This was prepared by our Cordon Bleu catering team and served by members of the Youth Group. Elaine and Martin were the guests, along with the Rev George Whyte, the Clerk to Edinburgh Presbytery. Some of the company met George several years ago when we were setting up the Core Groups and he led us on a study day in Montrose. His skill as an after-dinner speaker was much appreciated and he struck a superb balance between humorous comment on his friendship with Martin and his more formal and fulsome tribute to him.

The decision to have an 'At Home' afternoon with Elaine and Martin was taken to allow a wide range of people to drop in to the Hall in an informal setting to reminisce and chat, as the opportunity for the latter was not possible in the formality of the main service of thanksgiving. Because this took place at the time of the celebration of our poet Robert Burns, Scottish treats such as shortbread and dumpling were served. It was good to see such an excellent turnout.

The preparation for the main service had aspects shrouded in secrecy and it was necessary to do some of the preparation when Martin was not in the building! A special commemorative programme was prepared with photos of Martin and Elaine – then and now – on the front. The back page was filled with meaningful pictures of the Manse family.

In the sanctuary, beautifully enhanced by floral decorations, there were sixty guests representing family, friends, ministerial colleagues and those who are colleagues in Martin's wider work and interests. Considerable research was undertaken to track some of these people down, to invite them, and swear them to secrecy so that the first that Martin would know of some of them was when he sat down in the sanctuary. There was great success in this and all the effort involved was well worth it. It was also significant that several ministers who undertook parts of their ministerial training at St Andrew's, were present.

The service was led by The Very Reverend Doctor John

Chalmers, a former Moderator and the current Clerk to the General Assembly. He is no stranger to St Andrew's and his excellent message was so relevant to the occasion and to us all in our following of Christ. The lessons were read by Rev Dr Ruth Morrison and Rev Stuart Irvin. Amy-Louise Scott gave a superb children's address and, during an activity time, the children created a banner which was later hoisted high in the sanctuary as their tribute to Martin and Elaine.

Presentations were made to Elaine and Martin after which Martin spoke in reply. They will appreciate the generosity of all of you and will have pleasure in deciding what they might do with the gift.

After the benediction there was one final ceremony when a cake, with a picture of St Andrew's Church on it, was cut. The congregation then had the opportunity to have tea and cake to bring the uplifting morning to its conclusion.

After Martin was called to us, such is his skill and ability as a leader and preacher, we thought that we would be lucky to have him for five years - then ten went past and now we are at twenty-five! How blessed we are to have Team Fair still with us, and still very vibrant. Inspired preaching has encouraged us to be faithful and to strive for the vision that God has for us.

Grateful thanks are extended to all those who helped in any way with the preparation for all the events.

Dear Friends,

Annual Stated Meeting

Every congregation is required by law to hold an annual meeting, with these meetings traditionally taking place in the month of March. The primary purpose is that the congregational accounts might be received. In advance of the annual meeting, the Kirk Session (whose members are the trustees) is responsible for approving the accounts. They do so in the knowledge that the Finance Committee has already done the work of detailed scrutiny and, on top of that, that an independent examiner is required to study the ac-

counts.

So, the members of the congregation hear a presentation on the accounts at the annual meeting but they have no legal responsibility in relation to the finances of the congregation and so do not have to formally approve them. Nonetheless, it is a good opportunity for congregation members to get a flavour of how we're doing financially speaking.

This year, the Annual Stated Meeting takes place after morning worship on Sunday 12th March. We look forward to seeing you then.

Ask Theophilus

Question :

In Hebrews 11:11, it says, 'By faith Sarah herself received power to conceive, even when she was past the age, since she considered him faithful who had promised.' But in the whole Genesis account, she was a worse doubter than Thomas. She used a surrogate mother to get a son, and when she heard Abraham being told she would have a son within a year, she mocked in her heart; then she told a lie and said she hadn't mocked at all (Genesis 16:1-6; 18:9-15). Is this praise of her in Hebrews 11:11 a contradiction?

Theophilus answers :

Wow! That's a nasty one, whoever thought that up! Readers must all know how footprints of dinosaurs have been found in mud, preserved for tens of thousands of years. This question has missed an equally clear footprint, not preserved in mud but preserved in Scripture. It doesn't need an archaeologist to uncover it! Yes, Sarah often doubted. But there is a footprint of faith.

In Genesis 18, we find one of those rare accounts in the Bible of a 'theophany', that is of a visitation of God disguised as a man. Another well-known 'theophany' is

Jacob's strange wrestling match; as the sun rose on him and he was now permanently disabled, his conclusion was, 'I have seen God face to face' (Genesis 32:30).

Three men visited Abraham. Together they ate the meal Sarah served, but two of them left; those two are later said to have been 'angels' (compare 18:22 with 19:1). The main 'visitor' is called 'the Lord' (ten times). It was this third visitor who renewed the promise to Abraham of a son by Sarah. He it was who accused Sarah of her mocking laugh of doubt, though she was hiding unseen within the tent. When she realised that this 'visitor' who insisted she had laughed in spite of her denials, we read, 'she was afraid' (18:15). She now realised this was no ordinary person, for this Man could read her heart.

It was this 'fear' that made the clear footprint in the sands of time; it was a reverent, holy fear of 'the Lord'. This is important for us all. In Scripture, doubt is not despised. God only needs one tiny grain of faith to do his work through us. Just as from Sarah's 'midden' of doubts there glimmered one tiny spark of faith when she became afraid, aware of a divine presence, so for you and me that footprint is there for our encouragement. 'Is it you, Lord?' we ask tremblingly. 'Yes, it is', he answers. And we at last believe!

In amongst the worship services and the various parties, we did what we always do and took up a special offering to support the work of two nominated charities. This year, the offering was split between Alzheimer's Scotland and Seamus House in India - a home for children rescued from people traffickers. The good news is that these two charities will benefit from an offering that totalled over £1,100.

Dalitso Project New Year News

The container arrived in Malawi in time for Christmas and the children connected to our centres enjoyed their Christmas party and presents from their sponsors. The aid has now been distributed and is beginning to impact positively on the lives of the Malawian people.

As always the work doesn't stop and we have already begun collecting for our next container and we again appreciate the contributions from members of the congregation.

Can we ask that donations are not left on Sheila's doorstep but instead you contact her to arrange a drop off time (07752467654). This will help in the organising and transporting of boxes to our storage unit.

Fundraisers planned for coming months - On February 26th and April 31st we have soup lunches at the church after the service and on March 18th our annual Murder Mystery evening which includes a 3 course meal. We look forward to seeing you at some or all of these. Tickets will be on sale for the Murder Mystery in the next few weeks.

Clerk's Corner - Annual Stated Meeting

The Annual Stated Meeting for 2017 will take place on Sunday 12th March at the end of morning worship. In preparation, members are asked to read the minute from last year given below.

The Annual Stated Meeting was held after Morning Worship in St Andrew's Church on Sunday 15th March 2016 and was constituted with prayer.

Moderator: Rev Dr W Martin Fair BA BD

Sederunt: 78 members of the congregation were in attendance.

The minute of the Annual Stated Meeting held in St Andrew's Church on 15 March 2015 was approved on the motion of B Gerrard seconded by E Anderson.

Moderator's Comments: The moderator commented on the fact that St Andrew's has only had two ministers in its history and it is important to remember our journey and who we are. Our course is a steady one and we constantly remind ourselves of our three areas of Welcome, Witness and Worship. Locally our witness is in the area of the great need to bring compassion to broken people. The Havilah ministry is at the forefront of this and mention was made of how two former clients are working and witnessing to others. Both had been BBs and the link to St Andrew's has been pivotal in their development.

The funding for Havilah is precarious as new sources are sought and the congregation was asked to pray for God's help in this.

Internationally our partner work is in Malawi in partnership with AquAid. This work has grown in a way which could never have been envisaged and the amount of money raised by the congregation and organised by the Dunphy and Bowie families is staggering. Because of this growth it has been decided that the work will now be under the care of a separate trust which will be independent of the congregation. All existing support will continue and this may prosper even further in its wider remit.

Finance Report: The Presentation of the Accounts for 2015: The accounts for 2015 were scrutinised by the Finance and Administration Core Group, approved by the Kirk Session, and finally examined and approved by the independent examiner and presented to Presbytery.

Scott Anderson, leader of the Finance and Administration Core Group presented the detail of the figures for 2015 using both an extract and the relevant sections from the main accounts as they are prepared for OSCR. The full version

was made available for those who wished to have a copy.

Beginning with the figures for the Big Picture, the Statement of Financial Activities for 2015 showed all incoming and expended resources. It was noted that a legacy of £40,000 had been received from the estate of a member of the congregation for our work in Malawi and this had been sent to AquAid for this purpose.

The General Account outturn was £20,985 and the surplus on the General account was £3,992. After the transfer of £3,000 to Havilah, £5,000 to the Fabric Fund and £250 required for the payment of the Associate Minister, the end of the year reserve sum was £12,735. There is now a requirement for a Reserves Policy and this aspect will be studied by the Finance and Administration Core Group.

Regarding the work in Malawi, concern was expressed from the floor about the movement away from St Andrew's to an independent trust and whether this might result in costly bureaucracy. Reassurance was given about this and also about contingency plans being in place in response to need. To this end there will be a retiral offering on Easter Sunday.

The Moderator thanked Scott for his clear presentation of the figures, and the Finance and Administration Core Group for their work in overseeing the financial aspects of St Andrew's. The Treasurer, Susan Godsall was thanked for carrying out the very demanding role of Treasurer and Heather Black for her valuable role as deputy.

Thanks: Appreciation of all the work which our Associate minister, Stuart Irvin has undertaken was recorded and God's blessing extended to him and his family for his work in his future charge.

The Session Clerk, conveyed the deepest thanks of the Kirk Session and congregation to Martin for his inspired teaching throughout the year and in particular the effectiveness of the themes for study chosen. Throughout these, we have been challenged, inspired and encouraged. These comments had been made on a previous occasion and are still very apposite.

In the coming months there will be no Associate Minister, and we must ensure that the burden on one person is not too great. We were therefore urged to accept the challenges of the weekly messages and to respond accordingly by supporting our minister in every way, both in the church and the community. Martin and his family were commended to God's care.
