# **Godly Play**

This year, our children will be using Godly Play as their Sunday morning resource. This is a new development for us, having exhausted most of the other options over the years! We very much hope that our children will enjoy it and that they will thrive through it, in their developing faith journeys. We'd be equally delighted if it led to more children coming around regularly on Sunday mornings.

Godly Play takes children on a journey through the Christian year with the emphasis being on creative storytelling and imaginative response. The children will hear each biblical story on several occasions, allowing them to become increasingly familiar with the narrative and more used to finding ways to make sense of the stories and work out how each one matters in day to day life. Our leaders will employ creative, interactive ways to share the stories and then the children will have opportunity, through play and creative activity, to respond.

Churches that already use Godly Play have found it to be hugely rewarding and that children of all ages have responded positively.

Please pray for our leaders and for our children as they set out on this new adventure. May they indeed draw nearer to God through Godly Play.

# **Ask Theophilus**

#### **Question:**

The question last time was this: In our home group there has been quite a bit of discussion about what is called 'believer's baptism'. Should we all be baptized as adults by immersion, even if we were baptized as infants?

#### Theophilus answers:

I pointed out that infant baptism and believer's baptism are two different things. We only dealt with infant baptism in the previous article. Now we consider 'believer's baptism'. I also pointed out that infant baptism (and this also applies to adult baptism) is the successor to the Old Testament (OT) covenantal rite of circumcision, and like circumcision is an outward sign of the Holy Spirit's promised inward work of regeneration.

Believer's baptism is quite different, for it must be preceded by a confession of faith in the inward work of the Holy Spirit that has already been done in the believer: thus candidates for baptism must profess their faith prior to being baptized. Our Baptist friends have three main Scriptural arguments to prove this is New Testament (NT) baptism.

First, they say that the Greek verb translated 'to baptize' means 'to immerse'. I have to disagree. The problem with the lexicons is that they invariably define the verb 'baptize' as it was used by pagan Greek writers. An important principle of understanding the meaning of NT Greek words is to recognize that they have Hebrew meanings, not pagan Greek meanings. In the OT cleansing was symbolized outwardly by sprinkling, using hyssop that had been dipped in

water (Numbers 19:18; Psalm 51:7; see also Hebrews 6:2, where 'washings' is literally 'baptisms'). The hyssop was dipped in water, and then the water was shaken upon the person who needed cleansing. Thus in the text just quoted, David prays, 'Cleanse me with hyssop and I shall be clean' (Ps. 51:7).

Second, they quote Acts 8:36, where the Ethiopian asks for baptism. The verse where Philip answers, "'If you believe you may.' And the Ethiopian replied, 'I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God," is not in the Bible! No modern translation has v37, because it was inserted 400 years after the book of Acts was written; it only occurs as a footnote. There is no other verse in the NT that states baptism is a profession of faith. Therefore, personally, I cannot accept that baptism is primarily a confession faith; confession is made with the lips, not with water (Romans 10:10).

The third argument our Baptist friends offer is that there is no evidence in the New Testament for the baptism of children. But 'household baptism' is referred to several times (Acts 16:15, 31-33; 1 Cor. 1:16; see also Acts 2:39). There is considerable evidence from first century writings of 'household baptism'. When the head of the house became a Christian (as in the three references above), the local church prepared him and his entire family for baptism. Nor was this a formality: the preparation lasted as long as six months.

Finally, in the Reformed Churches, no particular mode of baptism is laid down. As long as water is used, it can be administered by sprinkling, by ablution (water poured over the candidate) or by immersion. All are acceptable in the Kirk, and held to be agreeable to the Word of God.

first time. You can do that by making sure that you speak to them at every opportunity AND by inviting them from time to time to have lunch or dinner at your house.

Both Old and New Testaments make it clear that hospitality is a thoroughly Godly activity and that as we welcome people into our homes, our communities and our lives, we're welcoming our Lord. Those of you who are parents, think about it this way: that you'd hope that if your young people were moving away that they'd be warmly welcomed wherever they went!

We will watch with interest to see how God will use Andrew, Euan and Eveline during this coming year and we will wait with anticipation to see how He will bless us through them.

## **Community Spirit**

Within Community Spirit there are two meeting rooms which are used regularly for a variety of things. One of them is our computer suite which Havilah clients use for job match searches, basic computer skills and literacy and numeracy training, and it also doubles up as a room where we can have one-to- one chats with our clients.

Our second meeting room is used for a variety of things. one being a quiet place for folks to go who felt anxious or stressed. We are lucky enough to have one of the volunteers, David Spink, who is trained in Relaxation Therapy and this has proved hugely popular with quite a few of our clients. This was something that we wanted to develop and therefore offer at Havilah.

We were fortunate enough earlier this year to be awarded £865 from "Your Voice Your Choice" which is a new initiative set up by the Scottish Government which gives money through the Church of Scotland to local community groups. With this money we have decorated the room in a lovely relaxing colour, purchased a recliner sofa and mood lamps and also some Bluetooth equipment which includes headphones to listen to relaxing music.

David currently has 5-6 individuals a week who use this room on a regular basis and it is having a great impact on their wellbeing. We are regularly looking for ways to make a difference at Havilah and now being able to offer this service is fantastic.

Summer holidays have come and gone and it's now time to look forward to our new Guild year, which is to be all about 'love'. A varied syllabus has been planned with serious and fun nights in store. These will look at the different interpretations of love, passion – friendships - devotion.

The whole day will end with what is going to be a wonderful closing worship, led by Phil Mellstrom – another worship leader of considerable skill and sensitivity.

We are very hopeful that people will be coming to St. Andrew's from further afield for this weekend – whether the Friday evening, the Saturday conference or both. But of course, we're counting on lots of St. Andrew's members to get involved! We'd love to see you there and are sure that it will be a weekend to remember.
