# Martin Fair

June 2016

Dear Friends,

As you'll read elsewhere in this QUEST, I served as a commissioner to this year's General Assembly of The Church of Scotland.

In former days, the Assembly was considered to be something of a de-facto Scottish Parliament; many of you will remember that its proceedings were broadcast live on BBC television and daily newspapers carried pages of coverage of debates and decisions of the Assembly.

Nowadays, the nation hardly notices, having made up its mind that what the Church chooses to believe and think is of little consequence. Even the quality national broadsheets, The Herald and The Scotsman, devote precious few column inches to the Assembly's deliberations. And of the populous at large, few are those who wait with bated breath for the pronouncements of the Kirk on the life of our nation or world today. Though some are openly hostile to the Church, most remain at worse ambivalent or, on good days, even kindly disposed towards us. But even that benevolent ambivalence scarcely masks the real truth, that is, that most Scots reckon the Church to be essentially irrelevant.

We might argue long and hard as to why this should be the case. Maybe it's inevitable, the natural end point for a developed society that tells itself, ultimately, that it has no need of 'god.' That would be to look 'outside' for an explanation and perhaps that is valid. But the Church must at the same time be ready to examine itself and to ask of itself if it might be in some way to blame for its own demise.

In one of the reports to this year's Assembly, contained in the so-called 'Blue Book,' there was a phrase that jumped out at me the minute I read it. It seemed to me to sum up much of what is true of us and, perhaps, of any large organisation or institution. The phrase was this: *'We detected little enthusiasm for change.'*

In its immediate context, the phrase was being used to describe responses received to a consultation process regarding the future of the General Assembly itself, it having been suggested that the Assembly might meet only every two years and that far fewer delegates need attend. There was, apparently, no enthusiasm for such changes.

But the phrase is illustrative of a much wider attitude. There is among us little enthusiasm for change, full stop!

Might it be that we have become disconnected from the people of our nation because of our reluctance to change. Might it be that the world moved on while we (more or less) stood still? Should we really be surprised that an institution which looks much as it did in the 1950s isn't cutting it in the 2010s?

Though at times quaint, the General Assembly is essentially archaic. In that, the Assembly symbolises the Church as a whole.

If none of this mattered, little would be lost. But for those of us who hold fast to the Gospel, and who retain a passion to see Scotland once more thirsting after the things of God, it matters much. It seems to us that we need to rediscover enthusiasm for change; that we need to lay it all down before Christ, who is the head of the Church, and say, 'What would you do with us and how would you have us be?'

Change is rarely comfortable but when the choice is change or die, is there really any choice at all? Ask yourself if there is in you little enthusiasm for change or readiness for change? The future of the Church in Scotland might well depend on our responses.

## Ask Theophilus

### Question :

A few Sunday nights ago Martin let us see a video of an American pastor holding and dancing about with a live snake. These pastors believe that they are safe and this action proves it. (Acts 28: 3-6). At some of these meetings people have died after being bitten, including a pastor. Are those people testing God? Jesus' answer to the devil's second temptation was - 'You shall not put the Lord your God to the test' (Matthew 4:7). Are these people mad or am I missing something?

### Theophilus answers :

Years ago I was taught that all snake charmers were in direct league with the devil. But when I myself watched snake charmers at work in India, I was reliably informed that they had operated on their snakes and had removed the poison glands from the snakes' throats, rendering them harmless.

However, Martin's video (which I have not seen) does not surprise me. I have seen other videos from similar American 'stables', and have been appalled at the trickery in some of them, the emotional exploitation in others, and the rash folly being displayed in yet others. In the case you cite, it would appear the snakes being waved about are venom-

ous, in which case dancing around with them is both highly irresponsible and dishonouring to God. Paul's experience in Acts 28 was totally different: it was unexpected, entirely accidental and not in any way 'staged'.

Two other points. The kind of display in the video Martin showed at an evening service was an example of entirely the wrong way to present the gospel. It was obviously intended to imitate what are called 'signs and wonders'. The Greek word for sign is used 27 times in the four Gospels; out of those 27 occurrences, 21 are derogatory and have Jesus refusing to give any sign. Indeed, it is clearly stated that the main gospel signs are his death and resurrection. Signs can confirm faith (see John 2:11), but they do not create faith. Faith comes by the grace of the Holy Spirit through God's Word.

Finally, blatant appeals to human emotions (that's what dancing around with a venomous snake is) are quite wrong. Our emotions are notoriously unstable. God's Word is addressed to the mind, and from the mind to the will. The word 'heart' in the Bible refers to the personality in terms of mind and will. Jesus defined perfectly the word 'heart' as it is used in Scripture: 'You shall love (emotions!) the Lord your God with all your soul, your mind and your strength' (there 'strength' means will). Excitement -- emotionalism deliberately whipped up -- is alien to the Christian message and method! And yes, I think what the video showed could well have been putting God to the test. I hopes this helps!

## General Assembly 2016

Both Martin and Adele, our Youth Worker, have been commissioners at this year's General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. Ministers of Angus Presbytery attend the Assembly every four years and Adele has been there as a representative of the National Youth Assembly, of which she is part.

For both of them, this has involved a week-long stay in Edinburgh and a schedule that is nothing if not intensive. Attendees need to be seated by 9am each morning and the business of the mooring continues without a break until 12.30pm. The afternoon session begins at 2pm and runs until the business is concluded, whenever that may be! On top of the main business sessions, there are lunchtime fringe events, additional evening meetings and, in Adele's case, late night preparation sessions with all of the youth delegates together.

All in all, it makes for an exhausting week, during which the range of subjects covered is as wide as could possibly

be imagined and throughout which high levels of concentration are required. Some of the business is mundane and, dare we say, a little boring! But other parts of it are highly contentious and, at other times, hugely exciting and stimulating. This year, one of the highlights was the visit of the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, who had come to mark the occasion of the signing of 'The Columba Declaration,' a historic document detailing greater unity between the national churches of Scotland and England. Another highlight was the contribution made by overseas delegates – ministers and elders from partner churches from around the globe – each of whom spoke warmly of the association with the Church of Scotland and of the encouragement that we are to them in their struggles, sometimes in the face of grinding poverty and ongoing civil strife.

Though we are part of a distinct congregation – St. Andrew's Arbroath – let us continue to count it a privilege to be part of a Church that remains committed to serving the nation and to playing its part in the worldwide family of churches.

As a mum of four young children, and with your help, I want to give these babies and mothers the best chance of survival. All babies are precious and these babies deserve the same chance as babies born in our country. Together with you, I hope to raise at least £120 which will pay for a bicycle so that a health care worker can reach mothers in remote villages and help towards the training of new midwives.

## Scottish Church Census 2016

Churches of all denominations were asked to take part in a Scottish Church Census in May of this year, in an attempt to assess the present position of the churches and how it compares with ten years ago.

In time the findings of this research will be made available. All being well, we'll have a reasonably accurate picture of the numbers attending church and a breakdown of age groups, gender balance etc etc. On the day in which we conducted our census, almost 250 people were in attendance. When you add in those who attend our evening and Wednesday morning services – some of whom are not usually present on a Sunday morning – it's clear that we continue to have a healthy number of worshippers. Indeed, there are not many congregations with bigger attendances and the majority have less than 100.

In other words, we can be pleased with how we are do-

ing – but never complacent! There are many in our parish with whom we have no contact and many in our membership who rarely, or never, join us in worship.

In a recent conversation, someone pointed out that in earlier years, a 'twicer' was someone who attended church morning and evening. Nowadays, a twicer is someone who comes twice a month. Being regular in worship is, sadly, not what it once was and even people who might otherwise be considered committed Christians might actually only be present on 30 or so Sundays of the year. Many of us find all manner of excuses why NOT to be present!

Perhaps the census should act as a challenge to those of us who are less than regular in our attendance. Maybe we should each ask, 'Shouldn't the minister see MY face when he looks out on a Sunday morning?'

## Clerk's Corner

### Ministries and Mission

Below you will find the detail of our financial commitment to Ministries and Mission for 2016. This detail has been received from the Stewardship and Finance Department of the national church.

Angus : Arbroath St Andrew's  
Total Contribution to Ministries and Mission for 2016 - £98,410

Ministries (85.3%)  
£83,944 of our total contribution will go towards the costs of providing over 1,000 ministers and other parish works in communities throughout Scotland. The 2016 cost of a parish minister at the top of the stipend scale is £41, 507 (stipend plus employer's national insurance and pension contributions.

Mission (14.7%)  
£14,466 of your total contribution will be used to support the Church's work in: resourcing congregations for Christian education and outreach; providing social care serviced in Christ's name to further the caring work of the church to people in need; accompanying partners around the world on

our shared Christian journey, contributing to the Church's opinion in public debate and on issues affecting Scotland and the World; providing central day-to-day service work in administrative, financial and legal matters; and in planning the General Assembly and ensuring the Moderator represents the Church.

### Pastoral Care

Those of our members who are resident in our care homes are a very important part of our Pastoral Care system. They receive monthly visits and this is carried out faithfully by Gaynor Scott. Her group is quite large and will remain so, but she still finds time to ensure that all these members know that their church remembers them. Gaynor also attends any funerals of those from her group. This month it was a privilege to be present when she conducted an entire service. This was done with sincerity and kindness and was skilful in all the aspects. The fact that she knew the lady from her visits to her care home meant that she was able to provide comment on aspects of her life within the home and provide amusing detail of conversations. This gave such a unique aspect to what she said and was clearly appreciated by all the relatives.

We are very lucky to have Gaynor who is able to provide this compassionate work.
