"Dear Joe, I am pleased to let you know that you are one of a select few who are in line to win £1,000,000." Well, not quite a scam, as such, but pretty close. What usually follows is that you are required to phone a premium rate number to find out what your prize might be. Of course, the cost of the phone call (which they largely pocket) is hidden in the 'small print' (that is, tiny print!). Also hidden there, can be the fact that you may only win one of a short list of tiny prizes (such as a pen), most of which have less value than the cost of your phone call.

An added variation can be that you need to go through many stages in order to claim your prize, or in order to be entered into the next stage of the draw for the big money prize. This, of course, can prove to be quite costly and will most likely still only lead you to one of the small prizes.

So there you have it - always read the 'tiny print' very carefully or, if you can't see it, then hopefully you have read this print! Best of all bin these letters as soon as they come in. Many folks can get caught up in a cycle of replying to such letters, often because they are lonely, so we all need to keep an eye out for them not to become entrapped.

Dear Friends,

In the middle Sundays of May, a Scottish Church Census was held across the length and breadth of the country and across all of the many denominations which have a presence in Scotland. This census comes hot on the heels of the Social Attitudes Survey which was recently published and which makes clear that less and less Scots identify themselves as Christian – and yet, in some ways, a surprisingly large number still do so!

The census will tell us what we already know; that is, that fewer people attend church than once was the case. It will also tell us that those who do are largely older. Beyond that, it will provide us with some more nuanced information which will allow us to get a more detailed feel for the place of the church in modern-day Scotland.

Here's one statistic to conjure with; the average church in Scotland today has 83 people in worship on a Sunday morning. Of course there are many substantially bigger churches and in rural and urban deprived parishes there are many which are considerable smaller! But on average, there will be 83 people in a church on a Sunday.

Against that, our own census Sunday revealed 245 men, women and children to be present. On some Sundays we'll have more than that and on some Sundays less than that but on the day of the census that's how many people were in St Andrew's Church.

On one level, we can be pleased. We're running well above the national average and we have a healthier spread of ages than in most congregations. And whereas most churches have just the one service, we have two every Sunday and one on a Wednesday, meaning that there are options to be present in worship if Sunday morning is not possible.

But let us NEVER, EVER BECOME COMPLACENT. Our figure of 245 is less than once it was and it is strikingly obvious that we have fewer children present than was the case a few years ago. Of course, we are quite clear that there is much more to measuring the strength of a church than simply counting 'bottms on seats'! And our work among children is considerably wider than just what we organise on Sunday mornings. Even so, we long for more people to attend worship! We long for more people to become part of our family. And most of all, we long for more people, in our town of Arbroath, to come to a living faith in Jesus Christ and to receive him as Saviour and Lord.

It would be easy to look around and say, 'Well, we're doing better than most in terms of people coming to church.' I don't know about you but I'm not prepared to do that – because I see the huge, as yet untapped, potential and because, daily, I am in contact with people who know nothing of the saving grace of Christ or of his peace in their lives. For as long as that remains the case, God has work for us to do!

Ask Theophilus

Ouestion:

Last month, I visited my sister Elma in Glasgow. Her husband never goes to church, but because I was there for the weekend, he said he'd attend the Sunday service with us. He winked at me and said, 'It's worth a few Brownie points with Elma!'

The sermon was on Galatians 3:23-28. During his address he said we were free from the Old Testament Law, because Jesus said the only Laws were to 'Love God and love your neighbour'. All other Jewish Laws were abolished. At lunch that day, Elma's husband winked at me again and said, 'Love is the only Law, is it? I love putting a bet on the horses and attending the lap-dancing club! Your minister says that's alright, Elma, because I love it.' Is that what the minister meant? Are *all* Old Testament Laws abolished for Christians?

Theophilus answers:

I can't for one moment think your sister's minister meant that we may do anything we happen to like doing! The Old Testament Laws of Judaism can be neatly broken down into three groups. First, the Moral Law—that is, the Ten Commandments; second, the Ceremonial Law—that is,

the Laws about sacrifices, diet, purification rituals, circumcision and so on; third, the Civil Law—that is, Laws about ordinary every day living, such as rules about property, inheritance, compensation for damage and so on.

The passage in Galatians refers to the Ceremonial Laws. They are abolished because, in different ways, they all were pointing forward to Christ and his redeeming work. He has fulfilled all the ceremonial regulations. Supremely, he was the Passover Lamb, the Passover and Day of Atonement being the Jewish festival towards which and from which, all other ceremonies flowed.

The Moral Law has certainly not been abolished. Usually when the New Testament is referring to the Ten Commandments, the word 'commandment' is used. See, for example, Romans 7:8-12, where the word 'commandment' is used five times; verse 12 reads, 'So the commandment is holy and righteous and good.' (See also Ephesians 6:2.)

A wise minister would, I am sure, point out this distinction, otherwise he might be misunderstood as preaching libertarianism! The libertarian advocates the freedom for everyone to do exactly as they please! Can anyone ever imagine that Jesus supported such views? Read the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew chapters 5-7)!!!

Angus Bible Week

This year sees the second running of the Angus Bible Week, hosted by the Town Mission as a natural successor to the old-style conventions that ran for so many years under Mr. Clapham.

Dave Webster, the Mission's Pastor for some three years now, is keen to establish a new look event that might more appropriately respond to the needs of this day and age.

The theme this year is 'Our Great God' and the event runs from 2-6th August. David Searle will lead bible studies every morning, and our own Martin is one of the invited preachers for the evening meetings (in his case, on the Thursday evening.)

If you're not away on holiday, why not put the dates in your diary and get along to the Town Mission to support them in this excellent initiative.

Youth Work Update

As many of you will know, our Youth Group have recently been camping for the weekend just outside Forfar. This weekend proves to be one of the most enjoyable events in our calendar and feedback from the young people shows this year was no exception. The group decided they wanted a survival theme, so being married to an outdoorsman proved handy for me. We played group games, took on challenges, made rafts, kayaked on the pond and had a barbeque in the scorching sun. God gave us sunshine after the week of rain!

I felt the Old Testament is less well known by the young people so Michael, Amy and I shared several stories from this part of the Bible over the three days. With the theme in mind, we chose Daniel and the Fiery Furnace, Israel in the Wilderness, Noah's Ark and David and Goliath, focussing on peer pressure, earthly desires, trusting God and overcoming obstacles. Whilst spending time discussing God's

Word is invaluable, playing games and toasting marshmallows round the fire was so important for me during this trip. Getting to know our young people a bit better was just wonderful!

I would like to say thank you to the Skea family for their willingness to host us. Their kindness is so greatly appreciated by the leaders and young people.

Thank You from **Arbroath Choral Society.**

Thirty eight years ago the Choral Society held its first concert in St Andrew's Church and continued with a Christmas Concert and the main one in the Spring for a few years.

However, the comfort of the audience had to be considered when longer choral works meant sitting on hard pews for long periods and so the decision was taken to move to the Webster Theatre. This involved acquiring scaffolding and constructing a lid over the pit so that the choir and orchestra could be on one level. However, while the seating was more comfortable, we discovered one major disadvantage in that the acoustic of the theatre is nothing like the wonderful standard of that in St Andrew's.

Back we came and then when the church was refurbished it proved to be the most wonderful venue – comfort for the audience, enough room for the orchestra, that wonderful acoustic, and excellent facilities for catering etc.

So now, we regard St

Andrew's as our home we rehearse in the small halls on Sunday evenings for 30 weeks of the year and hold both our concerts in the sanctuary. This pro-

vides quite an income for the church in the charges for hiring the premises. For the concerts we have stewards from our Events Team and the Fellowship Group provide the catering.

At our Saturday rehearsal before the main concert, the Guild ladies have held a coffee morning on the same day and this allows us to be relieved of the task of providing refreshments for the choir and orchestra and allows us to contribute to Guild funds.

It is significant that other local musical groups now hold their concerts in St Andrew's as well.

Personally, being in such familiar territory is such a wonderful thing for me. Thank you for all your support and to the many of you who regularly attend the concerts. JM


I hope that next year's volunteers will feel just as welcome in St Andrew's as I do and I pray every blessing on them as they work with the church in the coming term.


