**A Celebration of Thirty-one Years** 

At the end of last year, when Martin announced to us that he felt the call of God to move on to pastures new, there was a deep sense that we were witnessing the end of an era. What an era it has been, and it is right that we should pay tribute to the thirty-one years of faithful service which Martin and Elaine have given to St Andrew's Church.

Thirty years ago, the national 'picture' of church life in Scotland was very different than that which we see today. Martin has always been aware of the challenges faced proclaiming the good news of Jesus Christ in an increasingly secular society. The many initiatives which he has implemented and supported have reflected this. We have seen the organisation and structure of the church itself changed with the introduction of the Leadership Group and support teams, the Havilah project, Mum and Me, mental health support work, children and schools' outreach work, and support for international work such as the Dalitso project.

The refurbishment of the sanctuary must surely stand out as a hugely significant milestone. It was a bold step to take, requiring much sacrifice from many, but Martin's vision for an open flexible space has resulted in us having a wonderful sanctuary and a building which is fit for twenty-first century worship.

In 2020, we celebrated with Martin and Elaine as he became the Right Reverend Dr Martin Fair – the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. Twenty-twenty turned out to be a year like no other when the landscape of our lives changed with the arrival of the Covid-19 virus. Martin, however continued his work undaunted through the wonders of technology - Zoom now being a word with which everyone is familiar!

During these thirty-one years, Martin and Elaine have always worked as a team, Elaine for many years has been deeply involved with children's ministry, and latterly we have enjoyed her beautiful singing voice as Sunday by Sunday she is part of the worship group and, I'm sure you will agree with me, her smile is infectious!

Although Martin and Elaine will no longer be leading us in worship each Sunday, he will continue his service in supporting new minsters in the early years of their ministry. Martin's warmth and ability to 'come alongside' others will serve him well in this new role.

I end with a quote from Martin himself from his address to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland on 22nd May, 2021.

"I believe the Holy Spirit is still in the business of starting fires. It's time for the church to start fanning the flames, and to put away the fire extinguishers. The Good News of Jesus Christ is not subject to a health and safety committee. Let the fire burn!"

Martin, we pray that you will indeed ignite the flames of faith within all those for whom you will provide guidance and support in your new role. We know too that you in turn will be praying for us, that as we close this particular chapter of our church life, we too will move forward under the power and guidance of the Holy Spirit.

Thank you, Martin and Elaine, for your years of dedicated service and may the Lord richly bless you and your family in the years ahead.

## Geoff and Jonathan

When Martin leaves, following worship on Sunday 5th March, we'll have two other ministers each of whom will have a role in overseeing the congregation until such times as a new minister is appointed.

Firstly, the Presbytery of Perth (of which we're now part) has appointed Rev Geoff Redmayne to be our Interim Moderator. Geoff will lead our Kirk Session meetings and will advise on all matters relating to the vacancy. Geoff is minster at Montrose South

and Ferryden and so is near at hand.

Secondly, our own Kirk Session has appointed Rev Jonathan Humphrey as our Locum Minister. This will amount to Sundays and two days midweek during which, among other things, Jonathan will offer pastoral care as appropriate.

Both Geoff and Jonathan are experienced ministers who will fit in nicely with our Church family. We look forward to them joining us and wish them well in their respective roles.

## All Change

Meetings and conversations continue towards the new plan for what Church will look like in our area going forward. At the end of January, for example, over a hundred elders from the various Church of Scotland congregations came together to consider the legalities involved, the structure of the new united congregation, how it would be led and administered... and even what it would be called!

This we do know that though united as one, there will be six worship centres where weekly services will be held. This will mean that the three ministers - Chris Hay, Peter Phillips and Martin's successor - will each lead two services on a Sunday, most likely one at 10am and another at 11.30am (though these details are not as yet finalised.) The worship centres will be St. Andrew's, the West Kirk, St. Vigean's, Friockheim, Inverkeillor and Carmyllie. So there will be various services held allowing for different expressions and styles of worship. That's good and proper - variety is better than uniformity! But other things, not least administration and the mission of the new united congregation as it works out through the week are better done together.

Of course this is all new and so annual reviews will assess how things are working out and what, if anything, needs to be adapted.

Some people ask why all of this is required? Well of course it's a good thing when God's people work together! But beyond that, the reality is that many, many churches are struggling. Some once strong congregations have attendances of no more than twenty or so and some of the rural congregations struggle to muster more that seven or eight folk on a Sunday. The harsh reality is that that is simply unsustainable and so the Church across the land is having to figure out new ways of being present and of ministering to the people of our communities.

Time will tell how how it will all work our but in the meantime, it's essential that we go into it positively and prayerfully, being fully prepared to play our part. May God build His Church once more in our communities.

Dear friends,

Here I am writing a letter, the composing of which on one hand fills me with joy and gratitude and on the other, with the deepest possible sadness and sense of loss. To have been your minister for 31 years will - regardless of what comes next - stand as my greatest honour. It's what I've given my life to since showing up as a callow youth all those years ago and though there are some things that I'd do differently if given another run at it, by and large I look back with much fondness and with a sense of 'I gave it my all.'

Of course first and foremost ministry is about people and it's the people of this church and wider community who have made it such a happy time for me. When I pause even for a few moments to ponder these things, I'm faced with a sea of faces passing before me - some still very much with us and others gone to glory but all holding a special place in my heart.

- \* I think of the near 400 baptisms (and many blessings on top of that number) the privilege of thanking God for the gift of new life and of new life in Christ
- \* I think of the 200-300 marriages conducted the privilege of officiating as a couple commits themselves one to the other
- \* I think of the over 1,500 funerals conducted the privilege of being alongside families in their darkest hours
- \* I think of the thousands of children we've welcomed to holiday clubs the privilege of sharing Jesus with the young
- \* I think of the staff I've worked with the privilege of counting as colleagues those who have served as administrators, youth workers, community workers, Havilah workers, pastoral workers, church officers, cleaners etc.
- \* I think of the countless hours in bible study and prayer groups the privilege of studying God's word and bowing before Him
- \* I think of the groups sent out to Cambodia and Malawi and the groups I led to the Holy Land the privilege of journeying in community
- \* I think of the selfless service of elders and office bearers and church members the privilege of seeing people respond to invitations to step up
- \* And I think of the many men and women and young people who have found faith in Jesus the privilege of guiding people to that biggest of life's moments

Laughter, tears and everything in between but all of it adding up to an 'all of life' experience which I wouldn't have traded for anything.

The hardest bit comes in taking my leave of you, though I'm thinking of it less as me leaving you and more as you sending me out to serve across the nation. I have a huge challenge ahead of me, but am looking forward to it (even if with a little trepidation!)

But the hardest part is that **leaving really does mean leaving**. Once a minister goes it's simply not appropriate for him or her to be coming back and forward in response to things happening. And apart from that, I'll be working a 9-5 job (no doubt with some evenings and weekends added in) as part of a team and so it simply won't be possible to continue with anything here. That's going to be extremely hard for me but it's what's required.

My new role is, some might say, an impossible task but I will step into it in the same way I've faced everything whilst here - trusting that the God who calls also equips and strengthens. My immediate task is to rekindle a sense of vocation across the Church, that may more people (and not least younger people) will sense a call to ministry. When I came here, I was 27 and I wasn't alone - many of those I trained with were in their 20s and 30s. The average age of new ministers now is closer to 50! My other principal responsibility will be adapting the way in which we prepare people for ministry, acknowledging that 21st century, secular Scotland requires a different form of preparation to what we have hitherto offered. In all of that, your prayerful support - from a distance, as it were - will be much appreciated.

But that's to come. For now, there are a few days and weeks left of my time here and I very much hope that as many of you as possible will manage to be at one or all of our worship services - which is to say that that will be more doable than me trying to visit all of you!

And so ends my final letter for Quest magazine (and with it a big thanks to Ken and his predecessors for compiling and editing.) It leaves me, with a tear in my eye, simply to say THANK YOU for the way in which you took Elaine I - and our boys - into your hearts and made these years we've spent among you ones of which we can genuinely say, 'these were the best years of our lives.'

May God richly bless you in all the days to come as He surely has in the days now gone.

Of course it wouldn't be possible without a small regiment of volunteers and we're very thankful to those from our own congregation and many others who have rallied to this cause - most of them serving on a weekly basis according to a carefully worked out rota. Some cook, some serve, some clear up and some focus on making sure that everyone who comes is made to feel welcome.

These may be small first steps but they pave a way towards a future which is based on churches collaborating as never before. And why not!? We worship the same God and share the same mission. It was Jesus' final prayer for his disciples that they would all be as one. May it be a prayer answered in our day.

# Great Scots who must not be forgotten 1. Patrick Hamilton (1513-1546)

One of the first 'traditions' I learned when I began my studies at St Andrews University in 1956 was that one should never tread on a monogram embedded in the ancient paving stones at the entrance to St Salvator's Chapel. The monogram—in dark stone to distinguish it from the rest of the very light-coloured paving stones—spelled PH for Patrick Hamilton, for it was on that spot that this young man was burned at the stake on 27 February 1527.

Patrick was born in 1503. On his father's side he was related to the Earl of Arran and on his mother's side to the Duke of Albany; he was also related to King James V. In his teenage years the abbacy of Ferne in Ross-shire was conferred on him, which gave him a annual income enabling him get the best education. He was a diligent and brilliant student. After several years at St Andrews University, he was eager to continue his education in Europe and chose Wittenburg University in Germany. There he became a firm friend of Martin Luther who in 1517 had nailed his famous 95 theses to the door of the Church, thus initiating the Reformation in Europe.

Returning to St Andrews at the age of 23, he began bolding lecturing on Salvation by faith alone, through grace alone, from Christ alone. This of course ran contrary to the teaching of the mediaeval Roman Catholic Church. At first, he was listened to by eager students, who turned to Scripture to find out if this was genuinely its teaching.

At this time, St Andrews was dominated by powerful clergy in the Catholic hierarchy. Archbishop Beaton developed a deep hatred for Patrick, but hid it behind a false pose of friendship. Resolving to get rid of him, a plot was devised. First, they persuaded some of the clergy to agree with Patrick that some reforms were clearly needed. Second, they enticed him to take part in a conference during which he had to 'dialogue' with Alexander Campbell, Prior of the Black Friars. The Prior lured him into making statements which would be considered heretical.

Third, they persuaded King James V, to undertake a pilgrimage to Ross-shire, where we he would be well out of the way, as they knew he would not want his brilliant young kinsman to be harmed. Fourth, under cover of darkness they then arrested Patrick and imprisoned him in St Andrews and put him on trial.

Undaunted, during the trial Patrick Hamilton affirmed certain biblical statements. 1. That confession to a priest is not necessary for salvation. 2. That penance and purchase of indulgences cannot buy forgiveness from God. 3. That there is no purgatory in Scripture... and so on.

He was now condemned to be burned at the stake outside the entrance to the Chapel. As he was tied to the stake and the fire was kindled, Friar Campbell taunted him and urged him to cry out, 'Hail Mary, Queen of Heaven!' But the martyr's last words were, 'O Lord, how long shall darkness overwhelm this realm? Lord Jesus, receive my Spirit!'

However, the flames which consumed this 24 years old young man also kindled a fire in Scotland that spread quietly in many hearts until 33 years later John Knox returned to Scotland from exile and the Reformation began in earnest.

Each brought their own gifts and skills to the role and the fact that we have younger adults around our church today (and that churches elsewhere in the country have younger adults who were nurtured in our congregation) is testimony to the work done.

The commitment to that work by you, our members, has been remarkable and apart from the early years when we were able to access some grant aid, we have financed it exclusively through the generosity of those of our members who have seen the value and invested in it.

Carla Ingram was baptised as an infant in St. Andrew's Church exactly 27 years ago. Nurtured in our congregation, she returned here after completing her studies in Edinburgh and St. Andrew's and shortly afterwards stepped up to the youth work role. Isn't it a joy when we see the turning of generations and young people embracing faith and going on themselves to positions of leadership and influence! We've said it before but it's always worth repeating: unless congregations place a very high value on their young people then the future is nothing but bleak. Sadly we're seeing that across the country in these days - churches devoid of almost anyone under fifty years of age.

Following these years when we've done this on our own, the great news is that Carla is now - from 1st February - employed by the Church of Scotland to do this work. That sees her moving from part-time to full-time with 50% of the costs being met by the national church and the other half from the churches across Arbroath and area who will, as we know, shortly be operating as a united congregation.

We wish Carla well in her expanded role. We rejoice in her faithfulness. We ask God to bless her work in these coming days.
