PRESBYTERY MISSION PLAN - CONTINUED

It is right that members of the congregation be kept abreast of the plans for the Church in our area. Of course, the very same processes are being engaged in across the whole of Scotland but, naturally, we have a particular interest in our locale.

To that end, a special meeting of the Presbytery of Angus took place on Saturday 3rd September at which a Presbytery Mission Plan was presented. This Plan detailed 1) where the much-reduced number of ministers will be deployed and 2) listed every church building as either 'A' or 'B'.

Our own building was designated as 'A' meaning that it will be used for the foreseeable future. Many other buildings across Arbroath and Angus more widely, received 'B' ratings, meaning that they are to be disposed off within a given time frame - sooner rather than later in some cases.

This is quite simply an acknowledgment that we have too many buildings and that too many of them are poorly equipped, badly maintained and far too big for modern-day congregations - many of which number not much more than a handful or so.

After considerable debate and discussion - not to mention

counter proposals from some of those whose buildings were deemed to be surplus to requirements or who were not being offered a minister - the Plan was approved and transmitted to the national Church. All being well, before too long it will reach final approval and we'll all know where we stand.

And then the real work can begin!

Congregations will be asked to work together as never before. Although a number of buildings will be retained and there will be services across the town and country areas, we will essentially come together as one church. Bringing it all together from an administrative point of view will be a challenge in itself - as will encouraging everyone to work together for a common goal.

But that goal is unchanged. To glorify God, to make known the name of Jesus and in our words and deeds, to point to his coming Kingdom. This is the mission of the Church. Anything less than a wholesale embracing of that mission will see nothing other than continued demise.

Working out what this will mean Sunday by Sunday and in the day-to-day sense is the work that lies before us. Keep your eye on Quest magazine for regular updates.

Rising Costs

We have made mention of this in recent weeks and though it would now appear that the Government is introducing plans to lessen the impact of the sharp rise in energy bills, we will need 1. continue to be vigilant and 2. accept that our buildings won't always be as warm as we'd want and that certain of our spaces will be more or less shut for the winter months.

Discussions are underway in terms of how we might best address these challenges but most important, we don't want to be in a position where some of you will consider not coming for fear of being too cold. We will manage, one way or another, and even if it means a woolly jumper and a thick coat, so be it!

The Monarch and the Kirk

Here is the oath read by King Charles at the Accession Council meeting at St James's Palace in London:

"I, Charles III by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and of My other Realms and Territories King, Defender of the Faith, do faithfully promise and swear that I shall inviolably maintain and preserve the Settlement of the true Protestant Religion as established by the Laws made in Scotland in prosecution of the Claim of Right and particularly by an Act intituled 'An Act for securing the Protestant Religion and Presbyterian Church Government' and by the Acts passed in the Parliament of both Kingdoms for Union of the two Kingdoms, together with the Government, Worship, Discipline, Rights and Privileges of the Church of Scotland. So help me God."

Why is the Church of Scotland singled out and the new monarch obliged by law to maintain faithfully its status in our nation?

It all goes back to the Act of Union in 1707 when James VI of Scotland succeeded Queen Elizabeth, daughter of Henry VIII, and became James I of England, Wales and Ireland. Before this Union of the Crowns, James Stewart, son of Mary Queen of Scots, had had an increasingly stormy relationship with the Kirk. He wanted to emulate his grandfather, Henry VIII, and become head of the Church of Scotland in much the same way as Henry had made himself supreme Head of the Church of England.

One of his ploys was to try and gain control of the Kirk, by demanding that bishops should be introduced. He would appoint the bishops and grant them benefices which would make them both wealthy and powerful in the Kirk, but importantly would also oblige them to obey him. But the Scots ministers consistently insisted that the only Head of the Kirk was her Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

In 1595 a famous incident took place in Falkland Palace when one of Scotland's leaders and finest theologians, Andrew Melville, during a heated discussion with James VI, took him by the sleeve, called him 'God's silly vassal', and said:

'I mon tell yow, thair is twa Kings and twa Kingdomes in Scotland. Thair is Chryst Jesus the King, and his Kingdome the Kirk, whase subject King James the Saxt is, and of whose kingdome nocht a king, nor a lord, nor a heid, bot [merely] a member!'

Needless to say, Melville's boldness did not endear him to the king; quite the contrary. But it famously summed up the Presbyterian view of the monarch, and it was by the steadfast insistence of the Kirk that since 1707 at every accession of a new king or queen of the United Kingdom, the solemn promise had to be made to protect and defend the Kirk's autonomy under Christ's Headship alone.

In England, King Charles III is titular Head of the Established Church. In Scotland, he is a merely member, equal alongside all other members. However, when the General Assembly is convened, the monarch has historically been granted the right to be present as a Guest (or to appoint a Lord High Commissioner as his representative at the Assembly). But although neither the monarch nor the Lord High Commissioner has any authority or vote, always granted is the honour of addressing the Assembly. And the address is invariably listened to with the highest respect.

And that is the historic position of both Queens and Kings of the United Kingdom, dating back 315 years! And that is how it came about that all monarchs must take the oath, quoted above, as did our new King, Charles III.

This we know: beyond preparation for worship, Her Majesty the Queen had very much prepared herself for her death and for eternity thereafter. It's faith in Christ that gives us assurance that, as the Apostle Paul put it, 'death has lost its sting...'

Therefore we need not fear. The final enemy has been conquered. Thanks be to God.

We are looking into a couple of different options that we will share with you at a later date if either looks workable.

For now, we thank you all for the contributions you have made to the containers. They have really blessed the communities of Thyolo and Kambilonjo since 2013 when we sent our first. Who would have thought back then that we would have sent 10 more in only 9 years. On behalf of the children of Thyolo and Kambilonjo, we thank you.
