Minister's Letter

Dear Friends,

Well here it is - my last Minister's Letter for the time being!

I learned that I had been chosen to serve as the next Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland back in September and it seemed to me then that this 'day of departure' was a long time off. But here it is none-theless. The last months have simply flown in – partly because they've been so busy and partly, I suppose, because time seems to go by more quickly the older one gets!

Much as I'm looking forward to the year ahead, serving as Moderator, it's going to be an enormous wrench being away from St. Andrew's Church. There is the two-month period of preparation that I'm about to embark on and there will be a month of recovering at the end! So all in all I'll be away for fifteen months. I'm sure these months will fly by, but I know too that, inevitably, there will be events and happenings here, among my 'family of faith', and the hardest thing for me is that I will not be able to be involved and to minister among you as I have these last twenty-eight years.

Even in recent weeks, we've lost some of our cherished brothers and sisters and there's been a part of me whispering, 'I'm glad this was now and not after my departure'.

All of that arises out of my fondness and love for you all. And in return, the way you have supported Elaine and me and our family, and held us in your prayers, has meant so much to me.

But here's the thing; I would never have accepted the nomination to serve as Moderator if I hadn't been absolutely sure that the congregation would be able to cope perfectly well in my absence. My confidence in this flows from two sources. Firstly, we have within the congregation many wonderful, able and talented people who have a willingness to serve that is nothing short of remarkable. And secondly, I know beyond doubt that it is Christ's church, not mine, and that He will strengthen and uphold His church in all these months ahead – and, of course, when I'm back and long after I'm long forgotten.

This is to say that none of us is indispensable and that we must always look beyond ourselves to the one who is 'King and Head of the Church' – to the one who declares: 'I will build my Church and not even the gates of hell shall prevail against it'. (Matthew 16:18)

I close with these thoughts:

- 1. Respect and take a lead from those who will be in positions of authority during my absence.
- 2. Be willing to follow where the Spirit leads I don't expect to find things the same when I return to you!
- 3. Where possible, please keep an eye out for Elaine this will be an extremely demanding year for her as she seeks to juggle her career with caring for her mum and dad, our own boys, and playing her role alongside me as Moderator. It will be challenging for both of us managing everything whilst largely being apart from one another.
- 4. And finally, I can ask no more of you other than that you continue to uphold me in your prayers in what is shaping up to be a thoroughly exciting, yet daunting, year.

(P.S. Yes, this is my last Minister's Letter for the time being but I'll be endeavouring to keep you up to date with my comings and goings through regular QUEST updates.)

Exciting Plans For The Year

As we've stressed a thousand times through the years, the Christian life requires much more of us than that we show up on Sunday mornings. During this coming year, we've got a fantastic programme of Sunday worship lined up - SO MUCH to look forward to.

There may be odd occasions when other local ministers will assist if, for example, Ian is unavailable. Ian McLean from Montrose will be on hand and Dolly Purnell from Old & Abbey Church has also kindly offered to step in if we're in need.

Guild

It was lovely to see some extra folk at our meeting on the 27th of January. This was the evening Sandra Ramsay came to see us and speak about Reach Across, the charity she began after the tragic loss of her son, Ross. Sandra is very passionate about helping those who feel desperate and giving support to their friends and families. She was very open about all that has happened over the seven years since Ross' death and she was an inspiration. She has a big heart and is determined to do all she can for those in need.

Our theme "Companions on the Road" has been mainly about the work of those who help others in difficult situations but we can all be 'companions' in our daily life... e.g. Kenny Borthwick - and some of our much-loved former students and associate ministers – e.g. Ruth Morrison, Stuart Irvin, Karen Fenwick and Linda Stevens.

- 2. On the second Sunday of each month, we'll be doing things 'in house' - that is making use of the considerable talent that we've got within the ranks. The Guild will lead worship at the time of Guild Week, some of our younger people will lead worship and so on. Much to look forward to.
- 3. We're delighted that on the third Sunday of each month, Grant Maclaughlan from Perth will lead our worship. Grant led several times while Martin was off work recovering from his accident and he is very much looking forward to returning. Through his weeks, he is going to lead us through the Apostles' Creed and will ask how the core Christian beliefs contained within relate to everyday life.
- 4. On the fourth Sunday of the month, we're going to work our way through the whole of the Alpha film series. These are excellent films, each lasting about twenty minutes and each one focussing on a key aspect of Christian life and faith. After each film there will be guided discussion time, allowing for the whole congregation to share together.
- 5. Finally, when there is a fifth Sunday, these services will be led by Ian Gray, our Locum, and a long time friend of the congregation. (Given that Ian is an ordained minister, as is Grant, baptisms and communions will be celebrated when one of these ministers is with us.)

Alongside Ian, Gaynor Scott will continue with her incredible pastoral ministry in the various care homes around the town. She's being doing that for quite a few years now and those she visits hugely appreciate the time and care she offers.

And over and above that, members of the pastoral care team and various of our elders will take their place in this ministry.

Given the drastic shortage of ministers across Scotland, many congregations have to get by without a minister of their own – sometimes for many months but more frequently for several years. And, by and large, these churches rise to the challenge and realise that there is much that they can do on their own! Maybe Martin will return and find that he's only got a part-time job to come back to!

"Whose we are and whom we serve"

Ask Theophilus

Question:

I have been trying to read a psalm every day. I've reached Psalm 119 and was surprised to find that, three times, the Psalmist says God had afflicted him. Is this a kind of spiritual masochism? (My iPad dictionary says that masochism is finding gratification from pain and humiliation!)

Theophilus answers:

Oh dear, I don't think that masochism is what we find in the three lines in the Psalm that you are referring to (verses 67, 71, 75). The Psalmist, whose name we are not given, says:

Before I was afflicted I went astray, but now I keep your word (67).

It is good for me that I was afflicted, that I might learn your statutes (71).

I know O Lord that your judgments are righteous, and that in faithfulness you have afflicted me (75).

The meaning of the word 'afflicted' in each of these verses is 'chastened'. I have said before that chastening is not the same as punishment. Rather, chastening is disciplining. We tend to think of discipline in a negative way and wrongly regard it as punishment. But not in the Bible, where discipline means teaching; its 'cousin' is the word 'disciple' and both words are to do with learning.

Having said that, chastening (the Psalmist's 'affliction') can be hard to bear. Read carefully what he is saying in verse 67. He is admitting that he often left the path of obedience to God's laws (understand 'laws' as the moral law, that is, the ten commandments). In some way that he doesn't describe (it was evidently private and personal between him and his Lord), God chastened him, and he learned his lesson and now was more obedient.

In verse 71 he spells it out clearly: God's discipline was precisely to teach and train him—*that I might learn your statutes.* In verse 75, he acknowledges that it was in God's loving goodness he had been afflicted.

The phrase that comes to mind is that God's love is a 'tough love'. But 'tough love' can be the truest and wisest love. God doesn't have dementia so that he has forgotten his moral laws, but he does know and see everyone of us and he is only too well aware of our human frailty and fallibility. And so in righteousness and faithfulness he 'afflicts' us, that is, he chastens and disciplines us, so that we will learn to walk along that secure and strait pathway that leads to life and ultimately to our heavenly home.

(Some readers of Quest might like to look up Hebrews 12:5 -11; 1 Peter 1:6-7.)

They are called "Sweetpo Taters"!




Here I Am, Lord

How can you make a difference? Here are some ideas for how you can take part in Living Lent:

- * Switch to buying loose fruit and vegetables rather than pre -packaged.
- * Give up your takeaway coffee cup – instead, remember and pack a reusable cup in the mornings.
- * Switch up your lightbulbs to more energy-efficient alternatives – LED bulbs are the most energy-efficient, using 75% less electricity than traditional incandescent lightbulbs.

* If you can, opt for walking, cycling, public transport or lift-sharing over taking your car. If you can't give up your car, look into carbon offsetting to help balance out the environmental impact.

Living Lent

Living Lent, the cross-denominational Lent initiative from the Joint Public Issues Team, is back for another year. Running throughout the 40 days of Lent, from Wednesday 26 February until Thursday 9 April, Living Lent will once again invite all Christians to commit to changing their lifestyles for the climate by signing up for one of the six challenges.

Those who sign up are encouraged to pick a challenge that will stretch them – such as choosing an alternative mode of travel or only buying locally-sourced food.

JPIT hopes that, by making these commitments alongside one-another, Christians will be able to explore the connection between faith and climate action.

Annual Stated Meeting

As is required of us, the congregation will hold its Annual Stated Meeting following morning worship on Sunday 15th March 2020. Though the Kirk Session – as the congregation's trustees – will already have approved the accounts for 2019, and though they will already have been subject to external examination, this is the opportunity for members of our congregation to see for themselves how we are doing, financially speaking.

Of course there's much more to church life than the finances but without healthy and properly stewarded finances, there's precious little that a church can do by way of ministry and mission!

Please make a note of the date and do your best to be present. The minute of the previous year will not be read out, as it is given below for your convenience.

The Kirk Session met on Sunday 17th March 2019 in the Sanctuary for the Annual Stated Meeting and was constituted with prayer.

Moderator: Rev Dr W Martin Fair BA BD

Sederunt: 51 members attended

Minute: The minute of the Annual Stated Meeting held on 18th March 2018 was approved on the motion of Roberta Brand and Derek Scott.

The Moderator thanked Susan for her years as treasurer, and Heather Black for stepping into the role without hesitation. The Presentation of the Accounts: The accounts for 2018 were previously scrutinised by the Finance and Administration Core Group, approved by the Kirk Session and finally examined and approved by the independent examiner and presented to Angus Presbytery.

Scott Anderson, Leader of the Group presented details of the figures for 2018 which showed a net movement of funds of \pounds 972. Within this, the General Fund produced an "Operating surplus" of \pounds 11,018. A rebate on our M&M contribution for 2018 has assisted us in achieving this surplus. There are sufficient funds in our Ministry Team account to cover our Ministry Team members for a further year. There has been a good return on the Lets of our premises during 2018. The surplus in the General Fund of £11,018 will be split 50% to the Fabric Fund and 50% to the General Reserve Fund. Scott advised that changes had been introduced by the Regulator regarding how much money should be held for unforeseen circumstances. The Finance and Administration Group have met and as an organisation have decided what our reserve should be.

Thanks were expressed by the Moderator to Scott Anderson as leader, and all members of the Finance and Administration Core Group, for their commitment to the management of our finances.

Moderator's comments: Reflecting on 2018, the Moderator was grateful for the opportunity to thank the congregation for the enormous practical and prayerful support he had received when recovering from the accident to his arm. It had been a tough year, but the support from the congregation had been amazing. The Church was in good hands and going forward with blessing. 2018 was the year we said farewell to God's faithful servant, Jane Miller. The Moderator gave an emotional account of her faithful service and of how much she had given to the church and the community. He said that God would bless us by raising up others to take on the roles and responsibilities. We look back with thankfulness and forward in faith. The Moderator closed his comments with prayer.

Thanks to Moderator: Elaine Anderson, on behalf of the Kirk Session and congregation of St Andrew Church, thanked Martin for all the hard work and commitment he had given to the church over the past year, she reflected on the difficult year that Martin and the Fair family had had and how Martin had approached it with courage, humour and above all a deep and trusting faith on the love of the Lord Jesus Christ, he was an example of how to walk with the Lord and trust in him no matter how tough things got.
