

Dear Friends,

It's been a while! Some of you will perhaps have forgotten that you even have a minister!! Then again, the discerning among you will have noticed that in fact we have lots of 'ministers' at St. Andrew's and that just because 'the boss' is away, the ministry and mission of the church doesn't grind to a shuddering halt.

Although I'm not in the clear yet, it has been great to be able to lead Sunday worship through March and over the Easter season. I'll be able to continue with this until my next round of operations, the timing of those being in the hands of my surgeon.

And so, for as long as I'm around, let me take the opportunity to say a huge 'thank you' to those who have done most to cover my absence. Few of us have been surprised that Jane, our Session Clerk, and Linda, our Administrator, and Janis, our Church Officer, have so ably ensured that, organisationally-speaking, it's been business as usual. (Certain people never think twice about going the extra mile when duty calls.) But these three have been well supported by many others, each of whom has risen to the challenges put before them. Thanks, too, to Keith and Ian who have carried most of the responsibility for worship, on Sundays and Wednesdays, and to a small team of our worship leaders who have ensured that our Sunday evening worship has continued. Ian and our pastoral care team have done their best to offer care when needs have arisen – and to do so when more stretched than is usually the case. And what about our volunteers? Andrew and Euan have done wonderfully well and have just got on with it (though they had come fully expecting to be working much more closely with me than has been possible.)

While many have been involved practically, others – being less able physically-speaking or in terms of availability of time – have faithfully been praying for my recovery and for the well-being of the congregation more generally. By Jesus' death we are put right with God, freed to live life in all its fullness. And wonderfully so, by his death, death is beaten.

Thanks be to God. And all the people said, AMEN!

Surely in our lives as Christians within our church we uphold any situation that affects both our own personal lives and all other families within and outwith the St Andrew's Church congregation.

Easter Reflection

In the week leading up to Easter, I read a hilarious article on the BBC website which probably seemed much less funny to those involved! A Yorkshire-based Baptist church had ordered a number of large banners intended for hanging outside their buildings in the lead up to Easter. The banners carried the simple but striking declaration: 'Christ is risen!' Only one problem. Someone at the printers had made a terrible mistake – and presumably the proof-reader had taken an early lunch that day – resulting in the 't' of Christ being missed from the banners. 'Chris is risen!' was the result!!

Given that the minister of the church in question is called Chris, no doubt there will be plenty of laughs about this particular fiasco in time to come! But beyond the hilarity, there lies a theological truth which we should take notice off, remember and treasure in our hearts.

It's this. You could take any name and put it where 'Chris' is. You could put your own name there! You'll find this truth wrapped up in the fourteenth chapter of John's Gospel. It's put this way: 'Because Christ lives, you also shall live.' John 14:19.

The bedrock of the Christian faith is that Christ died AND rose again. Death, the final enemy, is beaten! But if this was no more than some kind of historical discrepancy then it wouldn't necessarily mean that much to us now. We rejoice, though, that Christ rose so that we too might live. The Apostle Paul puts it beautifully: 'For just as all people die because of their union with Adam, in the same way all will be raised to life because of their union with Christ. 23 But each one will be raised in proper order: Christ, first of all; then, at the time of his coming, those who belong to him.'

And we belong to him when we do... well, nothing. We don't have to DO anything! We belong to him when we receive his love, when we hear him knocking and invite him into our lives as Saviour and Lord. At that point, we too are alive as risen people. Yes, Christ is risen. Yes, Christ the minister of that Baptist Church is risen! And we, too, are risen with Christ – risen to a new life in the here and now and risen for eternity.

That's our Easter faith, that offers us light in dark places and hope in the midst of despair. May it sustain each of us this and every day.

Ask Theophilus

Question:

What does Jesus mean when he says, 'Unless you eat the flesh of the Sin of Man and drink his blood, you have no life in you... My flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink. Whoever feeds on my flesh and drinks my blood abides in me and I in him.' (John 6:53, 55-56.)

Theophilus answers:

The first point we should notice is that while the Last Supper (it was originally the Passover Feast) is recorded in Matthew, Mark and Luke, there is no record of it in John's Gospel. We must ask why. A very likely reason is that, as the young Church came under severe persecution throughout the Roman Empire, one of the allegations made against believers was that they practised cannibalism, for they gathered together on the first day of the week to eat human flesh and drink human blood. This appalling accusation obviously was a reference to the bread and wine of Communion.

It is generally agreed that John wrote his Gospel around 95AD, by which time the lurid tales of the believers' 'cannibalism' had spread far and wide. So to avoid giving the church's enemies more evidence for their slander, so to speak, John did not include at the end of his Gospel any account of Jesus instituting the Lord's Supper. The opponents of the church would hardly bother to read through his whole Gospel, but would search the final section immediately before the record of his arrest and crucifixion. But in John's Gospel they would find no 'incriminating evidence' they could use. Instead, John tucked away all mention of the flesh and blood of Christ somewhere in the middle of

his story of Christ's ministry.

So what, then, did Jesus mean in the words quoted in the question? In other words, what is the true meaning of the bread and wine in the Communion Service? A simple way to explain this is to go back to the Passover in Exodus 12. The final plague visited upon the Egyptians was when the Angel of Death 'passed over' the land of Egypt. The Hebrew slaves were instructed to prepare a meal of roast lamb, and in the preparation they were told to take some of the lamb's blood and sprinkle it on the lintels and doorposts of their houses. When the destroying Angel passed over, seeing the blood it would not inflict the tenth plague on that household.

Two things were needed for this to work for each slave family. First, they must believe the instructions Moses gave them. Second, they must obey them. Faith and obedience were absolutely essential for their redemption from slavery.

Transfer those two conditions across to the Lord's Supper. First, faith: the promise of life through the bread (symbol of Christ's flesh and body), and cleansing through the wine (symbol of his life-blood poured out for us) must be believed and actively embraced as the living word of God. Second, obedience: we must avail ourselves of the Lord's Supper and not walk away from it, for whatever reasons. To despise or ignore Communion is to despise and ignore God himself. For by faith and obedience, spiritually we eat his flesh and drink his blood. Note 'spiritually', for Jesus himself added in verse 63, 'It is the Spirit who gives life; the flesh is no avail.'

That was a good question, whoever sent it to me. I hope you find the answer helpful.

GUILD NEWS

On Monday 5th March our guild enjoyed a very interesting talk by Marjori Clark on Solar Powered Ovens. Using the information from the guild reports it informs us about the project.

Bolivia is one of the poorest and most unequal countries in South America. Millions of people live in difficult conditions, struggling to survive. The Bolivian Amazon is one of the most bio-diverse regions in the world, yet it is increasingly under threat from deforestation. Deforestation coupled with climate change has left communities who rely on the forest for survival vulnerable, as crops flood and livelihoods are lost. Women very often have to spend hours every day collecting firewood for cooking. Not only does this prevent them from engaging in other activities, but when the forest is under water it becomes difficult to get wood for cooking and families are unable to even boil water.

Through Christian Aid partners, this project will work with over 700 families to educate them about climate change and support them to build and use solar powered ovens enabling families to eat year round. Partnering with the Church of Scotland in Bolivia, Christian Aid Scotland will use this story to link Guilds to our current work on climate change and give practical ways to get involved.

The total from the end of January 2018 that our Guilds have raised towards this project over the past 3 years is £89,785.39

On Monday 19th March we had our Topic Night where we explored issues around the "other side" of Going in Love. As Christians, the Bible tells us that love is unconditional, but even Christians have people in their lives they don't like and find it hard to love. In small groups we asked ourselves questions - for example, 'How did the dislike come about'? 'How did you overcome the disike and turn it around to show your love and if the situation was not resolved how have you coped with this'? Thanks to Pat Jackson who lead this evening.

By the time the magazines comes out we will have had our film night and paraded our Easter Bonnets.

To finish our 2017/2018 session of the Guild our AGM is on Monday 16th April. All are welcome.

Finally our Coffee Morning this year is on Saturday 21st April 2018, tickets are available from guild members or on the day. Please come along and support us.
