He Has Plans For Us!

Dear friends, In the September Quest I wrote about change, transition, and the grieving process, about letting go and allowing God to accompany us and equip us as we grieve. This month, we are thinking a bit more about holding in tension the sadness of loss alongside the joy and hope we have in Jesus Christ, and pursuing the plans He has for us as individuals and as a church family. There is no doubt that the Lord has good plans for us – he's told us!

And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose (Romans 8: 28 ESV).

Many of you will also recall the wonderful promise of God given through the prophet Jeremiah to the people of Israel when they were exiled in Babylon:

This is what the Lord says: "You will be in Babylon for seventy years. But then I will come and do for you all the good things I have promised, and I will bring you home again. 11 For I know the plans I have for you," says the Lord. "They are plans for good and not for disaster, to give you a future and a hope. 12 In those days when you pray, I will listen. 13 If you look for me wholeheartedly, you will find me. 14 I will be found by you," says the Lord. "I will end your captivity and restore your fortunes. I will gather you out of the nations where I sent you and will bring you home again to your own land." (Jeremiah 29: 10-14 NLT)

This prophecy was fulfilled over a 100 -year time period in various stages and through various leaders (see illustration). In the coming weeks in our Sunday services we will be looking at the life of one of those leaders, Nehemiah, an exiled Jew a servant to the King of the Persian Empire. We will be learning from Nehemiah about how to be bold, pursue vision, navigate change, make courageous decisions, and stand firm against opposition.

Arbroath and District Union What is happening?

Since the congregational votes back in June, which failed to get all nine congregations on board, it has all gone a bit quiet - or has it? On the surface it may seem so, but the Transition Team have been busy in the background trying to find solutions. Apart from Transition Team meetings over the summer, members of the teams also met with the Principal Clerk, the Presbytery Clerk and the Presbytery Planning team to consider possible options. There were also Question and Answer sessions at Arbirlot, Old & Abbey, St Andrew's and Inverkeillor over the summer.

At its August meeting, the Transition Team agreed to:

• Seek a slight amendment to the Presbytery Mission Plan to allow buildings to stay open for up to 6 months longer the end of year date in the current plan.

By the time you read this article, we will already have had one key lesson from the life of Nehemiah – God changes things when we pray! God longs for us to pursue His heart and His vision for building His Kingdom in Arbroath and beyond. He assures us that if we look for him "wholeheartedly", we will find Him.

If we are willing to be like Nehemiah who sat down and wept [and] for some days mourned and fasted and prayed before the God of heaven (Nehemiah 1: 4 NIV) we can be assured that he will hear us and be attentive to our pleas. I

will leave you with this question.

Are you content with the status quo in your own life, in our churches and in our town? Maybe, like me, you are experiencing that Nehemiah moment – that "Holy Discontent" and a vision to see the "more" of God, an outpouring of his love, grace and power on needy situations, families, schools, and workplaces around Arbroath.

Be assured that He loves you and zealously seeks your company and your partnership in fulfilling His plans for *His Kingdom to come and His will to be done on earth as it is in heaven*. Amen

- Arrange a meeting at Arbirlot with Presbytery Clerk and Presbytery Planning Team to outline their options.
- Seek a date for a further round of congregational meetings (and votes) including all nine congregations on essentially the same Basis of Union and Basis of Team Ministry

The dates for the congregational meetings are still to be agreed but they can be expected to be in mid November. If the votes then fall in favour of the Union then a New Year Union can be expected. If those meetings yield the same outcome as the last round then the Presbytery Mission Plan will have to be revisited. That is a longer process. It should be stressed that there will be no change in the number of ministers available and the fact that we have too many buildings will still be to the fore.

Please commit the whole process and the Transition Team to your prayers.
