter holidays to get all our activities for badge work finished. At

This decision has been taken with the wellbeing of the Malawian children foremost in our minds. The Malawi project can continue to flourish as can the more day-to-day work of the congregation. Indeed it is hoped that the Malawi work being independent of St. Andrew's Church, in both administration and name, might allow for the trustees to garner support from a wider circle than has hitherto been the case.

How does this affect you?

Firstly, those of you who sponsor children will still be able to do so. The only difference will be that your monthly gift will be handled by the new trust rather than by the congregation. To allow for that change, at an appropriate time we will be writing to all sponsors seeking your permission for the handing over of your details to the new trust. (This is an administrative detail but a necessary one in this age of data protection.) Thereafter the new trust will seek your support as an ongoing sponsor. We are entirely hopeful that all sponsors will choose to continue to support their children, and would encourage you to do so. Your money will be administered by a new body but it will be used to achieve the same things — and that's the most important thing.

Similarly, in the future the new trust – as opposed to the congregation – will hold fund-raising events and you will be able to support these as you see fit.

So, here we are at an important stage in the life of our work in Malawi. That we have got to this stage is nothing short of miraculous. With God's help, the work will continue as effectively under these new arrangements.

As things develop from here, we will of course keep you all informed as required.

We have two Company Boys, Josh Gall and Fraser Fair working towards gaining the Presidents Badge this year and they have a full day of activities to attend on 20th March.

Our Fund Raiser this year is a Quiz night on Friday 18th of March in the church hall at 7pm. Teams of four cost £10. We will also have a bring and buy stall etc.

Without our team, none of this would be possible. With them, we're able to present our church as the vibrant, welcoming place that it truly is.

Atlanta NEXT Conference

Our minister has recently returned from attending a conference of the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America which was held in Atlanta, Georgia. Martin was part of a small Church of Scotland team which had been invited to attend the conference and to lead a session for over six hundred delegates who attended.

The fact is that Scotland has, in the last generation, seen huge changes taking place, culturally, socially and economically. Part of this change has been the dramatic secularisation process that we've seen taking place all around us and the resultant 'crash' in terms of the place of the Church. At the end of the 1960s there were around 1.5 million members of the Church of Scotland. Today, there are around 350,000. Far less people are baptised into the faith, far less couples opt for a Christian wedding and, as we've seen more recently, fewer and fewer

people are choosing a Christian funeral service.

Against that backdrop, we're having to learn all over again how to engage our community and wider world — a world that largely has no interest in us or our message.

The situation in America is quite different. Going to church is still the 'done thing' for many. Politicians can be up-front about their religious beliefs. To put it simply, it's still possible to talk of America as being a 'Christian country.' But the first chill winds are being felt – the beginning of processes that we in the UK felt many years ago.

It was to address those issues that the team from Scotland was asked to attend the conference. What can our American brothers and sisters learn from our experience? What can we share with them about being the church in a rampantly secular society? Perhaps insights from Scotland will enable them to be well prepared for what the coming years are likely to bring.

Visit from Angus College

At the beginning of February, we received a call from Angus College asking if it would be possible for a group of students to visit the church. Of course, we were delighted to welcome them. The first hour of their visit took the form of a Question & Answer session, during which Martin, our minister, was bombarded with questions everything from 'How do you know God exists?' to 'What do people get out of coming to church?' Hopefully Martin was able to offer them convincing answers – answers to get them thinking!

After the Q&A session, the students

joined us for our Wednesday service and stayed afterwards for coffee and cake. During that coffee time, we were delighted to hear all of the students, and their teacher, enthusing about their experience of being among us. 'What a wonderful welcome we've been given!' and 'What a lovely sense of community and belonging' were the most common comments.

And that's the way it should be! That's what everyone who comes to St. Andrew's should experience – whether 'one-off' visitors or people looking for a church to belong to. Well done to the Wednesday service crowd for making it work for our student friends!

New Members

By the time you're reading this edition of QUEST we'll have welcomed a number of new members to the congregation. The Service of Admission to Membership took place on Sunday 3rd March.

It's always a thrill to see new people wanting to become members of our family, whether they are young people or older. It's not just that an increase in our numbers is welcome, though it certainly is. But more than that, we look forward to what our new members will bring to the congregation.

Everyone has a set of gifts and talents, passions and experiences and all of that will go into the mix of what we have as a congregation.

When you get an opportunity, make sure that you offer a personal welcome to our new members.

MALAWI UPDATE

The weather has been terrible this year again. The rains have been even worse than last year. There has been very sporadic rainfall followed by long periods of very dry weather. This has meant that the maize has grown very poorly. Many of the stalks are thin, small and have very small ears of corn. The situation throughout Malawi is now reaching crisis point as last year there was not enough maize grown in the whole country to supply everyone's need. This has led to the huge over inflation of prices of maize beyond the usual hunger season prices. Without the prospect of a good harvest this year, this is very worrying. Each of our centres is very busy at the moment, involved in distributing maize. There are lots of villagers coming every day asking for maize and everyday there are more and more children arriving at the centre asking to be taken in. Unfortunately, we only have a certain capacity and our priority has to be to the children we already care for and the very neediest of the others that we find.

You may have read in the press recently that the food situation in Malawi is the worst it has been in 10 years, with many children being severely malnourished. We have heard of several charities who have begun focusing their efforts solely on tackling the malnourishment problem because it is so bad. These reports have stated that 42% of children in Malawi are stunted, 21% are considered underweight and 4% are considered medically wasted. It was also noted that 23% of child deaths in Malawi are associated with under nutrition. Official figures from the Malawian government are estimating that 2.8million people are currently going hungry in Malawi, however many NGOs believe that the actual figures are much higher.

With so many of the surrounding villagers going hungry and having no way of providing for their families, the demand on our food relief service is completely outweighing our supply of food. Unicef have been working very hard over the last few years in nutrition rehabilitation units. These are medical centres where the acutely malnourished children can go to be fed via therapeutic drip feeds until they are healthy enough to go home. Admissions in one of these centres was monitored – In October 2014 they had 57 admissions, January 2015- 174 (Harvest is in March/ April so the worst hunger time is leading up to harvest). Compare that to this year where they had 152 admissions in October 2015 and 263 admissions in January 2016. These are some of the poorest children for whom starvation really is a reality.

One such needy child was found by social welfare at Thyolo recently. She has no direct family and was very malnourished. When social welfare found her they brought her to our centre where she has now become a boarder. This girl is 12 years old and is called Maria John. She is from a village a few miles away. She is now enrolled in standard 4 at Nachipere Primary School where many of the other children attend. She has already put on weight despite only being with us a few weeks and is reported to be looking

healthier already.

On another note, the container, which was sent in November, unfortunately due to bad weather and other unforeseen circumstances did not manage to get to Malawi in time for Christmas. It did manage to get there for the end of January and so the boxes were quickly divided up by our talented team and the children were able to enjoy a second Christmas celebration. You will see from the attached picture how excited the children were to get their bagpacks and all the goodies inside.

The container contained lots of medical equipment which has been distributed between the clinics that Aquaid run, our own new hospital and the local hospitals that the Aquaid children use. Kiri, our very resourceful administrator, took some of the equipment to her local hospital – Thyolo district hospital and presented them to the ward sisters. She then asked for volunteers to come and give our children yearly check ups...- which has been agreed to!

At Kambilonjo preparations are well underway for the opening of our new clinic/ hospital (It has two medical bays - 8 beds in total). It is now looking very good and is awaiting government permission and for the government to send some employees. This is very exciting! We are looking forward to seeing it for ourselves in June when we visit Malawi.

The recent Malawian currency devaluation has compounded the financial problems of all Malawians. Currently a 50kg bag of maize is at a record high of MK20,000 which is the equivalent of £20. This will supply the carbohydrate part of a family of 3's meals for a month (they will still have to source vegetables and meat). We will be aiming to prioritise food relief this year as much as possible, in accordance with the advice of our Malawian staff. If anyone feels that they could or would like to support this venture, please do not hesitate to get in touch.

I read a quote from Shane Claiborne recently which stated that 'The greatest tragedy in the church today is not that rich Christians do not care about the poor, but that they do not know the poor'.

How true is this quote? Certainly for me, there are so many times I am moved with compassion, when I hear a story or watch comic relief or these programmes but that compassion is soon dissipated because I do not KNOW those people. Thank you for taking the opportunity through the Sponsored Child programme of getting to know at least one of our Malawian neighbours! Please continue to pray for the situation in Malawi and uplift each of our children and their families in prayer.
